

KENTUCKY ELECTORAL VOTE.

The chairman of the Kentucky Republican campaign committee gives out the statement that there will be no contest over the electoral vote in that state. The reason is that President McKinley has enough votes without Kentucky. However the chairman calls the vote in question, and avers that there is no tribunal in the state from which a fair hearing could be obtained. Such charges come with very bad grace so soon after the political assassination of Governor Goebel.

The casting of the electoral vote of the state, except one, for President McKinley four years ago is sufficient answer to the charges of fraud. If the Democrats have stolen the state this time they certainly would have been able to steal it four years ago when the electoral vote was given President McKinley by the narrow plurality of 281.

McKinley orators told the truth. The election of McKinley has brought prosperity—to trusts, stockbrokers and stock—gamblers. Those Lane county farmers especially, who voted for prosperity, will be glad to learn that the Standard Oil corporation, the stock of which is owned by half a dozen men, reaped FIVE MILLION DOLLARS profit through the election.

Is not this sudden increase in trust stock valuations sufficient evidence to convince the farmer that he was bunched when he voted for McKinley and "prosperity?"

THE PERCENTAGE VOTE.

Those papers that are making such an outcry about McKinley carrying almost every northern state are respectfully asked to explain how much better, so far as the intention of voters is concerned, are the 850,000 votes for McKinley in New York than the 700,000 for Bryan? Or the 20,000 plurality in Indiana where nearly three-quarters of a million votes were cast?

The majority elects, but the percentage difference in the votes cast for the two candidates is quite small. Figured in proportion Bryan got 90 votes to McKinley's every 108 in New York, and 98 to 102 in Indiana. And several other leading northern states cast about the same proportionate vote.
