GOING TO WORK.

The Southern Pacific Co. Will Improve Lines in Oregon.

SPLENDID NEWS.

PORTLAND, Or, June 13.—The S. P. R. Co. will make extensive improvements on their Oregon lines this summer. As soon as practicable the steam shovel will be moved to the river pit at Harrisburg and will re-ballast their entire main line, placing about 15 inches of gravel upon the roadbed. This will place the roadbed up to the standard of Eastern roads.

On the Mohawk line ballasting will commence about July 1st. Roadmaster Waite is now on that branch making preliminary arrangements for this work and it is said he has found a good bed of gravel easily accessible to the road. It is reported that President Hays will put all of the Southern Pacific lines in first-class order.

OREGONIAN SUED.

B. F. Harvey Wants \$25,000 and Costs for Libel.

PAPERS FILED.

B. F. Harvey, by his attorneys, A. C. Woodcock and L. Blythe, this afternoon at 4 o'clock filed a suit against The Oregonian Publishing Company, of Portland, asking damages in the sum of \$25,000, at the June term of the Lane county circuit court.

The complaint alleges that plaintiff is a married man and has been a resident of Lane county for 10 years; that Hugh Patterson was arrested and convicted at Roseburg of the crime of rape upon Winnie Thorne and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. That by the publication of an article in said Oregonian of Dec 2, 1900, the said defendant maliciously composed, printed and published said Harvey in said newspaper, said Sunday Oregonian, and extensively circulated and distributed in said Sunday Oregonian newspaper the false, malicious and libelous matter by and through said newspaper. [Here the article is set in full.]

Plaintiff alleges that the article is false, malicious defamatory and libelous matter. That by reason of the premises said plaintiff, B. F. Harvey, is and has been greatly damaged in his good name and reputation in the sum of \$25,000.

Therefore plaintiff demands judgment against the Oregonian for the sum of \$25,000 and for the costs and disbursements of this action. This case will come up for trial in this city at the term of court beginning June 24, 1901.

Harvey was a brakeman on the P. R. R. and was accused of raping Winnie Thorne, of Cottage Grove, in connection with one Hugh Patterson. Harvey was acquitted while Patterson was convicted.

The bride is one of Salem's most plished and highly respected young ladies, having been reared and educated in this city, and is esteemed very highly by her wide circle of friends. The groom is also widely known in Salem, having lived here for a number of years engaged in the lumber business as a member of the Goodale Lumber Co. He is a member of some of the leading fraternal orders in this city and is held in the highest esteem by his host of associates and friends, a young man of sterling qualities and possessed of exceptional business ability.

Trainer King Resigns.

John F. King, trainer for the past nine years of the Multnomah Club's track athletes, has resigned. In speaking of his resignation Mr. King said: "I have severed my connection with the club because I don't think the track men are being treated as they should be, and because my efforts to rebuild the club team have reached in naught, as regards assistance from the officials of the club."

"In my opinion, the club is showing tennis to take place over track and field sports. Unless radical changes are made, Multnomah will never witness the day when she will again wear victory from the University of Oregon athletic team."

Miss Patterson takes Miss Grimes' place at the Central school, Miss Grimes being promoted to the seventh grade. Miss Read takes Miss Kern's place at the Geary school, Miss Kern being advanced to the High School. Prof. Gordon has been promoted from the seventh grade at the Central school to the eighth grade at the Geary school.

A superintendent will not be elected until next year. The board has decided to hold the position open until the next year and the grades a-grade school.

Wallace, of the First Congregational church of Eugene, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon to the senior class. The exercises will be held in Villard hall and the churches of the city will close on that day.

Monday evening the closing exercises of the school of music will be held.

Tuesday is class day, and the usual annual festivities will be indulged in. On that day the class of 1901 will dedicate a bronze plate to the memory of the late Professor Edgar McClure, who lost his life on Mount Rainier, in July, 1897. The plate will be located at the entrance of the new science hall. Miss Grace Ivorita Wold will deliver the class oration, and Miss Esther E. Johnson will read the address.

At 6:30 p. m. the annual banquet and flower procession will take place on the campus, after which the Rev. H. W. Kellogg, of Portland, will deliver the University address.

Wednesday will be alumni day, during which the various classes will hold convocations and the general alumni convocation and annual business meeting. The alumni banquet will be held in Villard hall at 3 p. m., and many prominent guests are expected to be present. Among them will be Governor and Mrs. T. T. Geer. The president's reception will be held in the evening.

THE CELEBRATION

Two Days' Festivities Are Planned.

SHAM BATTLE A FEATURE.

The Fourth of July celebration committee held another meeting in E. R. Skipworth's office last night to further arrange the details of Eugene's big celebration. Committees from various civic organizations of the city assured the general committee that they were in accord with the movements of the committee and that they could be depended upon to take an active part in the celebration. Otto Gilstrap and Chris Kaufman were appointed to arrange for the "plug ugly" parade.

It has been decided by those in charge to have a two-days celebration, which will be one of the grandest ever held in the valley. On the third there will be horse-racing, blue rock pigeon shooting, baseball games, and following out the GUARD's suggestion, the committee is arranging for a sham battle to occur in the forenoon, to be participated in by the Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., which will break camp that day, after a week's encampment at Bangs' Park. In the evening of the third there will be a grand ball in the Armory.

On the Fourth there will be the most elaborate parade ever held in the city, literary exercises in the Park, horse races, the "plug ugly" parade, etc., and in the evening five-works and another dance in the Armory. The famous Fourth Regiment band and other musical organizations to be engaged later will furnish music.

With the one-fare rate to be made by the S. P. R. R. large crowds from other towns along the railroad will attend our celebration besides the usual big turnout from the rural districts of the county.

Indications of Oil.

Kretzer & Son. The Kretzers are now down 100 feet and are in a black rock. Water taken from the shallow shows drops of oil that are thought to indicate the presence of petroleum. The elder Kretzer stated that he is confident that oil will be found, and his work will be prosecuted until a complete demonstration has been made one way or the other.
