AT THE UNIVERSITY

Last Assembly of the Year Held This Morning.

TROPHY CUPS PRESENTED.

Daily Guard May 29
The last assembly for the school year was held in Villard Hall this morning with a full attendance.

President Frank Strong delivered a splendid address to the students, in which he reviewed the work of the University during the past year, spoke of the future prospects of the institution, which are very bright, and admonished the students to work for an increased attendance next year between now and the time for the opening of the sessions in September.

TROPHY CUPS PRESENTED.

An interesting feature of the assembly this morning and which was quite a surprise to most of the students, was the presentation of a beautiful silver cup each to Roy Heater, Clyde Payne and C E Wagner, the athletes who have made the most points in the three big field meets participated in this season by the University's track team, Mr Heater having made 67; Mr Payne 24 and Mr Wagner 21.

The cups are the gift of J O Waite, the jeweler, who has always taken a great interest in University athletics and has been foremost among our business men in assisting the athletic association financially and otherwise. The presentation of the cups was made by C N Mearthar, who has so successfully managed the affairs of the track team this year.

BETTER TELEPHONE SYSTEM

Would Be Put in if Company Would Be Allowed to Trim Trees.

E J Corcoran, superintendent of construction for the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Co, was in Eugene yesterday looking into the feasibility of establishing in this city a complete, first-class telephone system, one which would be a credit to any city, and one which would give splendid service at all times.

An ingerman, foreman of the construction gang which has just finished long distance lines to Waltherville, Natron and Pleasant Hill, today told a reporter that the only thing that has kept the company from improving its Eugene service thus far is the refusal of the property owners to have the shade trees trimmed to a height so as not to interfere with the wires.

Mr Ingerman says he is authorized to state that his company will put in 50-foot poles all over the city if allowed to trim the trees to give a 10-foot clearance. If this privilege is granted a system of 350 or 400 phones would soon be in operation, whereas there are now only 150 on the local exchange.

If these improvements are made it means an expenditure of from \$5,000 to \$10,000 in this city and the employment of several more persons.

Several owners of property in the city have been interviewed on the question, and quite a number are in favor of the proposition. Others will soon be seen, and if sufficient encouragement is given the company will immediately proceed with the extensive improvements.

CITY COUNCIL.

Met in Special Session Last Night—Sewer Ordinances.

Daily Guard, May 29
The city council met in special session at the city hall last evening for consideration of sewer ordinances and other business. Present, Mayor Chrisman, Councilmen Osburn, Roney, Peter, White, Barker, Green.

Remonstrance of property owners against construction of sewer between Sixth and Seventh streets and to extend from Charleston to Madison street, on motion of Councilman Roney was laid on the table and an ordinance relating to the construction of said sewer was placed upon its final passage and adopted. It was further ordered the ordinance be amended that it may provide for the extension of said sewer to Monroe street.

An ordinance providing for the construction of a sewer commencing at a point on the south side of Eleventh street at the alley between High and Pearl streets, thence east along Eleventh street to Alder street, thence south to Thirteenth street, if found practicable, was adopted by the council.

On motion of Councilman Peter the matter of furnishing the night police with suitable dark lanterns was referred to the committee on police and printing.

Petition from members of the Fort-nightly Club asking that the council pass an ordinance in accordance with an act of the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon, to give aid and assistance by the levying of a tax for a public library, on motion of Councilman Osburn was referred to the committee on finance.

Letters from the Postal and Western Union Telegraph, Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph and the Eugene Electric Light & Power Companies, in which said companies grant council permission to erect picards bearing the names and numbers of streets upon their poles, were read before the council by Recorder Dorris and ordered placed on file.
