

HOW THE TURK GETS PROTECTION AND COUNTENANCE.

The Sultan gave Captain Chester of the United States battleship Kentucky a dinner at the Yildiz palace, Constantinople, Monday. The dispatch announcing the event naively says "his majesty's excessive display of friendliness is attributed to his desire to demonstrate that the visit of the Kentucky to Smyrna has produced no irritation." Why should it? The man responsible for the murder of thousands of defenseless Christian men, women and children, may well give thanks to his Allah for political jealousies of the powers as to the appropriation of Turkish territory, else his barbarous government would long ago have been quickly brought to a close with the penalty, perhaps, of being himself stood before a file of rifles.

Christian statesmen practically agree on the Chinese question, hence the murder of a few missionaries and a few thousand of their Chinese converts was visited with swift vengeance. And that is away over in Asia. Yet they have permitted the perpetration of untold horrors and murders, running well towards the hundreds of thousands, at their very doors. This nineteenth century statesmanship and civilization has no little room for progression.

THE GREATEST CANNON IN THE WORLD.

Admiral O'Neil, Chief of the Bureau of Ordnance, says that the new twelve-inch gun will produce a muzzle velocity of 3,000 feet per second.

Such tremendous energy, if carried by a shot of undiminished velocity, the experts say, would lift a 12,000-ton battleship four feet out of the water.

The latest improved twelve-inch gun of foreign make has produced a maximum velocity of only 2,600 feet at its muzzle. The new naval gun is not only superior to anything made abroad, but is more effective than the thirteen-inch gun now on American battle ships.

The thirteen-inch guns of the Oregon class have a maximum velocity of only 2,300 feet a second with smokeless powder.

The projectiles of this powerful gun are 850-pound pieces of steel. The enormous velocity of the gun will make it impossible for any armor now made to resist the impact.

With a velocity of only 2,800 feet this projectile will perforate Harvey armor 23.5 inches thick, and Krupp armor 20.4 inches thick.

THE SENATORIAL BATTLE.

"The battle for the Oregon senatorship to succeed McBride is taking form, and suites of rooms are already engaged at Hotel Willamette for at least three aspirants, and for twenty days on and after Friday, Jan 11th. The legislature meets on Monday the 14th.

"Ex-Senator Corbett, will be here and take personal charge of his candidacy. He will make an open fight for the honor, and cast aside all the manipulating and secret methods of the past. McBride is expected to be here, as well as Mitchell and Fulton. Governor Geer says in the most emphatic manner that he will not allow his name to be sprung as a candidate under any circumstance.

"There is a growing impression that the fight will really lie between Corbett and Mitchell, and that it will be a battle royal. The speakership will be kept out of the fight, if possible, as well as the presidency of the senate."

BRIEF AND TO THE POINT.

Governor Geer required 550 words to notify the people of the commonwealth that Thursday, November 29, 1900, had been set apart as a day of general Thanksgiving, while Governor Rogers, Union governor of Washington, made this brief announcement:

"In grateful recognition of the manifold blessings bestowed upon us as a people by the Giver of all Good, and in conformity with the time-honored usage, I, John R. Rogers, governor of the state of Washington, do hereby set apart Thursday, November 29, A. D. 1900, as a day of public Thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed with appropriate services by all. Let us in our homes and in our places of worship, render thanks to God for his abundant mercies."

BABER'S TROUBLES.

He is Thought to be 10,000 Bushels of Wheat Short, But Says He Will Pay Out.

For a week the GUARD has known that W. H. Baber, of Junction City, was in trouble over an apparent shortage of wheat in his warehouse, in fact he refused to turn out 4,000 bushels of wheat on G. C. Miller's warehouse receipt as he said he wanted to treat all alike. A meeting of the principal creditors was held and the warehouse was turned over Monday to Mr. Miller and the creditors to weigh out the wheat and report the shortage.

No legal proceedings were begun and hence the GUARD considered it a private matter and did not mention it. And it is now intended to settle the matter entirely out of court. As it has been published we will now give a short statement of the matter.

The weighers have now been working two or three days and think there is about 15,000 bushels of wheat in the warehouse and mill, while there should be about 25,000 bushels. The following are the heaviest holders of receipts: Eugene Loan & Saving Bank... 5000 bu G. C. Miller... 4500 " G. R. Christman... 2500 " J. E. Bover... 2000 " J. E. Bover heirs... 1500 " Mrs. Isaac Cook... 1400 " New & Embree... 1200 " R. A. Rampey... 1000 "

In addition to the above a number hold receipts from 100 to 700 bushels each, making the entire amount aggregate about 25,000 bushels.

It is the intention and agreement of the principal holders of receipts to divide the wheat on hand pro rata.

MR. BABER. W. H. Baber has been a resident of Lane and Lane counties for years and is regarded as an honest man. He failed a number of years ago but finally paid his creditors dollar for dollar although not compelled to do so. He has been in business in Junction City about 15 years.

Mr. Baber says last year and this year have been hard ones on warehousemen and farmers. Last year wet wheat was everywhere and this year a short crop. He lays his shortage to the wet wheat of last year, when he says the shrinkage was terrible, and then he was at heavy cost in moving it from bin to bin a number of times, to keep it from heating. He also states that he has never shipped a bushel of wheat away unless the receipt was presented.

WILL SETTLE IN FULL.

Again, Mr. Baber says he will turn all his property over to his creditors and that his wife will do the same, which will pay every creditor in full.

THE RIGHT COURSE.

Where a man knowingly ships grain that is not his own he should be punished, but the above case seems a peculiar one and the holders of receipts we believe have taken the proper course.

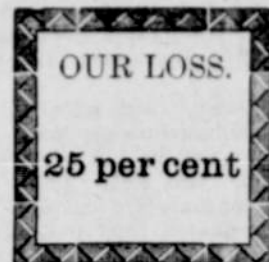
