

AN INFECTED RAT.

The people of Tokio, Japan, were scared about the first of the month—badly scared, and probably have not yet fully recovered from the fright. And it was all about a rat. A Yokohama May 30th dispatch, via Victoris, B.C., June 15th, tells the story:

Much consternation has been awakened by the escape of a rat at Tokio. The medical authorities of the Imperial University engaged in experimenting on some rodents in the introduction of plague bacilli into their veins; one of the animals eluded their vigilance, and as a consequence several have recently been discovered in the hospital, infected with the disease. As a result, the war against them has assumed huge proportions. The Tokyo municipality has voted 30,000 yen, rat-traps for the thousand and are distributed among the people, and a bounty of 5 sen each offered for their capture.

THE LAST OIL DISCOVERY.

The Texas oil-field says the Engineering and Mining Journal, which is now exciting so much interest, is undoubtedly an important one. New discoveries are constantly extending its known limits, and it seems quite possible that it may be found to cover a large part of Eastern Texas and Western Louisiana. That the output of oil will be very large is now certain, and it may have an important effect as a fuel supply; but it is safer to await developments before claiming too much.

The size of some of the successful wells and the nature of their flow make the discoveries in the Texas field resemble those of Baku and the phoron peninsula, in Russia, rather than any other oil-field in this country. The district, however, seems to be of greater extent than the Baku field.

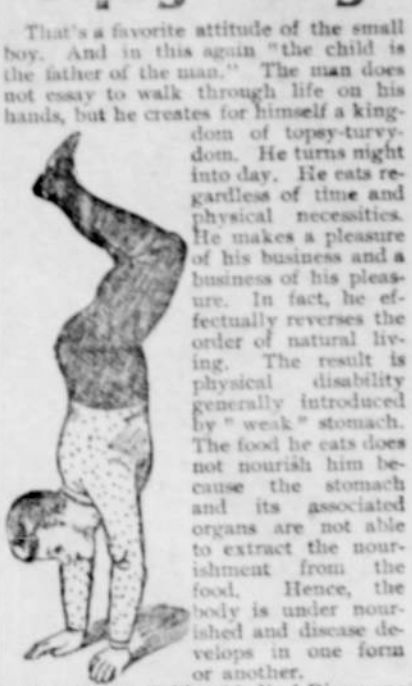
