

How Chinese Empress Escaped.

An oriental liner just arrived at Tacoma brings the news of the manner in which the Chinese court escaped from Pekin:

"It appears that in accordance with the regular practice of the Chinese officials in similar cases, false reports of suppositious victories over the allies were persistently rendered to the palace, with the result that the court was lulled into a feeling of fancied security and it was not until the allies had actually entered the capital that the real facts became known to the empress and a run'e awakening took place.

"On the early morning of the 15th of August the downger, in company with the emperor, left the palace clothed in common Chinese cotton garments, traveling in an ordinary Chinese cart, and accompanied with an insignificant retinue. Such was the hurry of their departure that no money or valuables of any quantity were taken with them, and for several days the imperial party is said to have suffered the greatest hardship. The only food with which they were supplied was the common millet of the country, and at night they had to sleep in wayside inns on the rough brick kiangs furnished for the accommodation of travelers."


