RUSH FOR ARMY BERTHS.

Had a call of the House or the Senate been demanded at any time lately the Sergeant-at-Arms of either body might have secured a quorum of members at the White House. They came singly, in doubles, and in delegations, in search of appointments under the new army reorganization bill. Some of them were accompanied by prospective candidates for lieutenantcies who are willing to sacrifice themselves upon the altar of their country for the annual salary of an army officer. Others came with fair ladies who stood in the background ready to endorse the application and aid in securing the coveted commission.

Some time before the President was in his office the members began to arrive and waited anxiously for admittance to a private audience. Those who came first had the advantage over their colleagues, for Mr. McKinley was unable to see one-half of those who sought his attention to recommend a constituent for office.

HIT THE AGRICULTURIST.

The New York Journal and Advertiser of February 20th has a London dispatch from W. T. Stead regarding tariff reprisals being made by Russia against the United States. He writes:

I regard the increase of Russian duties on American iron and steel goods with profound regret. It does not matter much to the American manufacturer if he is temporarily shut out of the Russian market; it matters everything to the Russian consumer that the price of his machinery should not be increased. The Russian peasant needs cheap agricultural machinery. As Professor Oseroff cried out not long ago, high duties on iron and steel hit the agriculturist at every turn.

There is thought for American agriculturists in those closing words—"high duties on iron and steel hit the agriculturist at every turn." They are hit that way by the McKinley tariff law.

The Southern Pacific railroad is defendant in a suit for ten thousand dollars for ejecting a passenger from a train in Southern Oregon between stations when, as the plaintiff claims, his ticket had already been taken up. No one has ever yet found out why a railroad should not put a ticketless passenger off at the next station instead of stopping the train out in the country and causing the many passengers who have paid their fares to reach at least the first stations thereafter behind the schedule time.

These "Law and Order Leagues" occasionally take strange forms in the exercise of their self-appointed duties. As an instance the mob that suppressed a saloon and killed the wife of the owner at Millwood, Kansas, Monday night, went to the place where liquor was unlawfully kept wearing masks and armed with shotguns. The House Votes the Above Amount to the U. of O. for a Heating Plant.

WILL PASS SENATE EASILY.

Salem, Feb. 20.—The house passed the appropriation bill last night in which was included the following item:

"For payment of expenses of construction of a central light, water and heating plant and power house and hall of engineering in connection therewith for University of Oregon, to be expended under the direction of the Board of Regents of said University, which sum shall be in lieu of, and in full satisfaction of, unexpended balance under the act of October 18, 1878, and such act be and is hereby repealed—\$25,000."

It is conceded that the item will pass the senate without opposition.
