Importing Oregon Grape.

Who has not admired the serrated leaved Oregon Grape—that is not a grape—in its smooth solid summer garment, and brilliant autumn coat? That plants of the Oregon woodland beauty are imported from France is strange, yet true. The Portland Telegram says:

A case, containing probably 5000 young plants, is now in the hands of the internal revenue officials, who will appraise the value of the plants. A duty of 25 per cent is taxed on nursery stock imported from foreign countries. The plants are very small and have been carefully packed in moss. They are claimed those brought up and cultivated in France are much superior in grace and color to those of the land of its nativity.

FISH GALORE.—Those who like to see immense schools of fish, most of them weighing from two to six pounds each, ought to be here, says the Klamath Republican. Five minutes walk from Main street brings one to the shores of Klamath Rapids, where every little creek, bay and tributary creek are so crowded with mullets that their backs stick out of the water. Ordinary fishing with hooks, spears or even nets is too slow to think of. With a pitchfork or with naked hands a hackload may be thrown out in five minutes.

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AGUINALDO RECANTS.

Swears Allegiance to the United States—Renounces Philippine Revolutionary Government.

NEWS CAME THIS MORNING.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—A cablegram from General MacArthur to the war department gives the important information that Aguinaldo, leader of the insurgents in the Philippines in insurrections both against Spain and the United States, has sworn allegiance to the government of the United States, renouncing all revolutionary governments in the Philippines.

Aguinaldo makes a public statement that his action is a result of a close study of the conditions of the islands and the belief that the insurgent cause is a hopeless one.

The news causes little excitement, such action on Aguinaldo's part having been anticipated.

NEW YORK BOY KIDNAPPED.

L. N. RONEY'S BUILDING.

Work Will Commence in a Very Short Time.

L. N. Roney informs us that he has secured nearly all the material for his new brick theatre building to be erected just north of the new armory and that the work of construction will begin just as soon as the weather will permit. Among the several new bricks to be erected this spring and summer, Mr. Roney's will be the first to go up. Following this, Dr. Brown's, J. H. McClelland's, E. H. Ingham's and probably others will be erected and there will be great activity along that line in Eugene all summer.

Library for Portland.

Portland, Or., March 30.—Andrew Carnegie will give \$100,000 to the city of Portland for a free public library building provided the city will guarantee a site and a sufficient annual income for its maintenance. The Portland Library Association now has a library and building valued at \$300,000, and the two will probably be consolidated.

Eugene should ask the gentleman for a \$50,000 library.

Thieves Broke Into Freight Cars.

Junction City, Or., April 1.—Two freight cars on the sidetrack at the depot were broken into last night by thieves. A box containing 12 pairs of shoes, consigned to W. H. Kay, of Monroe, was broken open and the contents removed. There were about a dozen sacks of peas for Millerton Bros. of this city. They were emptied out, and the sacks used to carry off the shoes in.

THE WAREHOUSE CASE.

Decree of Court in Case of Millorn et al vs Caroline Clow et al.

Judge J. W. Hamilton has handed down his decision in the case of H. M. Millorn et al vs Caroline Clow et al wherein plaintiffs seek to recover on wheat stored in the Clow warehouse at Junction and in which warehouse there was a shortage of 12,568 bushels. The court says:

"It is ordered, adjudged and decreed that the persons hereinbefore named, as having deposited wheat as aforesaid, in said warehouse of Robert Clow share pro rata according to their respective interests as hereinbefore shown in the proceeds of the sale of the wheat now in the hands of the receiver. That the amount due each of said depositors according to their respective interests, be paid to each by said receiver, and the receipt of said depositor be taken therefor and filed with the final report of said receiver. That before paying said amounts of money as aforesaid, there be deducted from the amount of money in the hands of said receiver and allowed to him for his services as such receiver the sum of \$200, and \$150 for expenses in employing an attorney, and that there also be paid therefrom the costs and expenses of this suit.

That plaintiff have judgment against Caroline Clow as administratrix of the estate of Robert Clow for their costs herein incurred. That the complaint herein as to defendant Balfour, Guthrie & Co. be dismissed, but that Balfour, Guthrie & Co. shall not recover costs. The defendant H. M. Grant is not entitled to relief herein, and his said prayer be disallowed, but without any judgment for cost against said defendant. That as to each of the other defendants named in said second amended complaint, no other or further decree be rendered herein, and that no judgment of costs be rendered except as hereinbefore provided.

The case will probably be appealed to the supreme court.

He was released after an examination of the case. This was the case in which Chief of Police D. W. Gibson was interested. The stolen cow belonged to A. W. Drager, south of this city, and a description of her had been sent out by Chief Gibson. When he was notified by the Cottage Grove authorities of the arrest of a man having such a cow in charge, the Salem officer went to Cottage Grove, but quickly discovered that the wrong man had been seized, and Mr. Caldwell was promptly released.

PROBABLY A NEW HOTEL.

Capitalist Purchases Corner Lot With Intention of Building.

E. J. Frasier has just consummated the sale of a lot on the Underwood property 100x160 feet on the corner of Sixth and Willamette streets to W. J. Rogers, a capitalist from Dawson City, the purchase price being \$3000.

In speaking of the sale this morning Mr. Frasier told a reporter that the deal has been in contemplation for a number of months, Mr. Rogers having been in Eugene several times during the last year and has purchased during that time some farming land in Lane county. Mr. Frasier says that Mr. Rogers has talked of erecting a large hotel and opera house combined on the lot just purchased, but since L. N. Roney has made the announcement that he will build a first-class opera house in the near future, Mr. Rogers, if he does build, which Mr. Frasier thinks is highly probable, will put up a building to be used for a hotel only.

We understand it is the intention of Mr. Rogers to put \$50,000 or \$60,000 into his building, which amount insures an elegant structure. The location of the lot is a very good one for a hotel.

Mr. Rogers is now in the East and will make a trip to Dawson before returning to Eugene and finally acting upon his contemplated project.

Young, have closed their shop and gone out of business, giving as a reason the high price of beef. There are now only three meat markets in Eugene.

FREE MAIL DELIVERY

Receipts of Eugene Postoffice Over \$10,000 for Past Year.

APPLICATION SENT TO WASHINGTON.

Daily Guard, April 1.

Some time ago the GUARD printed an item to the effect that the receipts of the Eugene postoffice for the year ending April 1st would amount to 10,000 or more, which would entitle us to free mail delivery.

When questioned by a reporter this morning, Postmaster McCormack stated that the receipts from the sale of stamps and envelopes have amounted to over \$10,200 for the year just ended. An application for free delivery will immediately be sent to Washington and it is highly probable that the request will be granted in July or August of this year.

The requirements by the government which, a city in order to secure free delivery must meet, are well-lighted streets, good sidewalks, which we already have, streets named and houses numbered. The question of numbering the houses and naming the streets has been up before the city council and has been in the hands of a committee for about a year, but the committee has done nothing in the matter.

It now behooves the council to immediately act in the matter and order the work done, so that the free delivery may be established as soon as possible.

County Exhibits at the State Fair.

The liberal premiums offered for county exhibits at the Oregon State Fair this year will afford every county in the state an opportunity to exhibit her resources. There is no question about the great number of home-makers coming to the state this year, and the state fair will afford them an excellent opportunity to judge for themselves of our resources. For this reason alone every county that makes any pretension to general agriculture should make a good showing. The premiums offered on county exhibits is \$1,000, divided into five parts, as follows: First premium, \$300; second premium, \$250; third premium, \$200; fourth premium, \$150; fifth premium, \$100. The Southern Pacific Company hauls all exhibits to and from the fair free of charge, and a very liberal rate is made on all other lines in the eastern portion of the state.

RURAL DELIVERY ROUTE.—Junction Times: J. J. Winn, of the Estrep neighborhood, was in town Monday and sent a petition to the postoffice department praying for the establishment of a rural mail delivery. The route proposed starts from this place, running west to Heron's; thence north to Furgeson's; thence west to Horton's mill; thence east to Junction. We understand the petition is numerously signed and should the route be established it would serve a large number of people. The proposed route is about 20 miles in length.

SMALLPOX SPREADING.—Hon. R. A.
