Roseburg's Bad Streets.

Roseburg has the worst streets of any town of any importance in Oregon. The Review says that on account of doubt as to the power of the council to make assessments for street improvements the streets will go unimproved, at least until another season. The Review adds:

"As a result, the town will probably lose more the coming year by people who come here with a view to locating, deciding to go to some more progressive point, than the proposed improvements would cost to say nothing of the convenience and comfort of those located or doing business here."

Gilt-Edge Hops Bring 15 3-4 Cents.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 15.—It is reported tonight that 2-0 bales of gilt-edge hops were sold in Salem today at 15 3-4 cents. The sale, if made as reported, has but little bearing on the price of what are called choice hops.

FROM IJIVSON.—A correspondent says: "Another bridge broke down last Sunday near the old Chastain place, letting James Crow and family of Hadleyville with his wagon and team into the canyon below. No one was hurt seriously but Mr. Crow was bruised some about the ribs. It was a narrow escape for the people. This makes the fourth or fifth bridge on this road that has broken down with very narrow escapes. As I have said many times before, the court should order fills made wherever it can be done, instead of so many shanghai bridges. The money that is paid for covering the bridges would nearly always pay for the filling."

CHINA REBELLION.

May Effect the Interests of the United States.

AMERICANS RECEIVE PRIZE MONEY.

MARKET IS STRONG.

F. Levy Sold His Hops at 15 3-4 Cents Yesterday.

Tuesday's Salem Statesman.

The hop market yesterday remained very strong with prices higher than have been paid in Salem for many years. Growers are well pleased with the outlook, and many who were holding for 15 cents last week are not anxious to sell at this figure now. Many of them are placing a price of 16 cents upon their product, being very hopeful of reaching it. McKinley Mitchell, a well known hop merchant, is reported to have refused 15 cents for his hops but says he will take 16c. He is also reported to have said that it was his opinion hops would sell for 20 cents before the end of the year. President M. L. Jones, of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association, said, yesterday, that the price of hops is ranging from 15 to 15 1/2 cents and he felt confident there would be no rush about selling at that price. The highest price paid yesterday was for a choice lot 200 bales belonging to F. Levy, of this city; the price paid was 15 1/2 cents, the highest paid this year for Oregon hops, so far as reported.

The United States snag boat, Mathlons is on the beach near Rainier, on the Columbia river, where she will lay until temporary repairs are made to her hull. The boat was engaged in pulling snags near Rainier. Several days ago she made fast to one and tried to remove it, when a strain was put on it, however, the snag broke and the portion that stayed beneath the water bumped against the bottom of the Mathlons, breaking a hole in the boat.

GOV. HILL PREDICTS.

He Says Bryan Will Carry New York and Indiana.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 16.—Gov. Hill concluded an address to 15,000 people here yesterday with an eulogy of Bryan and declared that New York and Indiana would return to the democratic ranks this year, electing Mr. Bryan. The largest meeting held in four years was the one today.

An Oregon Pioneer of 1852.

HOOD RIVER, Oct. 15.—Madison N. Foley, a pioneer of 1852, Indian War veteran and well known throughout Oregon, died at his home near this place September 29, aged 64 years. He was born in Springfield, Mo., April 25, 1836, and crossed the plains to Oregon with his parents in 1852. Dr. Foley, his father, died at Eugene in 1889, at the age of 103. Deceased was a teamster in the Logan River Indian war. He lived in Lane county until 1866, when he went to Crook, and followed the sheep business until 1891. Since that time he resided in the Hood River valley, and engaged in strawberry-growing. He leaves a widow and six children—Robert E. Abraham N. Winthrop A. Bernice, Melville J. and Mary E.

Long Tom Drawbridge Accepted.

Corvallis, Or., Oct. 16.—The drawbridge at Bundy crossing of the Long Tom was accepted by the Commissioner's Court at an adjourned session Saturday. The bridge has also been accepted by the United States. Its construction was made necessary on account of removal, at the instance of the Federal Government, of wagon bridges, in order to open the Long Tom to steamboat navigation. Construction work commenced last Spring, but much time was lost in perfecting the model, so that the draw could be handled with the required time, and the structure was only recently completed. The entire cost was \$937.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

The Lane County Coroner Comes Near Getting a Job

PIONEER AND SOLDIERS.

Monument for Charnel Mulligan—Fountain for Second Oregon Dead.

At the time of the dedication of the Lane county court house resolutions were passed recommending that the county court erect a suitable monument over the grave of Charnel Mulligan, who, with Eugene Skinner donated land for the county square. The board acted in compliance with the resolution and the monument ordered was received today by W W Martin.

The emblem is of Vermont granite, having a base of the same material, all of which will be mounted on a substantial foundation of native stone. After the appropriate lettering has been done the monument will be placed in position over the grave of the departed pioneer in the I O O F cemetery near Springfield.

Mr Martin has practically closed arrangements for the erection of a memorial fountain to the Second Oregon Lane county dead, in the city park, which worthy move was inaugurated and has been carried to a successful end by the W R P L. This drinking fountain will be nearly seven feet wide at the base having two square marble pillars on either side and rising above the marble receptacle which will receive the flow of water from a faucet above. Suspended above the pillars on artistic metal work will be placed a light.

On the sides of the pillars will be engraved the names of the Lane county boys who died in the Philippines.

"This Do Settle It."

Mayor T W Harris, of Eugene, writes as follows to the republican state committee:

"I feel sure that Lane county will give McKinley a good majority. Our people have never known prosperity so general as that they are now enjoying. There is, however, a most remarkable apathy on the part of the people generally. This I interpret favorably, for it seems to me that it is the result of general employment and contentment. The majority of the democrats who voted with us four years ago will do so again next month."
