OREGON STATE LEGISLATURE

The Senate Ways and Means Committee Favorable to Senator McBride.

NINETY BILLS INTRODUCED.

Special to the Guard.

SALEM, Jan 16.—Sixty bills have already been introduced in the House and thirty in the Senate.

The Senate has already passed one bill, an appropriation for the expenses of a committee of Indian War Veterans to visit Washington to urge congress to pass a bill for the relief of the soldiers who served in the Indian wars of 1855-56, in Oregon and were never paid either for time or expenses.

Governor Geer will probably veto the bill, if passed by the House as the constitution provides that appropriation bills must originate in the House.

President Fulton appoints a ways and means Senate committee favorable to Senator McBride. The presiding officer of the Senate made this committee solidly republican, a violation of precedent.

The senatorial situation remains unchanged.

No important committees have been appointed by the speaker of the House.

SENATORIAL SITUATION.

SALEM, Jan 17.—Both houses rushed business this forenoon. Already 127 bills have been introduced and read first time in house, while 60 have been introduced and read in the senate.

The senate today held memorial services in respect to the late Senator Al Reed, of Douglas county. They were of a very impressive order.

The committee clerk evil in both houses seems to have been checked.

Joint memorials to the congress of the United States have passed both houses objecting to the transfer of the forest reserves to the agricultural department. The matter remains to Oregon particularly.

The State printer is covered up with work. Awaiting printed bills both houses adjourned until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

THE SENATORSHIP.

SALEM, Jan 17.—Senator Geo W McBride and ex Senators H W Corbett and John H Mitchell are all here and claim to be hopeful of success. The situation is actually not flattering to either, Till Ford of Salem, or Binger Herman of Washington, D C, standing an equal chance. Republican caucus call for Monday evening freely circulated. The success of getting signatures not announced. Senator McBride supporters seem elated over so many members being non-committal.

Members generally left Salem for Portland to spend the recess.

The driver succeeded in making his way on foot to a settlement and relief was sent back to the minister, who after almost succumbing to the cold, had made a last and successful effort and reached a deserted cabin where he was found by the rescuing party.—Rev Summerville was located in this county for several years.

REPUBLICAN CAUCUS CALL.

Accepted by Mr Corbett and Being Circulated and Signed by Members of the Legislature.

A caucus of the republican members of the twenty-first biennial session of the Oregon legislature is hereby called for Monday Jan 21st at 8 p m at room State Capitol building, Salem.

Its duty and purpose shall be to nominate a candidate for United States Senator by a majority of all votes cast in the caucus.

The method of nominating a candidate, whether viva voce or by ballot or otherwise, shall be determined by the caucus by a majority of votes thereof.

It is hereby understood and agreed that the nominee of the caucus shall be the candidate of the republican party and the several subscribers do individually pledge themselves to support the caucus nominee for senator by casting their votes for him in open legislature on Tuesday, January 22nd, 1901, and each day thereafter until he shall be elected.

It is hereby stipulated that this caucus call shall be in force and the pledges it contains, fully binding on all the subscribers, only when fifty-six republican members of the legislature have signed this call.

The Freshet Has Left it in a Bad Condition--Logs Went to Sea.

BOHEMIA ROAD DAMAGED.

One of Eli Bangs' mail carriers has arrived from the Head of Tide, on the Suslaw river. He reports the wagon road as badly injured by small slides and culverts gone and also by huge drifts that in places cover the road from ten to thirty feet deep. Especially at the crossing of Lake creek, on both sides of the stream, is the drifts extensive, covering acres of ground. It is thought that a force of twenty or thirty men could get a pack horse through with mail by the middle or end of next week if work is begun at once.
