

THE OTHER SIDE.

Monday we gave a clipping from the Daily Register advocating straight political tickets for city elections. We republished it, together with some Salem expression of opinion taken from a column of somewhat similar indorsements in the Salem Daily Journal:

REGISTER OPINION

"Salem is going to put a straight Republican ticket in the field for its coming city election. The proper thing to do. Best results are always accomplished by the election of men who agree politically. There is always a harmony of interests that cannot be had from a mixed ticket, as witness in Eugene. Many improvements and progressive steps are thwarted because of wrangles largely due to political differences. If men agree politically they are more often harmonious in matters of general good to the community."

THE OTHER SIDE.

The name of Judge R. P. Boise has been connected with the highest courts of Oregon's judiciary nearly continuously for a third of a century. Here is what Judge Boise says:

"The record will show that city affairs managed as a part of a political machine has been a dismal failure, and managing it as at present, with politics left out and business put in, has been a decided success. I want to see the present business method continued."

Ask Eugene bankers as to the standing of Ladd & Bush, Salem bankers. They will tell you that their integrity and their bank have as firm foundation as that of Skinner's Butte. Here is what Ladd & Bush says about the Salem non-partisan administration:

"Let us continue it by all means. It is not a matter that admits of question. When they came in power we were running in debt about \$1000 a month. That has been stopped and there has been liberal saving besides. It would be business madness to return to the old order of things."

The Register's "best results" from "the election of men who agree politically" seems not to have commended itself to Salem's veteran jurist and bankers.

THE OREGON'S VICTORY OVER CALIFORNIA.

The victory of the University of Oregon football team over that of its big sister university down on San Francisco Bay was so complete and positive that we cannot forbear republishing most pertinent extracts from San Francisco papers, republished in the GUARD Tuesday. Here is the Chronicle:

"The University of California football team was defeated on its own campus yesterday afternoon for the first time in the ten years of Coast intercollegiate matches. The University of Oregon's little middle-weight eleven, six of them freshmen, struck the body blow to Berkeley's hopes of a clean record for this season."

"Probably in all Berkeley's campus history there was never such a disheartened and subdued crowd about the gridiron field. A little State University with 300 students had outplayed a great State University with 2300 students."

The Chronicle effectually disposes of the California excuse that mud caused their defeat:

"The conditions should have favored California. It outweighed Oregon twelve pounds to the man. Weight should count on a heavy field. The mud was as adhesive as dough. It was a bigger natural handicap to the little Oregonians than to the stronger Californians. Oregon was used to slime and watery mud, but had never before plodded in moist adobe. Persistent punting and superior generalship secured Oregon's victory."

The Examiner: "... For the first time in three years the football eleven of the University of California was scored against and defeated by the sturdy little Web footers from the University of Oregon."

OREGON "ROOTERS."

The San Francisco Call cartoon of scenes in the Universities of Oregon-California football game, at Berkeley, said "Fred Fisk was there with his voice." And the Examiner account of the game gave much credit to the little band of rooters that shouted themselves hoarse for Oregon—and had

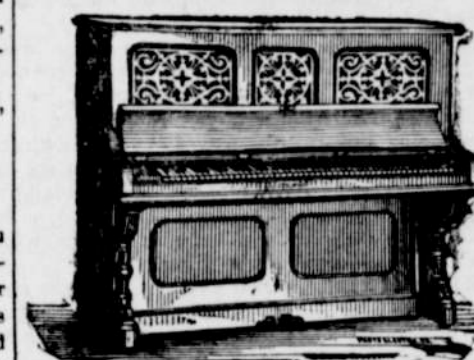
