RUSSIA SETS A GOOD EXAMPLE.

Troops from America, England, Russia, France, Germany, Italy, and Japan, all on a war footing and accoutred as such, marching in parade in the streets of the capital of another and foreign country is enough to create military enthusiasm all over the world.

These troops of all nations virtually marching under one command is a thing which would have seemed impossible even six months ago, yet now it seems in the natural order of things.

Hops.

The Otago Republican, of Cooperstown, N. Y., in its issue of the 22nd inst says:

The picking of the early hops has begun in some places this week, and by the time of another issue picking will be in full blast. M. R. Stocker & Son have begun picking on the James F. Clark farm, and D. W. Mitchell, of Schuyler Lake, who had 65 pickers come from Ontario, began Tuesday. The crop, while an exceedingly light one, is as fine a looking one as ever grew. If carefully harvested, it will make a high grade crop, and should, under all the conditions existing, command a good price.

Mail reports just received regarding the crop in Kent and Surrey, England, say that recent heavy rains have done a great amount of injury. Vermen had almost entirely disappeared, but mold was on the increase, and at places was present to a very serious extent. The report concludes: "It is obvious that previous estimates of the crop must be discounted as a result of the rains, and experts agree that the yield cannot now be expected to come up to the average."

LARGE LAND DEAL. IN BLUE RIVER.

Looks as if the Military Road Lands Would Change Hands.

MEANS MUCH TO EUGENE.

Daily Guard August 30.
Henry Stuart and F. K. Baker, of Marinette, Wisconsin, arrived here on this afternoon's train. In the morning at an early hour they leave up the Military road for the neighborhood of Lowell. These men, with other wealthy associates, have under consideration the purchasing of the Military road lands lying west of the Cascade mountains, amounting to a large number of acres. For several months they have had a party of expert timber cruisers from the East estimating the amount of saw timber standing on these lands, and Messrs Stuart and Baker now go to consult said parties as to the result of their work up to this time.

If the lands are transferred, it will mean a great deal to Eugene and Lane county and the timber will probably be logged and milled in the immediate future.

It is hinted that the lands are held at about \$1,000,000.

SUBSTANTIAL WORK

McKenzie Road Work Will Prove Effective.

Messrs G. W. Griffin and F. L. Chambers, of the committee in charge of the McKenzie road work arrived home last night from a tour of inspection.

The gentlemen express themselves as well pleased with the work done so far. Messrs Carroll and Simon the foremen in charge of the two crews are practical road builders and the work done is of the best.

It is safe to say that this will prove to be one of the best investments ever made by the business men and county court. The volume of travel over this road is enormous.

Helgranite or "Trout" Fly.

George Frizzell, of McKenzie Bridge, has been supplied with another title, that of "Captain" in addition to "Uncle George." A well written article on the trout species of the Northwest, published in a recent number of the Oregonian is followed by this comment:

"In order to fully understand and appreciate the merits and beauty of the rainbow trout, the writer of the foregoing should spend a holiday on the McKenzie river with Captain George Frizzell when the helgranite fly is out, and compare it with the cutthroat and the Dolly Varden."

The "helgranite" fly is the scientific name for what is known by the fishermen as the "trout" fly. "Helgranite" or any other name, "Uncle" or "Captain" George is the king of fishermen among the speckled, red-side beauties of the McKenzie when the fly is in season. And the time is nearly at hand, the first week of September.

News About Stamps.

An innovation in the postal service which is sure to be of great convenience is the plan lately adopted of furnishing stamps in little books, with wax sheets between them. The government is to charge one cent additional to the amount of stamps contained therein, and it is now estimated that the profit on these books will amount to \$300,000 per annum. Interest in the District Continues to Grow.

ATTRACTING MUCH ATTENTION.

The wide publicity given the Blue River mining district during the present season shows that it is now going through the process of being "discovered," although having been prospected for many years.

Papers all over the state tell of its richness, and miners from every camp in the West are there.

The Salem Statesman of yesterday has the following:

"The Blue River mining district is exciting a good deal of attention in mining circles and many are watching the development of prospects in that section with the keenest interest, entertaining the highest hopes that something better than has ever yet been realized from mines in the Cascade range will come from this section. Miners have been at work in this district for at least fifteen years, but no very rich strikes have been made, yet there have always been very promising ones brought out by every prospector. The long delay in developing these mines has been caused by a failure of prospectors to invest capital in constructing roads and doing development work. This district begins in the southern part of Linn county, near the head of the Callapoia, and extends southward into Lane county, where the best paying mines have so far been discovered."

"Recently a Salem man returned from this part of the state and he confirms the newspaper reports of rich strikes and great activity among the miners, and the very substantial character of the development work as well as the work on the roads leading into the Blue River district. Miners from every camp in the West are found here and they are very enthusiastic over the very promising future of this mining district."

"Just south of this is what is known as the Black Butte district. There is some activity in this region as will be seen by the following from the Brownsville Times:

"A large number of quartz claims are just at present being located in what is called the Black Butte district. This new mining district, as near as we have been able to ascertain, lies on the north side of the old military road in Lane county and about midway between the Bohemia and Blue River districts. It is reported that some fine bodies of ore have been struck. The discovery of this new district indicates that eventually the Bohemia and Blue River districts will be virtually one immense mining camp. It will be a mammoth one."

In the Hop Business.

An Albany dispatch of August 29th has this concerning a hop man well known in Eugene:

"Mr. Fitchard, the well-known hop man, was in Albany for a few hours today, and left this afternoon for Independence, where he goes to look after one of his hop yards, and place men in charge to run it for this season. Mr. Fitchard owns seven hop yards in different parts of the valley, and says the outlook this season is for a good crop and good prices. About 40 cents per box will be paid for picking."

Mr. Fitchard until recently has represented an Eastern firm, located in New York state, but says much better hops are grown in Oregon than in New York state, and he has invested considerable money in the business in this state. If the crop turns out good this fall, he will invest heavier and will move his family to this part of the country."

Child Drowned at Wendling.

Two accidents at Wendling, one of them fatal, was the record of yesterday. Following upon the injury to Glen Anderson by the falling of a tree, mention of which was made in the GUARD yesterday, came a report last evening of the accidental drowning of a little child.

Roy Kester, aged four years, fell into Wolf creek from the bridge where he had been playing, and was drowned, although strenuous effort was made to save him.

HUNTINGTON'S WEALTH.—Those who should have a large knowledge of the late C P Huntington's affairs figure that he left behind in one way or another from \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000. Some of his interests were enormous. That in the 8-uthern Pacific company has been run up as high as \$45,000,000. It is said to be about \$12,000,000. In the Pacific Improvement company, capital \$5,000,000, which owns the Hotel Del Monte at Monterey, worth \$2,500,000, and Arcadia at Santa Monica and the mines of Castle Crags, in the upper Sacramento valley near Shasta, Mr. Huntington's wealth is computed at \$2,500,000. Mr. Huntington's interest at Newport News cannot, it is claimed, be less than \$6,000,000. In the Pacific Mail Steamship company Mr. Huntington's interests were about \$2,000,000. His share in another corporation was not less than \$1,500,000. His various parcels of improved and unimproved property in several states in the union are estimated to be worth from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000. There estimates, which are regarded as extremely conservative, place Mr. Huntington's fortune at more than \$30,000,000.
