A LARGE DEAL.

H W Holden is Going to Build a Big Flume.

J L Clough, of Canyonville, is in town today and informs us that the long contemplated flume enterprise of that part of the county is now an assured fact, says the Roseburg Plaindealer. The project is to tap upper Canyon creek and flume its water around by Canyonville, to supply water with which to work out the fabulously rich placer grounds between Canyonville and Riddle, comprising at least 4,000 or 5,000 acres.

The flume will also tap a large and fine timber belt, and will also be used for floating lumber, ties and wood to a point near the S P railroad at Riddle. It is stated that capital has at last been interested in this project, and that its accomplishment is assured. H W Holden, of Eugene, has been engaged for several years past in trying to work up this great enterprise and at last promises to be rewarded for his labor in this direction.

A NEW SAWMILL.—Geo Riggs, of Mabel, and a Mr Edwards, from Lake Creek, having purchased the old Workman sawmill near the mouth of Shotgun creek on the Mohawk, and are preparing to move the same to the mountains about six miles farther up the creek. There is a large belt of the finest timber in Lane county on that creek, and it is the intention of these gentlemen to erect a mill of about 20,000 feet capacity in the midst of it. The logging will be done by a donkey engine, thus enabling them to keep a constant supply of logs on hand which would be impossible by the other method of logging for a mill of this capacity.

HERMANN IS TO GO.

Retention Made Impossible by Friction With Hitchcock.

TENDERED ANOTHER POSITION.

Washington, March 28.—It has practically been determined that Hermann will not remain Commissioner of the General Land Office. While the President speaks well of Hermann, he cannot have him a subordinate to Hitchcock, in view of the friction that exists. Hermann has been tendered a place on the Civil Service Commission, but as this is a reduction both in salary and importance, he does not like to make the change. The President does not want to dump Hermann out in the cold, and the Civil Service Commission was suggested to let him down easy.

George D Meiklejohn, ex-Assistant Secretary of War, is mentioned today as Hermann's successor. He lost his former place in making a fight for the senate, but it is understood he contributed his full share in the choice of two Republicans, and may be recognized for his party loyalty.

EUGENE HIGH SCHOOL.

Election of Officers of Amacitian Society—Lecture on Phrenology.

The lecture was illustrated by a series of charts, showing the different stages of development of the faculties of the mind.

Success in life comes from the power to be able to concentrate all energy on one object. Depravity is the result of uncultivated faculties, and to guard against this every young person should secure an education at any cost. Nine-tenths of the failures in life is the result of misapplied energy. Phrenology is the science which, if rightly followed, will lead to success that person who would otherwise be a complete failure. The doctor then gave a practical illustration of the science by delineating a subject to the audience.

After the close of the lecture Prof Orton made a few remarks to the young men of the society, endorsing the science and also complimenting the members on the success of their organization.

THE DIVINITY SCHOOL

New Building to Be Erected Soon on the Campus.

GROWTH OF THE INSTITUTION.

Preparations are being made for the erection of a new building by the Eugene Divinity School. When seen by a GUARD reporter yesterday in regard to the matter, Dean E C Sanderson stated that a 10-room structure, to be convenient in all its arrangements, to be modern in every respect and to cost in the neighborhood of \$2,500, would be built this spring on the west end of the campus. The building, the work of construction of which will commence within two or three weeks, will be used as the Dean's residence. The architecture of the building will be in keeping with its environment and will be a credit to that part of the city.

In further conversation with Dean Sanderson the reporter learned that a special effort will be made this coming summer to increase the endowment fund of the school. The fund which was started by Mrs L E Cowls, of McMinnville, with a \$2,500 endowment note, has increased considerably since then, but it is not what is desired it should be. Only recently the institution received an endowment note of \$1,000 from one of its friends, and the Dean and others will work hard during vacation this summer to endeavor to procure other notes of similar amount if possible. Dean Sanderson's indefatigable efforts in the upbuilding of the school in the past have met with excellent results, and no doubt he will be eminently successful in securing a large increase in the endowment fund.

At present time the Divinity School is entirely out of debt, a condition of affairs which is very gratifying to all interested in the institution. This year there are 33 students, a greater number than at any previous time. At the opening of the school in October, 1895, there were only four students and the number has steadily grown until the attendance has reached the figure stated above. The prospects for an increased attendance next year are very bright.

Equipment of Chemical Laboratory, University of Oregon.

First, wood-work, involving laboratory desks and tables, shelving, frames for glass lights, cabinets and cases. Second, glass work as per specifications. Third, plumbing material, such as pipe, fittings, bibbs, cocks, sinks, etc., sheet lead and tin pipe. Fourth, the plumbing work independent of material as above, but including all cement, solder, and other caulking, straps, supports, etc., for installing pipes. Fifth, galvanized sheet iron work as per specifications. Plans and specifications may be seen at the office of the secretary of the Board of Regents on and after April 1st, where all further details may be learned; and the laboratories of the University are open to prospective bidders during regular hours.
