"JACKSON STREET."

Many residents were greatly surprised and disgusted today at the action of the council last evening in preposing to change the name of Charnelton street to Jackson street. It is to be hoped that when the ordinance comes up for final action that the council will not make this change, and if they do, that Mayor Chrisman will veto

Charnelton street is one of the few historical names of our growing city. It was named after Charnel Mulligan, who gave forty acres of land in the very heart of our city in 1854 to procure the location of the county seat here. The vote on the location was: Prior Blair's donation 105 votes, Mulligan's donation 134, against 155 for all other places. After the location of the county seat it was named after Eugene F Skinner, who also gave 40 acres of land for county seat purposes, north of Mulligan's donation. A few years after this Charnelton street was named, said street being the western line of his donation land claim. This was very proper. It seems to us a shame now that any person would want to blot out about the only public historical mention of this old pioneer. The citizens should over a quarter of a century?

The organisation of the Native Sons of Oregon should hold a meeting and condemn this proposed measure as one of its fundamental principles is "to preserve intact the historical names of Oregon."

EUGENE SKINNER-CHARNEL MULLIGAN.

The City of Eugene was named from one of the founders of the town. Eugene Skinner gave forty acres to the county, bounded by Eighth, Pearl, Olive and Fifth streets, or very nearly those boundaries. On the south Char-Mulligan gave forty bounded very nearly by Eighth, Pearl, Olive and Eleventh streets. Afterward one street was named from the giver-Charnelton street.

Now some member, or members of the city council would change the name of a street that has borne given name of Mulligan those many years to that of a president. What good reason is there for the change of name that is locally historical to one that has no significance? Charnelton has been a satisfactory name for forty years, and is known to all persons having interests along the street, or in street names, by that name.

It should not be changed. As well change the name of the town that was named from the donator of the north forty acres to suit some latter-day whim.

"MONEY TO BURN."

Secretary Gage, of the Treasury, recently ordered the counterfeit money, apparatus, etc, in the possession of the Secret Service Bureau destroyed. Seyen hundred and eighty-four thousand dollars in notes, \$45,647 in coins, about fifty pairs of metal molds, 133 steel dies, 697 sets of plaster of paris molds, 183 steel, copper and zinc plates, and several tons of apparatus, instruments, advertising matter

and other things were disposed of. Of the notes destroyed \$760,000 were captured in the famous Brockway raid in New York in 1895. The money was mostly in \$500 Lincoln head gold notes and \$100 Canadian notes. This was one of the most celebrated counterfeit cases in the world. The plates from which the notes were made were destroyed at the same time. The money plates had been held by the secret service on account of further indictments pending against Dr Bradford.

The Register says the name "Charnelton," applied to a street in Eugene, possesses no significance, and that if it had been named Mulligan it would have been different. The street was named from Charnel Mulligan. If one is food that has the tact to get name possesses no significance why should the other? It is a very fine distinction without any difference. If it may be sought to perpetuate the last name of an individual why not the first, especially when the name is not of the ordinary?
