THE PROTECTIVE TARIFF.

Discussing foreshadowed changes in British tariff laws at the annual meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom, Tuesday, Lord Avebury, presiding officer, defined the probable position of England: "As far as Great Britain is concerned, she will enter into negotiations, not wishing to hamper or curtail her commerce with her neighbors, but rather to promote it, being convinced that commerce benefits both buyers and sellers."

There is a lot of good sense in that sentiment. The permanency and greatness of modern nations depend upon commerce. And there can be no permanent trade between communities without a "give and take." The nation that would act the dog in the manger will be cut and discriminated against at every turn. We may claim that Europe must have our raw materials, yet the world is wide and where they get no trade in return Europe naturally turns to the development of other countries for sources of supply.

Then our agriculturists will get worst hurt. While his foreign market is curtailed the home manufacturers, protected by a tariff that excludes foreign competition, and banded into trusts that stifle healthy home competition, charge the farmer such prices as they know he is able to pay. That is how he gets the worst of it.

MODERN IMPROVEMENT OF AN ANCIENT RIVER.

British capital is building an immense stone dam across the river Nile at the First Cataract, a little over a mile in length, to be exact six thousand feet. From the engineering point of view the stupendous nature of the undertaking will be realized from the effect it will have of creating practically a lake 144 miles long, impounding more than 1,000,000,000 tons of water. At some periods of the year, it is said, 900,000 tons a minute will gush through the sluices. The dam will raise the river about sixty-six feet above its usual previous level. It is broad enough for a carriage road to run along its top.

When the river is in flood its waters will gush through the massive sluice gates. In the autumn months the sluice gates will be closed until the reservoir thus formed is full and ready to be distributed by channels over the agricultural land on each side. When the water is most wanted, (in August and April), for the crops of corn, sugar, cotton and rice the supply in the lower river will be increased from the reservoir, and thus a fairly even supply of water will be afforded throughout the year. Locks will be built in the dam to allow free navigation.

The Salem Journal has a reporter in its employ who will have no competition should he enter a contest for the champion liar of the state. He describes the driving of a band of ewes and lambs through Salem and adds: "Some of the lambs were small and could hardly get along. Others jumped on the dams and took a ride occasionally to rest." The lambs were very considerate in not riding all the time.

A New Jersey chemical manufacturing plant is building a record smashing chimney. When completed it will be 360 feet high. It will require 400,000 brick and cost \$50,000. At that height it is thought noxious gases from chemicals will be so scattered as to prove no detriment to public health.

Indiana parents went away from their home yesterday leaving their three children aged one, three and five years in the house. During their absence fire destroyed the house and burned the children to death. Such parents deserve no offspring.

Portland Japanese barbers are on against the Barber Commission. The Japs shave for five cents and the white barbers resent the cut in price. They want the Japs barred.

Senator John L. Morgan, chairman of the committee on international affairs, says the United States will proceed with the construction of the Nicaragua canal with or without England's consent.

MILLER'S FRIENDS SLOW.

Oregon Man's Endorsement for Consulate Came When Filled.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The friends of H. B. Miller, of Eugene, Oregon, now on temporary duty at Shanghai, China, were slow in endorsing him for appointment to the position of consul-general at Hong Kong, made vacant by the death of Consul-General Wildman. Mr. Miller was last year appointed consul at one of the smaller stations in China, through the efforts of the Oregon delegation, and since his appointment has made a good record for himself abroad, and with the department.

The president, however, was very prompt about filling the consulate at Hong Kong, and only a few days after the death of Mr. Wildman, the name of William A. Rubie, of Wisconsin, was sent to the senate for confirmation as consul-general at that post. The senate acted promptly, confirming the nomination without delay. All this work took place before the endorsement of Mr. Miller reached Washington. There is, of course, some doubt as to whether or not Mr. Miller could have secured this appointment even had his endorsement been received in time, but his year's service would have been a distinct advantage, and would undoubtedly have justified the department in giving his name favorable consideration.
