James P. Cheshire Dead.

Daily Guard November 8

A telegram received by Mrs F A Rankin shortly after noon today conveyed the information that her father, James P Cheshire, died at Sodaville at 12:30 this afternoon, of pneumonia.

Mr Cheshire was one of the best known remaining pioneers of Lane county. He was born in Knox county, East Tennessee, in 1827, and was 73 years of age at the time of death. Was married in 1846 to Susan McConnell. Came to Oregon with the emigration of 1852, and to Lane county May, 1853, locating on Fern Ridge, west of Irving.

Fourteen children were born to the union, eleven of whom survive him.

Mr Cheshire moved to Eugene in 1884, purchasing a tract of the Skinner donation claim west of Skinner's Butte. He laid it off as an addition to the city of Eugene and built a home on a part reserved near the river.

The failing health of his wife induced him to remove to Sodaville, Linn county, in 1893, the water of the soda spring having proved of great benefit to Mrs Cheshire. He invested in Sodaville property to a considerable extent, and was elected a trustee of Mineral Springs College, an educational institution thereat.

James P Cheshire was a man of kindly impulses, upright and conscientious in every relation of life. A wide circle of acquaintances will learn with regret of his death, even though it came when the shadows fell far in the evening of life.

TRAIN WRECK

Two Men Killed and Four Injured on S P, Two Fatally.

COLLISION OF FREIGHT TRAINS

Special to the Guard.

ROSEBURG, Oregon, Nov. 8.—A terrible wreck occurred on the Southern Pacific about two miles south of this city at 6:45 this morning. It was a head-on collision between a regular freight and an extra freight, and while little is said at this time owing to the excitement of the sad accident it is understood that the collision was caused by one train going out without orders.

Engineer Sam Hendricks and Fireman Arthur Wilhelm were both killed, while Engineer Walter Drennan and Brakeman Campbell were fatally injured and Fireman Ed Riddle badly injured.

People who arrived at the scene of the accident shortly after it occurred, pronounce the wreck and incident loss of life, one of the most terrible events which has occurred for years on the road. The killed and injured were frightfully maimed and mangled.

A special train carrying the injured employees, physicians and nurses left at 1 o'clock this afternoon for Portland where hospital treatment will be provided.

Wrecking crews have already begun work clearing the track for the passage of through trains, but it is not known when a train can be expected. The telegraph lines are also broken stopping communication to through points.

The cause of the accident will be at once investigated by Southern Pacific authorities to establish the blame, if any exists.

AFTER MANY YEARS

A Romance of Youth Brought Marriage in Old Age.

Mrs Ruth B Maxham, of Roxbury, Connecticut, arrived in Albany last evening and was united in marriage to Mr C B Green of this county. Mr and Mrs Green were schoolmates. Each got married and located in different parts of the United States. Mr Green coming to Oregon. Their companions died, when after several years they began a correspondence resulting in this marriage. The New York World gives the following account of the affair.

"Mrs Maxham, whose maiden name was Ruth Bradford, was born at Northfield, Vermont. When she was a little girl of six years a boy named Charles Green, an orphan, nine years old, was taken into the home of her parents and the children were brought up together. When Green became a young man he discovered that he was in love with the playmate of his childhood, and wished to marry her. She would not consent, and a few months later met Volney Maxham and married him.

"Green went to the civil war and when he returned married a young woman in an adjoining town and moved to Oregon. Mr and Mrs Maxham came to Hartford about 25 years ago and have lived here ever since. Mr Maxham dying last March. Through all these years Mrs Maxham corresponded with her playmate of childhood, and as Mrs Green died three years ago, he renewed his offer of marriage, this time being successful.

"Mr Green is sixty-one years old and Mrs Maxham is fifty-eight."
