

AFTER THE SUCKERS.

Telegraphic dispatches from different European financial centers the day before election told how capitalists were anxiously awaiting the reelection of President McKinley before making further investments. Since his election is assured no word of any mad scramble for American securities has come to hand. It reminds us of the experience of a commercial traveler related to the writer not long since:

The drummer was caught in an Idaho country town one summer Sunday. A horse-race was to be run, and men were riding up and down the street at a furious pace offering all kinds of bets. It appeared to the drummer that the people were staking all their possessions. This went on for a couple of hours, and still the race was not run, neither did anyone appear to know how it would go. At last the drummer got interested in looking at the horses, and when a native proposed to bet he put up \$20.

Presto, change! Then everybody knew how the race was going. Within ten minutes the riders were stripped and up, and the race run. The drummer lost his money.

All that capital-investment talk in the event of McKinley's election was simply to catch suckers.

RUSSIAN ADVANCEMENT.

Perhaps no country in the world today is making more gigantic effort for self-improvement or for commercial prosperity and supremacy than is Russia. In her daring plan of colonizing Siberia she has asked no outside help. No emigration agents have visited foreign shores with alluring promises to all sorts of people to settle within her borders.

Russia is colonizing Siberia with Russians, and seeing to it that the pioneers of Siberia are well stocked with farming utensils, seeds, and with fruit and nut-bearing trees suitable to the rigorous climate. Skilled men are sent out by the government from time to time to watch the effect of climate upon the new forests, fruits, cereals and vegetables, and to advise the pioneers of any errors in their style of planting.

CARNEGIE'S EXPERIMENT.

Andrew Carnegie's experimental fleet of five vessels sailed from Conneaut, Ohio, yesterday, bound for Europe, each loaded with 1000 tons of steel sent from Pittsburgh. The vessels are loaded to 14 feet draught. Each craft will tow a barge loaded with 1500 tons of wood pulp. They will go through the canal to St. Lawrence, and when Montreal is reached the pulp will be loaded on the vessels, which will then sail for Liverpool.

ELECTION NOTES.

California elects all republicans to congress. Senator Walcott, rep., of Colorado, is defeated.

Delaware legislature in doubt. Utah legislature is fusion.

The next congress will stand: Senate, 49 republicans, 27 democrats and 9 independents with 5 in doubt. House, 191 republicans, 140 democrats, 1 populist, 2 silverites and 23 in doubt.

President McKinley has returned to Washington.

English and German papers are pleased with McKinley's reelection. Wm J. Bryan has nothing to say yet. He is in receipt of thousands of telegrams and letters.

Minnesota—Governorship claimed by both parties. All else republican. Clark defeated the Standard Oil forces in Montana.

The total vote of Oregon will not be over 85,000. The only counties in the state carried by Bryan are: Baker by 125, Linn 40, Malheur 100, and Union 100. The Oregonian figures out McKinley a plurality of 14,212.

The republicans now claim Lane county by 500 plurality. Washington—Gov Rogers, dem., is re-elected. All the rest republican.

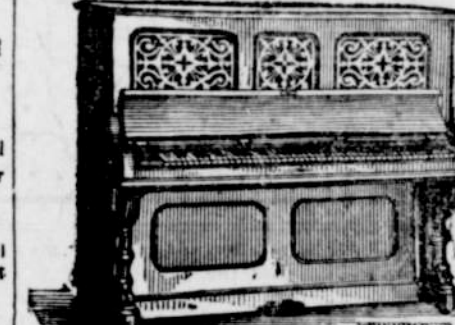
