# RUSSIANS IN CHINA.

## Anarchists Very Active in the United States.

### BOERS MAKE ANOTHER CAPTURE.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—October flax has advanced to \$1.78.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The anarchists in America appear to be very discontented, and during the unrest of the present political times are taking occasion to let their passions control their actions largely. Another plot has been unearthed by detectives here. As usual the plans frustrated included death to prominent men.

The plot checked by the detectives in this instance was one which aimed to assassinate the next president of the United States, whether it be McKinley or Bryan. From this it is evident that the anarchists do not feel that they have a grievance which the election of either favorite would heal, but that the restraint of law is irksome.

### LIPTON'S PORK.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Lord Lipton controls practically all the pork in the United States, having made his purchases quietly and without the object becoming known until it was too late to check the corner.

### TRAIN AMBUSHED.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Lord Roberts reports that a train carrying supplies for the British troops was ambushed by the Boers, who captured and looted the same. Of the military guard on the train with the supplies eight were killed and 11 captured.

### RUSSIANS IN CHINA.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 11.—Russian troops are occupying a number of towns in Manchuria without opposition. The imperial party is moving southward in large forces.

### FATAL GAS EXPLOSION.

One Man Killed and Another Seriously Injured.

ALBANY, Or, Oct. 11.—While removing an acetylene gas machine from the basement of the Apex saloon this forenoon at 10:35 an explosion occurred, almost instantly killing S Stoltz, a tinner, and badly injuring Fred Reese, proprietor of the saloon.

Stoltz and Reese went into the basement of the saloon together with a lighted candle, supposing that the gas machine was empty, as it had not been used for several months.

When Stoltz removed the cover from the can an explosion took place. A piece of the tank struck Stoltz over the heart, making a large hole. He lived but a few minutes. Reese was seriously injured about the head but may live.

Stoltz leaves a wife. He carried no life insurance.

### HEAVY RAILROAD FILLS.

To Be Made on the Springfield-Natron Branch.

HARRISBURG, Oct. 11.—The steam shovel that is working in the gravel pit here will soon be moved to Coburg.

As soon as the river raises it will drive the shovel out of the gravel pit and then the Railroad Co. will use this shovel on the fill for the McKenzie river bridge at Coburg and at the trestle, 2 1/2 miles east of Springfield. The McKenzie bridge fill is a very large one, being about one-half mile long and will average about 10 feet in height, and it is estimated it will take the shovel and train about three months to complete the fill.

### THE CAR FAMINE.

Will Soon Be Relieved—300 Empty Tires Enroute.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 11.—The car famine on S P lines in Oregon will soon be relieved for a while. There are now about 300 empty cars en route here. The first of these will begin to arrive at once, and will be distributed immediately.

### Nebraska Corn Plentiful.

OMAHA, Oct. 10.—The corn crop this year is plentiful and the ears are splendidly matured. It has been estimated by the Nebraska Grain Men's Association that there will be a yield of 280,000,000 bushels.

### MORE HOPS SOLD.

One Lot Brought 14 Cents and the Other 14 1/2.

WOODBURN, Oct. 10.—George Fry has sold 102 bales of hops of choice quality at 14 cents. Joe Go sold 101 bales of choice at 14 cents. From Hubbard this week there have been shipped 553 bales of hops, contract and purchase, also 120 boxes of apples, grapes and pears for Juneau, Alaska.

Four hundred bales of hops were shipped Monday and yesterday from Woodburn. Some were contracted, others were of recent purchase. While growers are holding for 15 cents to be offered, the situation remains the same, and some are losing patience, but not all hope.

### Hops.

James Winstanley, of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association has received a letter from S W Moore, of Onelda, New York, a well known hop man of that state, which speaks encouragingly of prices. The text of the letter is as follows:

"We have exceedingly good hops in this state this year with the exception of a little rust in some localities. Even with the acreage reduced about 1500 in this state, we have nearly as many hops as we had last year.

"There have been a few sales at 13c to 15c, but most growers are holding for 20c.

"I notice by Messrs W H & H LeMay's report of London that the crop there is very short and that after careful figuring on the amount of hops that we can spare to ship there, and a liberal estimate on the Germany shipments, that England will be short 300,000 cwt of their actual requirements as compared with the amount they used last year.

"It seems to me that if hops will ever be worth 20c to 25c it should be this year. If not, there is very little encouragement for growers to continue to produce them."

N A W Howe vs U B Johnson et al, foreclosure. Referee of referee—for trial.

S M Douglas et al vs H R Kincaid et al, injunction. Decree in accordance with complaint.

Letitia F Hembree vs Catherine Smith et al, foreclosure. Default Decree of foreclosure. Judgment for \$538.16 and \$18.16 paid for taxes, interest at 10 per cent and \$50 atty fee.
