Hops.

Today's Oregonian.
The Oregon hop moved out with a rush this season, and out of a total of nearly 90,000 bales, not to exceed 6000 bales remain on hand. But few if any of these are equal in quality to the export stock that has been shipped foreign, but they are still of very good quality, and will bring under present conditions of the market about 12 1/2 to 14 1/2 cents per pound. All of the old crop is out of the way. The Waterville Times printed in the heart of the New York hop district, under date of Nov 18, says:

There has not been much doing since election, and the reason attributed is that the holders of the remaining lots are very firm, refusing the offers made by buyers. One buyer said he has offered 17 cents for several lots recently and was unable to get them. Offers of 18 cents have also been refused. It is evident that those who have a fine hop are going to hold out for 20 cents for a few weeks, at least. H H Davis of Beaneboro, sold 13 bales at 15 cents recently. In and near Madison, within a few days, Thomas Finnegan sold 80 bales at 15 1/2 cents; Harry Reynolds, 45 at 15 1/2 cents; Allen Curtis, 18 at 15 cents, and Samuel Brownell, 12 at 15 cents.

The grand president addressed the meeting on the progress of the order and offered many valuable plans and suggestions for the future.

"Skinner's Cabin is one of the most flourishing in the state, and the members all take a lively interest in the order, and in carrying out plans for its benefit. A splendid banquet was served for the refreshment of the members and their honored guest, at which stirring addresses were made by F M Williams, president of the cabin; C S Williams, Judge Wintermiller, L L Campbell, L T Harris and others.

"The cabins of both Native Sons and Native Daughters at Eugene are taking an active interest in plans for promoting the success of the order during the year 1901, and have in contemplation a 10 days' celebration in Portland for the purpose of securing funds to erect a monument to the pioneers."

A Grand Slaughter of Ducks.

Ashland Tidings.
"According to a letter from E V Carter of Ashland to Game Warden Quimby, thousands of ducks are being illegally killed in Klamath county. Mr Carter says: 'The railroad men running south from here inform me that large shipments of ducks are being made from Ager, Cal, to the San Francisco market, and that these ducks are killed in Oregon, delivered at Merrill and sent down to Ager from there. I am told that one day last week a single shipment of 6000 pounds was made.' 'A copy of the letter has been sent to Superintendent Ormsby of the forest reserve, probably for the reason that much of the duck shooting in question is done on the Cascade reserve, in the vicinity of Pelican bay, who says that the only way to put a stop to this illegal shooting would be to station a game warden there, which he is not prepared to do.'"

New York Apples.

The Oregonian says: "A few days ago a barrel of Winesap and Blue Pearmain apples arrived here all the way from New York, consigned to F C Barnes, a present from some friend in that state. Samples of the fruit can be seen at the permanent exhibit, having been presented to Colonel Bosch for comparison with Oregon apples. The apples are sound and firm and of good color and appearance, but in size they are much inferior to Oregon apples of the same varieties.

"Just what idea influenced the sender of the apples is not known, but he probably thought that they had better apples in old New York state than could be raised way out in Oregon, but he did he was very much mistaken."

WILL CLOSE THE GAP.

Southern Pacific Will Save Ninety Miles on Mohawk Lumber.

Oregonian November 22.

The two miles of new road which the Southern Pacific is preparing to build to connect the Woodburn-Natron branch with the main line at Henderson Station, a short distance south of Eugene, will really be a part of the Mohawk branch, which now leaves the Woodburn-Natron road at a point about half way between Springfield and Natron. The new Mohawk branch was built chiefly to carry lumber out, that being a heavily timbered country. The market for the lumber is in California. As it now stands, the lumber is brought down the Mohawk from Wendling and then, instead of going to the main line track for California, it must be dragged 40 miles down the Willamette valley to Tallman Junction, thence eight miles across to Albany, thence 45 miles back up the valley to Henderson. Thus must 94 miles be traversed to get to a point but two miles distant from the junction of the Mohawk branch.

A quite expensive bridge must be built, however, to span the main channel of the Willamette and close the gap between the Mohawk branch and the main line. This is likely to throw the completion of the road over till next spring.
