

THE "DESPOT," AND THE RULER OF THE "FREE" ON CHINA.

Czar's Declaration. "Russia has directed the Russian minister to retire with his official personnel FROM CHINA. The Russian troops will likewise be withdrawn, and when the government of China shall regain the reins of government and afford an authority with which the other powers can deal, and will express desire to enter into negotiations, the Russian government will also name its representative."

McKinley's Response. "In our opinion these purposes [protection, indemnity, trade] could best be attained by the joint occupation of Peking... until the Chinese government shall have been re-established... With the establishment and recognition of such authority the United States would wish to withdraw its military forces FROM PEKING and remit to the processes of peaceful negotiations our just demands."

WILLIAM'S BIG BLUFF.

No wonder Emperor William of Germany is nervous these days. When things looked very dark for foreigners shut up within the gates of Peking "Bill" made this big bluff: "To any one accomplishing the deliverance of any foreigner of any nationality who is now shut up in Peking, I will pay 1000 taels."

IMPERIALISM.

Arrangements are being made for taking down the flag from the walls of Peking. It comes as a surprise after all this talk about the Philippines that wherever the flag has been run up that it must stay. However the administration announces that five thousand American soldiers will be quartered in China during the winter. It is only 8000 miles across the big Pacific to the Chinese coast where President McKinley proposes to keep this small standing army.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—The census bureau announces that the population of Salt Lake City, Utah, is 53,531, as against 44,843 in 1890. This is an increase of 8688, or 19.37 per cent. The population of Albany, N. Y., is 94,151, as against 94,923 in 1890. This is a decrease of 772, or .81 per cent.
