CREAMERY FOR JUNCTION CITY.

Machinery Has Arrived and Is Being Installed.

JUNCTION CITY, Or., Nov. 28.—The Weatherly Creamery Company, of Portland, will establish a creamery here. The machinery has arrived and is being set up in the Gilbert block, which building the company has leased for five years. The plant will be in operation inside of 10 days. The price paid to those who furnish the cream is 22 cents for each pound of butter made. Creamery butter is selling here at 50 cents per roll; country butter, 40 cents.

Plan to Blow Up General Roberts.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—According to a special edition of the Evening Standard today, a plot to assassinate General Roberts, in which two foreigners are concerned, has been discovered. It appears that the conspirators loaded a mine, which was designed to be blown up Sunday while General Roberts was in church at Johannesburg, but the police and General Roberts' body guard frustrated the conspiracy. Ten men, mostly Italians, have been arrested.

RUSHING CRIMINAL BUSINESS.

Six Douglas County Prisoners Plead Guilty Monday Forenoon.

Roseburg Review, Nov. 28.

"This morning, shortly after court convened, six prisoners in the county jail were arraigned and plead guilty in quick succession. These were Bert Bice, a mere boy, who was charged with stealing a horse from Wm Howard, near Myrtle Creek. He was captured by Sheriff Withers in Lane county, and the stolen animal recovered. Quite likely he will go to the reform school where he now has two brothers, who were guilty of a similar crime. Bice, however, wishes to go to the penitentiary, so he says, so he can learn the blacksmiths trade.

"Patrick Murphy, Patrick Quinn and Thomas Brennan, three young tramps, who were supposed to have burglarized the house of Mrs W H Brown at Oakland, on the 25th of last August, all plead guilty to receiving stolen goods. They were caught at Albany in the act of trafficking of the articles of jewelry which were identified as belonging to Mrs Brown.

"Frank Grogan and John Kelly, the men who confessed to entering Engineer E J Stroud's house in this city with the intention of burglarizing, until frightened out by a shot from Mr Stroud's pistol, plead guilty to the charge against them."

Judge Hamilton passed sentence on the prisoners this afternoon at 1 o'clock.

Corvallis-Eugene Motor.

The scheme of building a motor road from this city to Eugene, which has been discussed frequently in the papers of this section, but so far has not gotten beyond that stage, is again being talked of. The following appears in the associated dispatches of November 22, dated at Spokane Washington:

"Dr H S Wallace, of Junction City, Oregon, is here on his way from New York. He asserts that he has succeeded in placing \$400,000 worth of bonds in New York for the Corvallis and Southern railway, to be built from Corvallis to Eugene for the co-operative colony, and says work may begin any day."

Dr Wallace has been very active in his efforts to promote this enterprise, and as his trip to New York was for the purpose of placing bonds for this road, the scheme may yet assume a shape more tangible than figures and drawings.
