A TERRIBLE BLIZZARD

Raging in Colorado Today---Snow Ten Feet Deep in Places.

HON. L. B. COX BEAD.

Special to the Guard. PORTLAND, April 11.—Hon. L. B. Cox died at Good Samaritan hospital this morning. He was a valuable citizen and a leader of progressive movements. He leaves a wife and four children, all boys. Mr Cox came to Oregon in the latter part of the 70's, locating at Pendleton, where he had great success in his profession, an attorney. He was born in Virginia and was about 74 years of age; was a graduate of Washington and Lee University, being a classmate of Hon Geo E Chamberlain, of Portland. He was a member of the log-slature in 1884 from Umatilla county. He moved to Portland in the latter part of the 80's. He was a prominent democrat. Last October he was operated upon for appendicitis, and after months of terrible suffering he passed away. It will be remembered that he delivered the Fourth of July oration in Eugene in 1899. Mr Cox was a prominent member of the Oregon Historical Society.

BLIZZARD IN COLORADO.

They have also decided to submit to the members of the association the question of the further life of the association.

MORE IMPROVEMENTS.

Hampton Bros Have Secured the Mrs Bausch Building—Same to be Enlarged. Hampton Bros feeling that their present quarters are too restricted, today made a lease with Mrs P Bausch for the building just south of them for a term of five years. The partition is to be taken out of the Bausch building and Mr Potts, the tenant, will seek other quarters; the building will receive a brick addition of 25 feet in length in the rear; plate glass will be placed in front, and a cement sidewalk is to take the place of the old wooden one. Also two large sky lights are to be placed in the roof of the building, and arches will be cut between their present store room and the new one. Of course, Hampton Bros will also continue to occupy their present room also. The new store will have a frontage of 52 feet; only a single front entrance will be used. Work is to commence on the change about July 1st. The room will be placed in first-class condition. Hampton Bros are to be congratulated upon securing enlarged quarters. Daily Guard, April 10. The Eugene Opera House Company today filed articles of incorporation with County Clerk Lee. The incorporators are L N Honey, R A Booth and F L Chambers. The articles read as follows: First—The name of the corporation shall be and is the Eugene Opera House Company.

Second—The duration of said corporation shall be unlimited.

Third—The enterprise and business in which said corporation proposes to engage is to buy and sell real estate, to erect and furnish buildings for rent, lease and control the same and to furnish, equip and operate an opera house, and to do all things necessary to carry out the objects of this corporation.

Fourth—The place where said corporation proposes to have its principal office and place of business is in Eugene.

Fifth—The amount of the capital stock of said corporation is \$15,000.

Sixth—The amount of each share of said capital stock is \$10.

The articles of incorporation have also been filed with Secretary of State F L Dunbar. As yet the corporation has not elected officers but that will be done soon, and the company will then proceed with the erection of the building on Mr Hovey's lot north of the new armory block.

BIG PROPERTY SALE.

E Dunn Buys Good Corner From Hovey Estate.

WILL ERECT A BUILDING.

Daily Guard, April 10. F E Dunn, the merchant, has purchased from the estate of the late A G Hovey, 85x160 feet of land situated on the corner of Eighth and Olive streets, occupied by the Howley livery stable and the Chinese wash house. The deed for the property was recorded with County Clerk Lee late this afternoon. The papers show the price paid was \$3,500.

The lot, which has a frontage of 85 feet on Eighth street and 160 on Olive, is a valuable piece of property and will make an excellent building place.

WILL BUILD.

Mr Dunn informed a reporter this afternoon that it is his intention to erect a brick building on his new purchase this summer. He is undecided as to the size of the building and as to whether it will be one or two stories high. It all depends upon the securing of leases. If five-year leases from tenants are obtained the building will have a frontage of 85 feet on Eighth street with a depth of 80 feet, and if suitable renters are assured for a second story it will be a two-story building.

J. H. GATES.

"Gates was a prominent citizen of Woodburn for a number of years and held the position of city marshal, councilman and other places of trust in that town. Strong liquor got the upper hand of him and for a couple of years he has been working for the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company in Lane county. While in the timber last summer he was hit by a falling tree and one of his legs broken. He is a very ordinary sort of a fellow and shows his dissipation. What object he could have in forging a check on Mr Poorman's friend, Mr Corbett, is not quite plain, and if outside appearances disclose the entire truth, it may be that Gates will pay dearly for both the check and the hushed up affair of last winter, as revenge may play an important part in his case."

EUGENE, Ore, April 10. HON G B CORTELYOU, Washington, D C:

People of University town of Oregon send most earnest invitation for President to give them half hour. Legislative committee agrees to programme. Answer.

The following reply was received this morning:

EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, D C April 11. J G R CRISMAN, Mayor; W KUYKENDALL, Member Legislative Com, Eugene, Or:

Your message of 10th received and kind invitation appreciated. Itinerary for Oregon completed several days ago and is as follows: Arrive Ashland via Southern Pacific Company, May 21, 6:45 p m. Leave Ashland 7 p m. Arrive Salem May 22 9 a m. Leave Salem 12 noon. Arrive Portland 2:15 p m. Leave Portland May 23 via Northern Pacific Railway 9 a m. Regret that this will preclude our stopping at Eugene as he will arrive there at a very unreasonable hour.
