

JUSTICE HARLAN ON INSULAR CASE.

If a particular race will not assimilate with our people, and cannot with safety to our institutions be brought within the operation of the Constitution, that is a matter to be thought of when it is proposed to acquire their territory by treaty. When the acquisition of territory becomes complete, by cession, the Constitution necessarily becomes the supreme law of such new territory, and no power exists in any department of the Government to make "concessions" that are inconsistent with its provisions. The authority to make such concessions implies the existence in Congress of power to declare that constitutional provisions may be ignored under particular or embarrassing circumstances. No such dispensing power exists in any branch of our Government. The Constitution is supreme over every foot of territory, wherever situated, under the jurisdiction of the United States, and its full operation cannot be stayed by any branch of the Government in order to meet special or extraordinary emergencies. If the Constitution is in force in any territory, it is in force there for every purpose embraced by the objects for which the Government was obtained.

A CURIOUS WILL.

A rather peculiar will was made at Oregon City several years ago, while later developments in the character of a legate singularly have fitted themselves to the legal document. Under the terms of the will two brothers McNamara, minors, inherited valuable property at Oregon City with the condition that should either of the brothers fail to bear a good reputation on arriving at the age of twenty-one the other should heir all the property. One of them has proved a hard customer, having been an inmate of the State Reform School, also serving time in Washington and Multnomah county jails. He is now in jail at Hillsboro on the serious charge of larceny from a store. It seems that the testator had reason to mistrust the boy, else made a good guess.

A novel race took place on Lake Erie yesterday, when two great steamers lined up for a hundred mile dash from Cleveland to Erie. It was a close race, too, the winner having but one minute and thirty-four seconds of advantage. The boats measured 324 feet and 78 feet beam, and 320 feet and 70 feet beam, respectively. It is probable that the contest lacked one interesting part of the old-time Mississippi river races where, it is said, a negro was occasionally perched on the rod to hold the safety valve down.

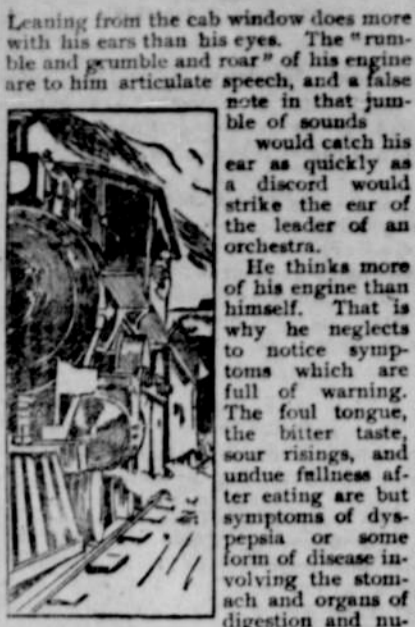

FROM PALOUSE, WASH.

James A. Ebbert Makes an Interesting Talk Concerning Things in General.

James A. Ebbert returned from the Palouse, Wash. country this morning. He says crops are looking fairly well in that country, but that the producing element are poorly off, as the price is low and the yield of wheat is running not over 15 bushels to the acre, and all articles consumed are very high. He thinks the trusts will ruin the farmers. While absent he sold all his wheat holdings in the Palouse, amounting to between 25,000 and 30,000 bushels. He says many of the farmers in that section are three years back with their interest, and that only high prices will save them. To show how the yield is running down, he informs us that six or seven years ago his portion of rent nearly averaged 15 bushels per acre, while today it will average only a little above five. And in this connection, he told us that hereafter he will only raise enough wheat here in Lane county to make bread. He will sow his fields to clover and sheep it.
