## BLUE RIVER MINES.

### Fred E Sharkey Arrives with A Clean-Up Last Evening.

SEVEN FEET OF SNOW.

Daily Guard, January 10.

Fred E Sharkey, one of the owners of the Lucky Boy mine, in the Blue River district arrived here last evening en route to Portland with the regular monthly clean-up, which was a large one. He left the mines Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock in company with three other men who accompanied him to "break the trail," the snow being seven feet deep at the Lucky Boy mine and snowing furiously when they left. By hard work they were able to reach Sparks' by 5 o'clock, six miles down the mountain. Wednesday Mr Sharkey came to Eugene with two relays of horses. He found snow all along the route, at Peplot's it being five or six inches deep, but it had been eighteen inches in depth. It snowed on him all day Tuesday and Wednesday.

AT THE MILL.

Mr Sharkey says they have 100 cords of wood right at the mill and 300 cords about one-quarter of a mile away. This means a four months' run in spite of snow.

The company is figuring on establishing an electric plant at Blue River and conveying power to the mines to run the mill and all other necessary machinery.

MOUNTAIN OF PAY QUARTZ.

Mr Sharkey says they run into a mountain of pay ore. Every indication points to the body of new ore being 60 feet wide and it now has a depth of 250 feet. And every pound of it is known as good paying quartz.

100 STAMPS.

It is the intention of the owners of the Lucky Boy to double the stamps this summer. Mr Sharkey said he, himself, was satisfied the ore body in sight was of such magnitude that it would run a hundred stamps for at least 25 years.

Mr Sharkey left for Portland this afternoon train.

### GAMBLING GAMES CLOSED.

Mayor Harris Issues an Order to that Effect.

Yesterday Mayor Harris issued an order that all gambling games in the city cease operations. Marshal Brady delivered the orders and consequently last night the back rooms of the various resorts were closed in darkness, and the "Knights of the Green Cloth" took a day (or rather a night) off.

Whether this will be a permanent thing or not remains to be seen. Usually these moral waves are spasmodic in their nature and after a few days or weeks of enforced idleness the gamblers again resume operations with as much or more openness than before.

The mayor's order has thrown out of job perhaps 30 or 40 men in Eugene who follow that occupation as a sole means of livelihood.

### The Armour Funeral.

CHICAGO, Jan 10.—Private funeral services over the body of the late Philip D Armour were held at 11 o'clock yesterday at the Armour residence. Following the services at the house the body was taken to the Armour Mission, where from noon until 2 o'clock it lay in state and was viewed by thousands of people, including throngs of employees from the great packing-houses and other business interests of the dead millionaire, many of them standing for hours in the street for an opportunity to get a last glimpse of their former friend and employer.

The services at the house were of the simplest character, carrying out the expressed wishes of the deceased, and were attended only by the family and close friends.

## WILL BENEFIT SPANISH WAR VETERANS.

### Their Time of Service Will Be Allowed in Making Proof Upon Homesteads.

One of the early acts of the senate was to pass a bill which fought its way through the house at the last session, and was much reported upon and much amended in the senate. This is the bill providing that entrymen under the homestead laws, who have served in the United States army, navy or Philippine insurrection, shall have certain service deducted from the time required to perfect title under homestead laws. It will benefit many young men in Oregon, who served in the late war, who may wish to take up lands.

As the bill finally passed and went to the president, it provided that every private soldier and officer, who, after a service in either outbreak mentioned, was honorably discharged, or who shall serve that length of time in the future in the Philippine insurrection, and subsequently be honorably discharged, shall be entitled to enter upon and receive patent for a quantity of public lands not exceeding 160 acres, to be taken in compact form, all according to the homestead laws, but such settler shall be allowed six months after locating his homestead and filing his declaratory statement within which to make his entry and commence his settlement and improvement.

It is further provided that the time which such homesteader has served in the army, navy or marine corps shall be deducted from the time ordinarily required to perfect title, or if discharged on account of wounds or disability incurred in the line of duty, then the term of enlistment shall be deducted, without reference to the length of time he may have served; but no patent shall issue to any homesteader who has not resided upon, improved and cultivated his homestead for a period of at least one year after he shall have commenced his improvements.

In case a settler on the public land under the homestead laws died while actually engaged in the army, navy or marine corps, during the war with Spain or the Philippine insurrection, his widow, if unmarried, or in case of her death or marriage, then his minor orphan children or his or their legal representatives, may make final proof on the land, and the death of such settler shall be construed to be equivalent to the performance of all requirements as to residence and cultivation for the full period of five years, and shall entitle his widow, if unmarried, or his minor orphan children or their legal representatives to make final proof upon and receive government patent for said land, and patent shall be issued.

### Prof Cooley Recommends that Public School Teams Have Coaches.

Chicago, Jan 9.—Superintendent of Schools E G Cooley, to whom the board of education assigned the task of revising the rules of football, will recommend that a coach be employed for every public school football team. In addition he will recommend that no football player be permitted to become a member of a school team unless he has the written consent of his parents and is able to stand a thorough physical examination.

Mr Cooley said that only men who knew every detail of the game and were perfect gentlemen should be selected for coaches. He favored paying salaries if necessary.
