A HORRIBLE DEED.

An Escaped Insane Man Blew Off His Head With Dynamite.

A Baker City dispatch of Nov. 29, relates the strange deed of George Ellis, an insane Baker county mine: "Ellis was on the road to the insane asylum, and escaped the officers having him in charge. For 40 days he completely disappeared. Yesterday it was reported to Sheriff Huntington that the decomposing body of a man, believed to be that of Ellis, was in the prospect tunnel he had driven on his own property near Weatherby. Coroner Snow was immediately notified, and went to the scene, where an inquest was held.

"The evidence at the inquest revealed one of the most tragic deaths known in this county. Ellis had apparently gone into the tunnel and exploded a stick of dynamite near the mouth, throwing down two or three tons of earth and completely blocking the way. At the top he succeeded in working out a small loophole, and through this pointed his rifle. Then, through the insane fear of his recapture, or when he realized he was imprisoned, he took another stick of dynamite and blew his head from the body. When the corpse was discovered there was but little more than the neck on the trunk."

HARVEY ACQUITTED.

A Roseburg Jury Finds Defendant Not Guilty.

Harvey charged with the rape of Winnie Thorne, of Cottage Grove, some months ago, returned a verdict today of "not guilty," and was discharged from custody this afternoon. It will be remembered that young Patterson, of Albany, was convicted and sent to the penitentiary for the same crime. Attorneys L. Biley, of Eugene, and J. S. Medley, of Cottage Grove, appeared for the defendant.

LEG BROKEN

Sam Conrad Meets With Accident on Siuslaw.

Will White, driver on Bangs' Siuslaw stage line, brought in word last night of an accident which occurred in the logging camp of Sutherland, Frazer & Griffin, by which Sam Conrad, a young man about 22 years of age had a leg broken below the knee and his ankle crushed by a log.

Conrad was not employed by the above firm but was for some reason in their camp. The details of the accident were not furnished by the driver from the lower run to White, so little is known save that the injuries are as stated above, and that it may be necessary to amputate the injured limb.

Dr. Atwood and Jas. Honig, the boy's uncle, went out this morning to the scene of the accident, and the intention is to bring the injured boy to town for treatment.

ARMY WORM UNINJURED.

Recent Freeze Not Severe Enough to Destroy the Pupae of the Pest.

TACOMA, Nov. 24.—County Fruit Inspector C. A. Tonnison, who has been making an investigation, says the recent freeze has not killed the pupae of the army worm, which last summer devastated the crops in the Puget Sound basin and all up and down the Pacific Coast. Mr. Tonnison says it will take a cold snap that will freeze the ground at least three inches deep to destroy the chrysalis of this pest. The worm penetrated the ground to a depth of two inches before going into the pupae state, and unless a hard freeze comes that will kill the germ of life in these pupae in their subterranean retreats, they will hatch out as a large moth next spring, which will cover vegetation with eggs, that will, in turn, hatch out into the army worm ready to make sad havoc of everything green.

C. V. Piper, entomologist at the Pullman Agricultural college, is making a special study of this pest with a view of ascertaining how agriculturists can best meet its inroads on crops. The chances of the pupae surviving through the winter are altogether too good for the anxious farmer, as freezes usually follow snow, and the ground beneath this warm blanket is rarely frozen an inch deep. On this account Mr. Tonnison and others who have given the matter thought are of the opinion that the worms will be well housed during the coming winter and will make their appearance next summer with ravenous appetites and plenty of hustle.

The Acme.

Florence West.

The steamer Acme, now being built at San Francisco to ply between that place and the Siuslaw, will be ready for work about the 15th of April. This boat will be fitted with the latest devices for prompt and efficient work, being lighted throughout with electricity and having engines of 500 horse power. Her length is 163 feet, beam 34 feet, and she will draw about 9 feet of water when loaded with 350,000 feet of lumber, and 11 feet when loaded with 500,000 feet.

She will make weekly trips after being placed on the run between Florence and San Francisco, and the people of Siuslaw will reap great advantages from the expeditions manner in which the "Acme" will handle all work entrusted to it. We look forward to the time when the Siuslaw will have better carrying service and think this will be accomplished when the Siuslaw Lumber Co's boat is placed in regular service.

THE HARVEY CASE.

It Has Been On Trial at Roseburg Again.

The case of the State against B. F. Harvey, charged with the crime of rape, was then called. The case is the somewhat celebrated railroad case in which Winnie Thorne, of Cottage Grove, was the alleged victim of members of a freight train crew. At a previous term of court, Hugh Patterson, a brakeman, was convicted and is now serving a term in the penitentiary. Harvey was tried before but the jury disagreed, and the evidence which has been detailed in the Review several times is being gone over again. District Attorney Brown and Deputy L. T. Harris appear for the State and Attorney L. Biley and J. S. Medley for the defendant. Nearly all of the jury-men examined had read of the case in the Review, and the lawyers spent much time in endeavoring to find out if they had formed an opinion as to guilt or innocence of the accused. The schooner Sacramento, which sailed from San Francisco for this place several weeks ago, reached the Siuslaw river Saturday afternoon after a very momentous voyage, having had her sails blown away during a severe storm and the damage repaired at Astoria. Attempting to sail in after her arrival here, she landed on the middle spit, but got off that night and drifted into the river with the loss of her rudder. After discharging her cargo she was placed on the ways for repairs.
