### OUTCOME OF EXPANSION POLICY.

Official circles in Washington are uneasy about the growing naval strength of Germany. Their "uneasiness" will result in recommendations for increased appropriations for the building of warships. If this country starts in to keep up with the killing military pace of European nations we will soon be provided with a cruiser or battleship for every port, with a few to spare to watch shallow ocean-creek outlets.

The United States are in no danger from any possible increase of foreign navies. Our "expansion" policy causes the alarm. When we took hostile territory eight thousand miles from our shores the necessity for a strong navy came with it. Americans can easily protect America from any foreign fleet, however strong. Land defenses and torpedoes will do the work for the battleships that, to start with, must steam three thousand miles across the ocean from their base of supplies. The expansion policy forces us to protect country clear across the broad Pacific, on Asiatic shores.

### PORTLAND'S SHAME.

That Portland Police Commission deserve something very bad—worse than they can get in this world—for not having kept faith with the gamblers, men who have openly violated the laws of the city of Portland and the state of Oregon under police protection for months past. Here is a will from a gambling house proprietor, published in the Oregonian of the 26th:

"This order to close has nearly taken the breath from me. It is a surprise. The usual monthly fine was paid January 1, and we expected that the money would give us the right to do business until January 31. The Police Commissioners have not treated us fairly, and have not allowed us to get our money's worth. Still, I'll close up gambling Saturday night and obey the law, because I have to."

It was time for Rev. Snyder and his "reformers" to make a move against not only open violations of law, but the pollution of the courts of justice and their agents, the police, through connivance and open partnership with crime. It is surprising that men with any sense of morality could have handled such money and placed it in a public fund.

### FOREST UTILIZATION.

Robert Alexander, of Coquille, who was in town this week is devising plans for the manufacture of ship knees from the stumps and roots of the trees felled for logs and piling. Formerly, in the logging business, more than half the product of a forest, he believes, was wasted. The stumps were cut high from the ground and a long piece from the top of the tree was deemed too small for sawing into lumber, and this, with the burning of the slabs, etc., made a great waste of valuable material. With the small top section used for piling, the main trunk for lumber, and the stump and large roots for ship knees, and a proper utilization of the slabs, the whole tree would be used for valuable purposes and prove correspondingly greater worth to timber men.

Messrs Campbell & Alexander are preparing for the construction of an extensive tramway near Hudson, to facilitate the handling of their cordwood, piling and logging business, and will probably employ 150 men the present season. Thus utilizing the whole product, the land will be left practically clear and much of it can be utilized for gardens, orchards, vineyards and pasture lands, thus adding to the permanent wealth of the country.

### JERSEY JUSTICE.

In the swift but orderly progress of the trial of three of the men charged with the horrible Paterson murder "Jersey justice" is promising to fulfill its proverbial certainty. "To none will we sell, to none will we deny, to one will we lay right or justice"—so runs, in its sonorous, many-syllabled Latin, the oath of King John to the Barons, the greater charter on which rest the liberties of English-speaking people.

The delay of justice rests on the same plane of evil eminence with its sale and its denial. And rightly. Delay is denial, for it clogs the prisons with men wasting their lives while waiting trial. It is sale, for it gives to the long purse an advantage which it should not have.

## THE SCHOOL MEETING

### A Four-Mill Tax Levied for Next Year.

#### NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.

Daily Guard, January 25.  
A large and enthusiastic meeting of citizens and taxpayers was held at the courthouse last night for the purpose of levying a tax to meet the expense of the district for the coming year and to discuss the general needs of the district.

Hon. J. H. McClung, chairman of the board of directors, called the meeting to order, and the following directors' report was read:

#### DIRECTORS' REPORT.

To the voters and patrons of School Dist. No. 4, Lane county, Oregon: Ladies and gentlemen:—In accordance with the call for a special meeting of the legal voters of this school district for the purpose of levying a tax for maintaining the schools of the district for the coming year, we, the directors, submit for your consideration the receipts and disbursements of the funds coming into our hands the past year, and an estimate of the amount we deem necessary to maintain the schools at their present high standard for the coming year:

In this estimate, we have allowed in every instance where the exact sum was not known, a little more than the same service cost last year. The receipts are placed at a lower figure than was derived from the same fund last season, while the tax of four mills, if the assessor's valuations are the same as last year, would yield a little over \$5000, instead of \$4,870 as we have estimated.

The estimate is a conservative one, and we believe cannot fail to meet the wants of the district for the coming year, economically administered.

During the past year we have placed in the Geary building two new furnaces at a cost of \$200, bought apparatus for High School amounting to \$221.58, and expended \$280.25 for repairs, in all \$741.81. Not to exceed \$250 ought to be required for these purposes the coming year.

We have aimed to give the district the best possible service keeping in view a high standard of school work for the least possible outlay of money. Whether we have been successful, you are to decide.

The measles have been epidemic in our midst for some time and have necessarily interfered with the work of the schools to some extent, but the disease has practically disappeared without a single fatal case in the schools, so far as we know, and during the months we hope there will be little if any loss to the year's work by reason of irregular attendance.

Some of the rooms have been very much crowded and doubtless would have been more so if so much sickness had not prevailed.

It is evident that additional room will be needed another year and at least another teacher, and possibly two added. The overflow is in the Fifth and Sixth grades, and we have allowed for one extra teacher in our estimate.

The directors are not a unit in regard to a four-mill levy, one of them deeming a five-mill levy needed to meet the probable expenses for the coming school year.

#### A FOUR-MILL TAX.

After considerable discussion as to whether a four-mill tax would be sufficient to meet all necessary requirements of the district, the majority of the directors was in favor of a four-mill tax.

Friendly and others and the unanimous sentiment was in favor of erecting a building that would be credit to Eugene and would fit the requirements of the district for several years to come. The question of bonding the district for funds for the erection of the building was discussed. It was decided on motion of L. Riley that it be the sense of the meeting that Eugene have an additional school building and that the directors formulate an estimate of probable cost and submit the same at another meeting to be held at the court house Monday evening, February 25 at 7:30, at which time further action will be taken.
