San Francisco had a very sensational suicide last week when a doctor after holding the officers who sought to arrest him at bay for several hours swallowed carbolic acid just after being arrested on a charge of criminal malpractice.

A Portland woman sold her two-week-old baby to a Chinaman a few days ago. It was rescued by the authorities. This sale brings out the statement that in purchasing white babies Chinese purchasers confine themselves to girls, and those must be blondes with blue eyes—the very opposite of the Mongol.

The cable reports say that when General Calles and staff surrendered the other day in the Philippines that the General wept. Still there is a discrepancy, as the report adds that Calles informed General Sumner, to whom the surrender was made, that it was a "happy day for Laguna Province." The Associated Press reporter must have got things mixed. It could hardly have been that the Filipino insurgent general was weeping for joy.

The Roaring Gimblet mine out near Grant's Pass is a roaring gimblet, indeed. The property was first bonded by Sanborn, Rees & Sutton, three miners from California, several months since. Inside of two weeks these men removed \$12,000 from pocket strikes made in the mine. Dr. R. C. Ray then bonded the property, and after ten days of unsuccessful work, delivered it back to the original owners. The owners went to work Thursday, and Sunday brought in \$3200 from another pocket.

A remarkable find of gold has just been made in the vicinity of what is known as the Big Bend of Snake river near Payette. A pit that an eastern firm has dug at a cost of \$8000 to the depth of 85 feet gives the following: At a depth of 40 feet the gravel went \$8 per yard; at 50 feet, \$12; at 60 feet, \$20; at 85 feet, \$27. It is a conglomerate gravel deposit and is found to extend over a distance four miles wide and 10 long, and lies under what is called a quartzite rock four feet thick. All the ground has been staked off for miles.

He labors all the week through with his hands and earns his own living and teaches his children to work for a living and on Sunday he fills his pulpit and gives all indications of being perfectly sane and in good health morally and physically. He is an Episcopalian.

MONUMENTS UNVEILED.—The monuments over the graves of R. A. Delp, of Goshen, and Chas. Stevens, of Springfield, erected in Laurel Hill cemetery, between Eugene and Springfield, by the Woodmen of the World, were unveiled with due ceremony yesterday afternoon by the Eugene and Springfield camps. A large number of people from both towns and from adjacent country were in attendance and the exercises were very impressive. The address of the occasion by J. M. Williams, of Eugene, was highly spoken of.

STERILIZED MONEY.—Owing to the existence of a scarlet fever epidemic in Keene, N. H., the local bank now sterilizes all the money which passes through its hands. The notes and coins are placed in a galvanized iron oven lined with asbestos and heated by means of a Bunsen burner. A thermometer is provided to show the interior temperature at all times. The oven is heated to 300 degrees when in use.

SHEEP, CATTLE AND GOATS.—C. L. McElroy and Owen Howe of this city, who have leased the John Sellers ranch of 900 acres at Cloverdale, about 10 miles from Eugene, will place there some time in August about 700 head of sheep besides a number of cattle and goats. There is good money in stock and these young men will doubtless make a success of their venture.

HIGH MID TURTLE.—It is not often a mud turtle gets as high up in the world as one found by a GUARD reporter last evening. It was moving about at almost the highest point on Skinner's Butte. Boys probably had carried the turtle on the butte, as of itself it would not have left the river and made the climb over an eighth of a mile of dry land to a waterless place.

He formerly resided in Eugene and is the son of Mrs. M. J. Gray, of this city, who together with Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Gray and Dr. Gray, will go to Oakland on tonight's train to attend the funeral tomorrow.

GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT.—Miss Stella Baker, of this city, has been appointed general superintendent for Oregon, Washington and Idaho of agencies of the Kellogg Publishing Co., of Chicago, a large book concern. She will leave soon on a tour of the principal points in her territory to visit the young ladies, and we wish her much success.

BASEBALL SUNDAY.—The lovers of baseball will have a chance to witness another good game before the season. Next Sunday the Ramblers and a picked team from the Fourth regiment, which will be in camp at Bangs' park at that time, will play a game. From 400 to 500 men in the regiment a splendid team ought to be selected and the Ramblers "will have to hurry" to win.

SCHOOL SAVINGS BANK.

Will Be Kept Open During Summer—Failed to Get Certificates.

The brick work on the new addition, 20x28 feet, to Mrs. Bausch's building occupied by Hampton Bros and W. C. Potts has been completed. Mr. Potts will vacate the building some time in July, the partitions will be taken out and Hampton Bros will have one of the largest stores in the city this fall.

While so much rain during this month has been disagreeable to townsmen, on the contrary has made all crops certain. However, haying has commenced and it too much rain falls from now on some damage is liable to be done.

Ed Hanson will commence the erection of his one-story brick business building on Ninth street July 1. The two-story frame building now occupying the lot will be sold, two or three parties already figuring on it. Misses Giffrey & Whiteaker, milliners will probably occupy the new building.

SIX HORSES KILLED.

Bridge Across Hills Creek Broke Down.

Geo. H. Small, of Silver Lake, arrived in Eugene this forenoon with a band of horses, having come across the Cascade mountains by the old Military wagon road.

Saturday while driving the horses, 27 in number, across the Hills creek bridge about 45 miles from Eugene, the bridge gave way, precipitating the horses to the rocks and water below, some 15 or 20 feet, killing six fine animals outright and crippling three more.

Mr. Small told a reporter that his loss is about \$450.

The bridge, which is about 60 feet long, is an old one and has been in a bad shape for some time. The stringers, which have been in use for over 16 years, were rotten, and when the horses were driven across, the stringers could not bear the weight and gave way with the above result.

Some time ago the county ordered the bridge repaired, and about \$90 worth of work was done on it, but the work seems to have done no good.

Mr. Small thinks it just and right that the county should pay for the horses killed and injured.

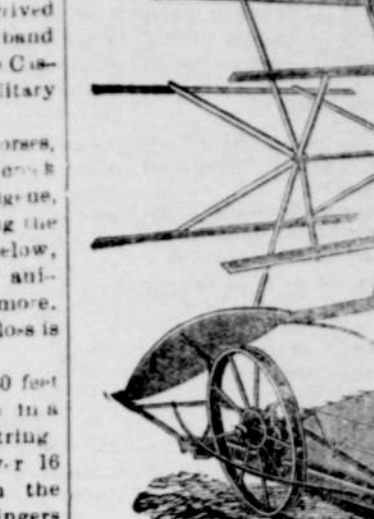
