PROTECTION A "COLOSSAL FRAUD."

Andrew Carnegie quite business with \$200,000,000 in cash. How did he get so vast a sum? Primarily through the favor of the Government, which "protected" him against foreign competition during long years, while he used his opportunity to deny to labor its just share and at the same time to export from consumers unconscionable prices. The donation of \$10,000,000 which he is now making so ostentatiously in Scotland was taken away from those to whom it rightfully belonged in America. Observe that Carnegie got this money under pretense of "protecting" the American workingman. It is a consistent outcome of the whole colossal fraud that the money now goes to Europe.

It is needless to remark that the Oregonian would not tell the truth about the protective tariff robbery if there was an election on hand. Anyway the millions piled up by Carnegie, Rockefeller, and men of their ilk, have been unjustly taken from the people through the operation of special laws. The Oregonian says all when it says the piling up of the immense Carnegie fortune was made possible "through the favor of the government," while he denied "to labor its just share," and extorted "from consumers unconscionable prices." Nothing more could be added in condemnation of the folly of protection.

PORTLAND'S ANNUAL HIGH WATER.

Portland will have no flood this June. Indications are that the Columbia has reached its high-water stage, 18.8 feet at Portland from backwater. The Columbia can furnish plenty of water when all conditions are favorable—big snows in the mountains that feed it, a cold backward spring, then sudden summer heat to bring the snow out with a rush.

In the centennial year Portland had 33 feet of water much of the business portion of the city being submerged. The Dalles, though, broke all records, the water piling up a height of 59 feet and 7 inches above low water. It was not backwater at that town, either, it being situated on the bank of the river. To anyone who is familiar with the width of the great river at The Dalles the volume of water poured out in such a flood stage is simple inconceivable.

The Oregon Timberman says that "experience has demonstrated in order to get the best results from Oregon oak for finishing purposes, and prevent checking, it should be boiled for 24 hours, stacked and laid away in a dark room for seasoning, which requires at least a year. At the end of this time the lumber is in condition to use for any purpose required." That it makes an elegant finish will not be questioned by anyone who has observed the interiors of the Loan and Savings and First National banks of Eugene. Our Oregon oak makes a rich and elegant finish when properly seasoned and worked.

A Pendleton justice of the peace is entitled to a leather medal, and the whole hide is none too large. INQUEST HELD.

Coroner's Jury Investigated Cause of John Sappingfield's Death.

Coroner Griffin and a jury consisting of S. M. Yoran, B. D. Paine, J. M. Howe, Ed. Hanson, Al. Hampton and S. R. Williams, this afternoon held an inquest over the body of John Sappingfield who died last evening at 7:30 o'clock.

The inquest was the result of a remark supposed to have been made by a certain physician to the effect that death was caused by some medicine given the deceased man by another physician.

Several witnesses have been examined, and the testimony shows conclusively that the man came to his death from natural causes.

THE VERDICT.
The jury returned the following verdict at 4:45 o'clock this afternoon:

We, the jury empaneled by the coroner of Lane county, Oregon, to investigate the cause of the death of J. W. Sappingfield, find from the evidence that his death was the result of natural causes, there being no evidence whatever to admit of any other opinion.

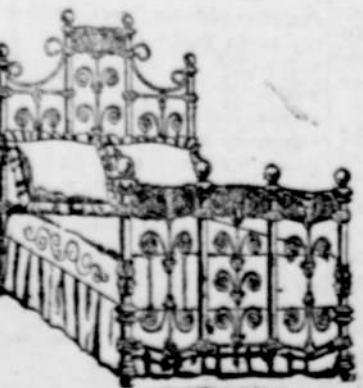
