LI HUNG CHANG WILL NOT GO TO PEKIN

REPUBLICANS LOSE IN CONNECTICUT

Roseburg City Election.

ROSEBURG, Oct. 1.—The city election today resulted in a complete victory for the citizens ticket over the firemen by a decisive majority. Only one councilman was elected on that ticket. The election officers enforced the property qualification, allowing only taxpayers to vote, and this action caused a very light vote. The officers elected were: Recorder, D. S. West; Marshal, F. W. Dillard; Treasurer, W. E. Cochran; Councilman, first ward, F. P. Brown; second ward, J. O. Metz; third ward, W. J. Landers; fourth ward, P. Benedick.

Profits of Fruit Trust.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Of the \$5,500,000 in 6 per cent notes issued a year ago by the United Fruit Company, \$1,750,000 payable today, the balance will be due Oct. 1, 1901. When these notes were issued it was understood that they would be retired from the earnings of the year—which will be the case. The directors recently voted \$1120 new stock which made the total outstanding \$12,352,000. The total authorized is \$20,000,000. Since its start the company has made many improvements and extensions.

Gervais Hop Market Brisk.

Gervais, Oct. 1.—The hop market is lively at this point, and many sales are being made at 14 cents per pound, the ruling price. Already many hundred bales have passed from grower's hands.

RED HOT LETTER.

A New York Republican Writes Pertinently.

(Special to The World.)

LYONS, N. Y., Sept. 24.—The political sensation here is the publication of a letter written by District Attorney Edward H. Kellogg, of Wolcott, to his cousin, Charles H. Kellogg, in Russell, Kan.

Kellogg, who has always been a staunch republican, is serving his third term and is the first district attorney Wayne county ever honored with three consecutive terms.

August 22, he wrote his Kansas cousin a letter which the latter, who is a Bryanite, in great glee handed to the editor of the Russell (Kan.) Reformer, and that paper published.

District Attorney Kellogg's letter follows:

"Well, regarding national politics. The issues are now clearly drawn. The republican party has listened to the jingoes and the capitalists who are willing to commit murder and criminal aggression that they may exploit the Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, (and Cuba, I believe) and taken the position I feared it would take and nominate a man for president who I believe is either a man of putty or a scoundrel, and a man for vice-president, who is an aristocrat and an unsafe crank with a chip always on his shoulder.

"They have endorsed the villainous policy of Hanna, Pratt & Co, which repudiates the most sacred doctrines of the immortal Declaration and the Constitution and substitutes jingoism and mere flag worship for patriotism.

"I am against them and in favor of any party, no matter what its remote past history, that takes the opposite stand upon this question, the settlement of which I consider vital and all-important to the American people. And I am overjoyed that Bryan has so wonderfully disappointed me. I consider his Indianapolis speech one of the most masterly productions of the English language.

"I feel that I can trust him and those he will call about him on this vital question, no matter how much I distrust the democratic rabble (who, after all, may not be so far removed or different from the republican rabble), and I propose to vote for him."

Copies of this paper reached Wayne county this week. It has placed Mr Kellogg in an embarrassing position.

There is a fight on in Wayne county for the republican nomination for district attorney, and Mr Kellogg has been a dark-horse candidate. Further than that, he was a delegate from Butler to the republican district convention.

Three days after writing to his Kansas cousin the above letter, he attended the republican district convention as a delegate, and when Judge Charles T. Saxton introduced his resolution endorsing President McKinley's administration Kellogg voted for it.

Died.

St Joseph White died of Bright's disease at the residence of Mrs Brownlee, corner Eleventh and Olive streets, Eugene, Oregon, Sunday night, September 30, 1900, at 10 o'clock, aged 36 years, 2 months and 14 days. He leaves a wife, the daughter of Mr Carey Thompson, who he married July 29, 1900, and a father in the State of Missouri, besides a number of other relatives.

Mr White came to the Coast about 10 years ago, and to the Blue River mining district about five years ago, where he purchased the Sunset claim, which he still owned at the time of his death. This is thought to be the richest mining claim in Western Oregon.

Mr White was sick only a few weeks being attacked by the fatal disease only since his marriage. He was a member of Spencer Butte Lodge, No 9, I. O. O. F., of this city.

The funeral will occur tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence of Mrs Brownlee on the corner of 11th and Olive streets, under the auspices of Spencer Butte Lodge No 9, I. O. O. F., of this city. Rev J. A. Cleland will conduct the religious services.

HOPS ADVANCE.—Today's Salem Statesman: Fifteen cents was yesterday offered for the hops of an Aurora grower, and refused by him. Dealers are now beginning to make inquiries for hops, and the price is slowly advancing. Good prices will doubtless be paid when the market opens fully. Several sales at better than 14 cents are reported, but the major portion of the growers refuse to sell for less than 15 cents or better.

OREGONIAN EDITOR INTERVIEWED.

Scott Actually Says the Result is in Great Doubt.

La Grande Chronicle, Sept. 29.

Harvey Scott, of the Oregonian, was a passenger on the west bound train of this morning on his way from New York where he has been on business for the past three weeks in connection with a meeting of a committee of the Associated Press, of which he was chairman. Mr Scott expresses himself in regard to the present political outlook as being very doubtful as to the election of McKinley and Roosevelt, and says if the workingmen of the east should go for Bryan and Stevenson they will be elected in spite of hell and high water. It looks at the present time very much as though it would go that way.

Hops.

The Produce Price Current, of New York, of September 15, after saying the New York state yield turned out about the same as last year, says:

"Growers do not seem in a hurry to market their hops, and the few sales reported of late have been mainly at about 15 cents. Cable advices from London give us no reason to change previous estimates of the crop, which is likely to be 35 to 40 per cent short of last year. Our local market has been in a sort of waiting condition, operators waiting to see the outcome of the English crop. A moderate quantity of stock is going to brewers to meet current requirements, and there is some export business from here and on direct consignments from the west. Supplies in first hands are lighter than usual for this season of the year, and this makes a firm holding of most grades. The business that transpires is within the range of our quotations."

Paris Exposition Awards.

The jury of final appeal in the exposition awards has finished its work. The statement prepared for the United States Commission shows that America received the highest number of awards of any nation save France, and that she also received more awards in each classification except grand prizes, in which Germany secured a greater number. The figures, except France, follow:

Grand prizes—United States, 216; Germany, 206; Russia, 209; Great Britain, 183.

Gold medals—United States, 547; Germany, 510; Russia, 348; Great Britain, 405.

Silver medals—United States, 593; Germany, 573; Russia, 415; Great Britain, 517.

Bronze medals—United States, 501; Germany, 321; Russia, 321; Great Britain, 410.

Honorable mention—United States, 348; Germany, 184; Russia, 126; Great Britain, 207.

A postoffice inspector returned recently from a tour of inspection of postoffices in 25 counties in Michigan. All but two were in excellent condition. In one office the postmaster could neither read nor write, and his clerk was deaf and dumb. Farmers when inquiring for mail had to either get it themselves, or write their requests on slips of paper so the clerk could find out what was wanted.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

Emmit White Comes Near Killing Himself in Trail Canyon.

Ukiah, Ukiah & Co., Sentinel, of September 27th, says: "Emmit White, who in company with another young man, were on their way from Montana to Eugene, Oregon, met with a serious and almost fatal accident last Friday while camped near the head of Trail canyon, 10 miles south of Ukiah.

"It seems that another young man, whose name we did not learn, was driving in the horse, and young White went to climb over a fence to help his partner catch the animals, when a revolver which he had on his person fell upon the rock and was discharged, the ball entering the left side and narrowly missing the heart, lodged near the shoulder.

"He was taken to Dale and a doctor summoned from Long Creek. He was afterward taken to Long Creek, and at last a count was getting along as well as could be expected."
