

SING SING TOWN AND PENITENTIARY PART COMPANY.

The town of Sing Sing, New York, has been wiped from the map. It will be known hereafter as Ossining. The name Sing Sing had become synonymous with the state penitentiary at that place, and the outside world looked upon the town as merely a penal colony. Manufacturers could not be induced to go there, owing to the fact that the impression had become general that all goods manufactured at Sing Sing were "prison-made goods." Other towns in Winchester county during the last ten years, have shown the largest increase in the history of the census bureau, but Sing Sing showed a decrease of 1313. These conditions aroused the people and resulted in the petition to the Legislature for the change of name.

Sing Sing is incorporated on April 2, 1813, Sing Sing prison was erected in 1824. The prison property is still within the boundary lines of the town, but the official name of the prison remains Sing Sing as heretofore. It is the purpose of the citizens to erect a railroad station on the prison grounds, so that prisoners may be taken to the prison without coming to the Ossining station.

THE SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST.

An Empire City, Coos Bay, correspondent tells how the Indians of that vicinity have disappeared before the white man:

By the way, there are a few Indians living at Empire City and along the bay. A poor, forlorn, old survivor of his race, a widower of but a few weeks, told the writer a pathetic story of his people. Counting on his fingers, he mentioned by name the few remaining members of his tribe—the Coos Bay Indians. "Years ago," he said, "without a sign of expression on his wrinkled, stolid face, 'Indian men get lots of work, catch fish and cut wood; white men come, lots of 'em; him do all the work, Indian no have work, no money—all die—all die, few left by 'n' by all dead.' "What some philosophy, what resignation! He got off the boat and slowly wended his way up the trail to his little cabin—waiting, for the time when he too shall be called to the happy hunting ground of his ancestors.

"Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown" with the Czar. The telegraph reports that repeated threats of assassination have completely unnerved the ruler of the great country. The last congress was in session just 197 days, counting both sessions. In that time nearly 15,000 bills were introduced in the house and about 1,600 of them became laws. Of these, however, 1,250 were private acts, mostly pension bills, only 345 being of public interests while the most important and the greatly needed one of these, the river and harbor bill, was killed.
