Linn-Lane County Line.

Upon assembling of the house yesterday morning, Whitney made an unsuccessful effort to have Kelly's senate bill, to establish the boundary line between Linn and Lane counties, taken out of the hands of committee on counties for the purpose of submitting it to the consideration of the house. He declared the senate had passed the bill by an almost unanimous vote, and he saw no reason why the house should not get a chance to act on it. Opposition by Harris, of Lane, however, prevailed, and the committee on counties was permitted to retain the bill.

RAILROADS WIN.

Carter Withdraws His Bill Under Pressure.

Salem Journal, Feb 13: The proposed reduction to three cents a mile of passenger rates on railroads not operated wholly within the state occupied the remaining session of the house Tuesday and in the end the bill discussed was withdrawn in favor of a similar measure to be considered later.

Mr Dresser objected to H B No 40, by Carter, on the ground that it was unconstitutional in its provisions and would prove a defective law. Amendments submitted by Mr Carter, the author, with a view to remedying the defects were rejected by the house sitting as a committee of the whole and the report adopted was adverse.

Eddy, Whitney and Dresser spoke in favor of the railroads contending that the reports of earnings and expenses submitted to the officials and clearly demonstrated that the three cent rate was impossible unless the corporations were to be forced into bankruptcy. Dresser pleaded earnestly for the defeat of the bill on the ground that the railroads were the most important factors in the development of the state and that to restrict and hamper them in their work would retard the progress of the state.

Colvig, Butt, Carter and Harris favored the three cent rate and spoke at length. Before a vote could be taken to indicate where the members stood on the question Mr Carter withdrew his bill, owing to the objections to its constitutionality, in favor of Colvig's bill covering the same ground.

Clem's Bill Requiring Saloons to Take Down Screens Defeated.

MINING BILLS PASSED.

Booth's Bill Protecting Hotel Men Passed.

HARRIS' MINING BILL SUCCESSFUL.

SALEM, Oregon, Feb. 13.—Representative Poorman's bill regulating liabilities of masters to servants failed.

Representative L T Harris' bill making railways responsible for injuries sustained by employees failed. This would indicate that no anti-railroad legislation can be passed at this session of the legislature. Harris' bill was a splendid one.

Representative Grace's bill providing for a system of mine bell signals passed.

Representative L T Harris' bill making it a crime for interfering with location of mining stakes passed.

PRECINCT ASSESSORS HEREAFTER.

SALEM, Feb. 14.—Senator Clem's bill requiring liquor dealers to dispense with stained window glass, curtains, etc., was defeated in the senate.

The house passed a measure transferring title to land at Union, Union county, purchased for branch insane asylum a few years ago, for use now as a branch experimental station of the state agricultural college.

Carter's bill providing for liens being taken by crews of threshing machines against machines for wages due was defeated in the senate.

The senate passed Daly's bill relating to forms of official ballot.

Also his bill providing for the election of and assessing by precinct assessors.

A Pioneer Lady Dead.

Word was received in Eugene last evening conveying the news of the death of the well known pioneer lady, Mrs Mary Bristow, which occurred at 7 o'clock p m yesterday at the residence of her son, Harry Bristow, at Cottage Grove.

The lady was stricken with paralysis about two weeks ago from which she never recovered. She came to Lane county in an early day settling at Pleasant Hill. She was a resident of Eugene for a number of years and was widely known all over the county. She was the wife of Dr J K Bristow, deceased, and the mother of Edward, John W and Harry Bristow, who were at her bedside at the time of her death. She had been a lifelong member of the Christian church.

The remains were brought down to Pleasant Hill today and the funeral will occur at 10 o'clock tomorrow, interment in the Pleasant Hill cemetery.

Death of Mrs Cheshire.

Mrs Rachel Cheshire died this morning at 8 o'clock from old age at the residence of her daughter, Mrs E Whittam, at the corner of Tenth and Oak streets, in this city. While old age was primarily the cause of the death, the lady had been confined to her bed for the last five years from the effects of a fall.

Mrs Cheshire's maiden name was Rachel Smith and she was born at Rutledge, Tennessee, on the 30th day of May, 1809, therefore being at the time of her death 91 years, 8 months and 13 days old, probably the oldest person in Lane county. She was married in 1828 in Tennessee to Edmond Cheshire who died Aug 31, 1861. In 1874 Mrs Cheshire came to Oregon and Lane county to reside with her children, who had come West in an early day.

Mrs Cheshire was the mother of ten children, only five of whom survive her. They are: Mrs E Whittam, Mrs Mary Fields, W P Cheshire, all of Lane county, Mrs Amanda Ray, living in Kansas, and Edmond Cheshire, in Missouri. She had lived a Christian all her life, being a member of the Baptist church.

The funeral will be held at the Whittam residence Friday morning at 9 a m, to be conducted by Rev J C Richardson, and the remains will be laid to rest in Oak Hill cemetery, a few miles west of Eugene.

The sorrowing family have the sympathy of many friends in Eugene and Lane county.

NICKLE-IN-THE-SLOT BILL

Has Passed the Senate and Will Also Pass the House.

THE BILL IN FULL.

Senator Proebstel's bill for an act to prohibit the operating or conducting of nickle-in-the-slot machines in Oregon, passed the senate yesterday with but one dissenting vote, that of Senator Williamson, who contended that this matter should be left to local option, that municipal corporations should be allowed to regulate it. The bill reads as follows:

"Sec. 1.—Any person or persons who shall conduct, maintain or operate, either as owner or owners, proprietor or proprietors, lessee or lessees, employee or employees, agent or agents, or who shall play or use any nickle-in-the-slot machine, or other device of like character wherein there enters any element of chance, whether the same be played or operated for money, checks, credits, or any other thing of representative value, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$100, and in default of payment of the fine imposed, shall be imprisoned in the county jail one day for each \$2 thereof.

"Sec. 2.—In all prosecutions under this act for conducting, maintaining or operating any such machine or device, proof of the possession of such machine or device, or of permitting the same to be or remain in any public place owned or controlled by the person so prosecuted convenient for use, shall be prima facie evidence against such person of violation of this act.

"Sec. 3.—One-half of the fine imposed of any conviction under this act shall be paid to the person who is the private prosecutor in the case and the other half shall be paid into the county treasury of the county wherein such conviction was secured for the benefit of the school fund.

"Sec. 4.—Justices of the peace shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit court in all offenses arising under this act.

"Sec. 5.—All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

"Sec. 6.—Inasmuch as there is some doubt existing regarding the validity of the law of February 24, 1899, covering the same subject matter, and inasmuch as the moral sentiment of the state demands this enactment in the interest of the youth of the state, and that the law shall be effective at once."
