MOHAWK BRANCH.

Nearly Ready for the Operating Department.

PORTLAND, Nov. 10.—The Mohawk branch of the Southern Pacific railroad from Springfield to Wendline, in Lane county, will shortly be turned over to the operating department. The ballasting, or graveling of the roadbed will not be done until spring.

No regular train service will be had this winter, nor anything except lumber shipments.

Civil engineer Freeland, who has had charge of the work will return to California as soon as the road is turned over to the operating department.

Funeral of Trainman.

Roseburg, Or., Nov. 9.—The funeral obsequies over the remains of Engineer Samuel Hendricks, who was killed in the head-end train collision near this city Thursday, were held this afternoon, the Rev. Father Butgen officiating. An immense concourse of people was present, and the floral offerings were profuse and beautiful. Six Southern Pacific engineers and firemen acted as pallbearers, while the local railway orders attended the services in a body. Interment was in the Catholic cemetery.

Bryan's Plans.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 9.—W J Bryan is in receipt of many requests for a statement of his future plans, and his attitude on public questions in view of Tuesday's results. He intimated today that before long he would enlighten the public fully, but for the present he has private matters which demand his attention.

A Baker City man tried to have the U S court stop the publication of a paper there because it was saying things detrimental to the man and his mining interests. Judge Bellinger knocked the plaintiff out in the first round by declaring that the court is not a press censor and cannot supervise the publication of newspapers.

THE ROSEBURG COLLISION.

Three Dead and Two in a Critical Condition—Trains Crashed Together at Full Speed.

Portland Telegram, Nov. 9.

"Brakeman Campbell, another of the victims of the Southern Pacific wreck near Roseburg, died last evening at the Good Samaritan hospital. This makes three dead. Engineer Drennan is at St Vincent's hospital, in a critical condition. He has not been conscious since the wreck. Edward Riddle, the injured fireman, is at the Good Samaritan hospital, with small hope of recovery."

"It is given out from an official source that the cause of the wreck lay with the crew of the extra, which evidently entirely overlooked the schedule time of the regular, the latter having the right of way to Green station, the next station south of Roseburg, where the two trains were to pass each other."

"Everything seemed to combine to make the wreck an unusually disastrous one. It occurred upon a curve and in a fog, where neither of the crews could see the other, until the heavy engines driven forward by the weight behind crashed into each other at full speed. Evidence of the wreck showed that the impact must have been something terrific. The big iron machines literally ground each other to pieces. It seems a miracle that the engineer and fireman of the extra escaped instant death. Twisted and broken iron and steel and splintered wood were piled together in an undistinguishable mass."

A Coast Rattlesnake.

For some reason rattlesnakes do not frequent the coast side of the Coast mountains. The Marshfield News, however, has an account of the killing of one. It says:
"J D Magee, of Ten Mile, was in town yesterday, and called at this office to show us the rattlesnake which he killed last summer. The snake was 4 feet, 2 inches long, and was killed close to the house where the children were playing. A rattlesnake had never been seen in this section before, and residents are at a loss to account for the presence of this one here. Mr Magee suggests that it must have floated down the Umpqua on some drift wood, and crossed over the hills from the river. The snake when discovered made no attempt to defend itself—it never even coiled; in fact it seemed to have lost all energy."

THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

A Sketch of Its History and Condition Written for the Tribune.

The University of Oregon by an act of the state legislature was founded and located at Eugene in 1872, and was opened for the reception of students in 1876. The management of its affairs is placed in the hands of a board of regents appointed for a term of 12 years by the governor of the state and confirmed by the senate. The board of regents confers such degrees and grants such diplomas as other universities are wont to confer and grant. The permanent endowment of the university consists of \$100,000, realized from the sale of land granted to the state by the general government for the purpose of establishing a university. A fund of \$50,000 was generously donated the university by Henry Villard and an annual appropriation from the senate.

The University of Oregon is located at Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, 125 miles south of Portland on the Southern Pacific railroad. Eugene is the county seat of Lane county and has between 4000 and 5000 inhabitants. The university campus lies southeast of Eugene about one mile from the post office and contains 18 acres of land.

Deady hall was built part by the citizens of Lane county and finished by the state. It is of brick, standing three stories high above its basement. The second building is Villard hall also of brick but has a concrete finish on the outside. It stands but two stories above its basement. The third building was erected in 1889 at a cost of about \$4500 for a gymnasium. It contains the most approved apparatus for exercise. A brick observatory on an eminence convenient to the University has been erected at a cost of \$400. The three story brick dormitory and the sciences hall have been put up within recent years.

The University has about \$2000 worth of mathematical instruments. Students in surveying and engineering by means of solar compass and engineers' transit can become acquainted with practical field work in this department. Students in astronomy have access to any of the instruments necessary to their work. The apparatus belonging to the department of physics and chemistry has cost the University more than \$3000. It has excellent laboratories for any of the sciences.

Some laws important to students. (This has been for the most part done away with, but was strictly adhered to in the beginning.) They are forbidden to enter a brewery or saloon; drink any intoxicating liquors without medical advice; use tobacco in any form around the buildings; carry concealed weapons; use profane language; attend skating rinks, public or private dances; injure the property of the University; remain from room later than 11 o'clock p.m. A student having been expelled from the university or college in Oregon will not be received in this institution.

The faculty first consisted of John W Johnson, president and professor in Greek and Latin; Mark Bailey, professor of mathematics; Thomas Condon, professor of geology and natural history; Mary S Spiller principal of intermediate department; Elizabeth Boise, assistant. Now the faculty consists of almost eight times that number. The library in 1893 contained about 4000 volumes, part of which were bought by \$1000 given by Henry Villard. The annual sum coming from the Villard fund for purchase of books is \$430.

BRYAN ON THE ELECTION.

Prosperity Argument the Most Potent One for Republicans.

From a statement given out by Mr Bryan at Lincoln, Nebraska, November 8, we take extracts:
"The result was a surprise to me, and the magnitude of the republican victory was a surprise to our opponents, as well as those who voted our ticket."

"The prosperity argument was probably the most potent one used by the republicans. They compared present conditions with the panic times of '83 to '86, and this argument had weight with those who did not stop to consider the reasons for the change."

"The appeal, 'Stand by the president while the war is on,' had a great influence among those who did not realize that a war against a doctrine of self-government in the Philippines must react upon us in this country. We made an honest fight upon an honest platform, and having done our duty we saw it, we have nothing to regret."

Mr Bryan says he has no other plans at present than to remain at home, where he returned from the fatiguing campaign. He denied the report that he would remove from Nebraska and make Texas his home.

"I have come out of the campaign with perfect health and a clear conscience. I did my utmost to bring success to the principles for which I stood."
