The American colony has subscribed 10,000 pesos for the relief of Galveston.

SEVERAL SALES MADE.

Some Hops Selling in Salem at 14 Cents Per Pound.

Hops are beginning to move, a number of sales having been consummated during the past few days. One dealer purchased 125 bales at 14 cents per pound; these were strictly choice hops and are intended for the export trade. Other sales were reported at from 12 to 13 1/2 cents per pound, the hops being of a very excellent quality.

Dealers say that the local market for American brewing hops will stand about 13 cents, though exporters are enabled to pay 14 cents per pound. The market is not considered strong, and many of the dealers at this time have no orders for Oregon hops. But while the market is quiet, all dealers look for an early improvement, and it is generally expected that hops will soon move in great quantities.

"Buyers and sellers apart" is a fairly good description of the hop situation at the present time. The growers have considerable faith in the strong statistical position of hops, and are not inclined to force their stock on the market, and the brewers are holding off in the hopes that the reported shortage is not so bad as it seems. Strictly first-class stock could probably be worked for very close up to 15 cents, a few transactions having been made at 14 cents recently.

The New York Journal of Commerce prints the following regarding the situation in Europe and the East:

"There has been rather more inquiry for sound 1899 hops, but business in new crop is at a standstill. Brewers are not yet ready to buy and dealers hesitate because of the uncertainty regarding quality owing to damage to last part of the crop and also because they are not yet satisfied as to the stability of the prices. There is, however, a firm undertone to the market, and the belief appears to be quite general in well-informed quarters that whatever may be the course of prices in the near future, ultimately higher figures will prevail. This belief appears to be based upon the fact that the shortage in the output abroad will cause heavy demands from England and Europe upon American stocks. The impression prevails in some quarters at least that when the fine samples of American hops are shown in London the merchants of that market will be eager buyers. Mail advices from London to the 11th inst, report a very quiet market, the brewers not buying and the merchants being afraid to pay the prices asked. Prices on German hops, the writer said, were considered very high, but he adds that already the tone is less firm and he fully expected to see a setback shortly. On the other hand recent reports direct from Germany are to the effect, that while there has been a reaction from the highest point, there is little prospect of a material decline in the market. In New York state the market is firm, 15 cents being the general price, though we hear of sales of 125 bales in the state at 13 cents; 150 bales at the same price, and 40 bales at 12 1/2 cents.

M'KENZIE ROAD

Much Good Work--Some That Deserves Criticism.

SPRINGS ABOUT DESERTED.

(Editorial Correspondence.)

BEKKNAP SPRINGS, Sept. 24.

The public spirited citizens who made liberal subscription for the purpose of making permanent repairs on the McKenzie wagon road may rest assured that the work is being well done, generally, under the superintendency of Messrs Carroll and Simon.

The former gentleman, first named superintendent, has finished the work through the timber, just above Walterville. The dirt was thrown into a grade and well covered with gravel. The road has been built on a straight line, which involved the blowing out of thirty stumps and trees. Numerous trees were cut down on the south side of the road to allow the sunshine to enter. Nine teams and 17 men are employed in Carroll's gang. The lowest average made by the teamsters was 8 loads per day, and highest 16. Altogether 2500 loads of gravel were hauled at this place. Mr Carroll intended to move his camp and men beyond the Anderson place today, and on Wednesday four miles further up, then would work both ways.

Travelers will remember the Walterville timber road as a horrible one, out of one mud hole into another, and this for a stretch of a mile or more. Mr Carroll has done substantial work rebuilding this road, and we believe it will last.

Mr Simons has opened up a gravel bank at the upper end of Shell Rock grade, from which he is getting splendid gravel. It is not too coarse, and is easily handled, being on the hillside along the road. On the east end the steep approach has been scraped down and greatly improved. The two steep pitches by which the road got on the high ground about a mile west from Sparks have also been reduced to an easy and continuous grade.

SOME CRITICISM.

While the general character has been excellent we do not feel justified in allowing some of the work to pass criticism. In some places dirt has been scraped into holes in the road. At this season of the year the dirt works into mud at once and aggravates the evil. Dirt may be used to fill in the latter part of spring and in summer time, but it is certainly a waste of time and money to use dirt at the beginning of the rainy season.

Then for some inscrutable reason the road was changed from the bottom along the river bank a few miles below Blue River and a grade made on the side of the hill, just above the old road, for a hundred yards or more. It requires a pull to get on the grade from either end. To make it a large amount of dirt and gravel had to be moved. The writer traveled the road in July, and when he came to this particular grade the other day his wonderment was greatly exercised as to the reason of the expensive change of roadbed. He could not remember of any particularly bad road in that vicinity, so when he got over the grade he hitched his horse and went back over the old road. It was as he expected to find it, a fair roadbed, no worse than much that has not been touched, and follows the river grade. We have a chrono for the person who will inform us why several hundred dollars—not less than two hundred, we believe—was expended in making grades for travel to pull over where none existed until the so-called improvement was made. Certainly there is enough bad road left on which the money could well be expended without worse than throwing it away.

BEKKNAP SPRINGS.

The "Springs" season is about over and the manager, Ed Howe, and his family will return to Eugene, probably about the first of October. There are no camps, the rain drove the last one out, and but three guests at the hotel. Mr Howe reports that this has been a fairly prosperous season for this resort, that is, when the short season, from about the first of July to the middle of September, is considered. But mineral springs, like seaside and other resorts must make hay, or rather money, while the sun shines. The people go home very quickly when other climatic conditions exist.
