SCIO FLAX PLANT DESTROYED.

Fire Reduces Works to Heap of Ruins—Loss \$4000.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 8.—The plant of the Northwest Flax & Fiber Company, of Scio, was totally destroyed by fire about 9 o'clock tonight. The plant consisted of a dryhouse, machinery, building and a 90 ton stack of flax straw.

The dryhouse and machinery building, including machinery, were valued at \$300, and the straw at \$1000. There was no insurance. Twenty men are thrown out of employment.

Public Square Case Settled.

The suit of W. T. Campbell and Geo. Fisher against Lane county and the Eugene Loan and Savings Bank in the Lane county circuit has been settled and dismissed.

The above named plaintiff parties are owners of property abutting on the public square at the southwest and northwest corners of the public square street back of Willamette street, and brought suit to enjoin the county from closing their outlet to the street in the rear of their respective properties through the sale of one-third of the public square street to owners of abutting property or others. The owners of adjacent property have settled plans of division of the vacated street that are mutually satisfactory, hence the dismissal of the suit.

MR. DURST WRITES.

He Corrects an Error—Thinks in Thirty Days American Hops Will Sell Well.

The following is self-explanatory: EUGENE, Oct. 6, 1900.

EDITOR DAILY GUARD, Dear Sir:—You have certainly "done me up brown" this time, and I thank you sincerely for your good intentions.

I am not the largest hop grower on the coast. What I said, I think, was that my people, the Dursts of Wheatland, or my father, W. P. Durst, is the largest bona fide grower on the coast. Our crop last year, every bale of which was sold in London, was 3,964 bales. I do not like to sell under false colors, but some of my friends when they see your paper will have the laugh on me. We can lay it to a typographical error.

I feel sure that if the growers can get on without selling for a few weeks they will all realize good prices. The situation in England is very strong. There is no trade yet for the reason that English brewers do not buy American hops until the boards are clear of the English crop.

The demand may open in London in 30 days, and as soon as it does our market will feel the effects of it.

Telephone Improvements.

The increased patronage of the local office of the Oregon Telephone & Telegraph Company has necessitated some improvements which will be made at once. Miss Irene Applegate, manager, stated to a GUARD reporter that an order for a new switch board is in and by the first of the month will be in position. At present with a single board but one operator can attend to the work of the local exchange and long distance alike. When the new board is placed in Miss Applegate will attend to the long distance work and another operator will do the local work.

At present a new line is being placed in, running to Jasper, Thurston and Waverly, and may be extended to the Blue River mines. Next summer it is very likely that the company will extend its line to Florence. With this increase of long distance work, a still larger switch board will have to be put in, and another operator employed. As the business stands at present two day operators and one at night can be used steadily.

Miss Daisy Baker, who has been night operator, is resting for the present, and her place is filled by Miss Sina Orrell.

A Gun Accident.

William Brook and Peter McDonald last evening were standing in the road six miles this side of Scio, beside a gun, McDonald holding a gun when in some manner not exactly understood the gun was discharged. At the time Brook, only a few feet away was leaning over, and the full load hit him in the left shoulder with a downward inclination, cutting the collar bone in two and shattering the shoulder blade, the contents lodging further down in the body.

A hole big enough to put an egg in was made. Dr. Hill was sent for and attended him, dressing the wound. Mr. Brook is lying in a critical condition with chances against his recovery.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

Brakeman McFadden Has a Narrow Escape.

SILVERTON, Or., Oct. 9.—Brakeman McFadden had a narrow escape from death today while making a "fly" at McKee station. He was thrown from a flat car into a cattle guard and knocked out of this onto the ties, and then was rolled and dragged 10 or 15 feet. Mr. McFadden was brought to this city, and Doctor Brooks says he has sustained no fractures, and if not internally injured will be able to be out in a few days. Mr. McFadden is a son of the late Engineer McFadden who was killed in the Lake Labish wreck a few years ago.

DIED.—Calvin Butler, aged 29 years, died today at his home in this city, from Addison's disease of the kidneys. He leaves a wife and a daughter. This disease is very rare. Mr. Butler has, through the ravages of this malady, passed in color from that of a white man to the dark brown of a mulatto, but only on his face and hands, where the skin was exposed to the air. He has been afflicted for about three years. He came to Oregon about six months ago from Lafayette, Indiana, in the hopes of finding relief. The remains will be shipped to his former home.
