FOURTH OF JULY.

Program of Exercises and Prizes for Contests.

GOOD SPORT PROMISED.

The Fourth of July committee has arranged the following program for the big celebration on the 3d on 4th of July and winners of prizes to be given the winners of various races, etc., as given below:

JULY 3RD.

Shawn battle on the side of Skinner's Butte in which the fort will be attacked and blown up. The battle will be fought between 9:30 a m and noon and about 600 men will be engaged in the fight. The militia band will disperse and give an open air concert at 4 p m and in the evening a dance at the armory.

JULY 4TH.

The Fourth will be ushered in by 45 guns fired from the top of Skinner's Butte, the firing to begin at sunrise. At 9:30 the procession will form on Oak street opposite the courthouse and headed by a grand marshal and aids will take the following line of march: North on Oak to Sixth, west to Willamette, thence south to Eleventh, east to Oak, north to Ninth, west to Charleston, north to Eighth, thence east on Eighth to the city park where the exercises of the day will be held.

First in line of procession will be grand marshal and aids. 2nd Little girls on bikes representing states, 3rd High School band, 4th Officers of the day, 5th City officials, 6th Grand Army, 7th Sons of Veterans, 8th Goddess of Liberty, 9th Ladies' organizations, senior organizations to take the lead; 10th Float Liberty bell, 11th Military band, 12th O N G, 13th Hook & Ladder Co, 14th Oregon Hose Team, 15th Rescue Hose Team, 16th Cyclone Hose Team, 17th Chemical Engine Co, 18th Floats by business men, 19th Citizens in carriages and on horseback.

THE PRIZES.

TROOPS ARRIVE.

The O. N. G. Encampment at Bangs' Park Begins.

"CAMP BEEBE."

The annual encampment of the Fourth Regiment, Oregon National Guard, has begun. This morning at 8:30 o'clock Companies A and C of this city proceeded to the park, pitched their tents, established guard lines and waited until the other six companies arrived. The remainder of the regiment came in on the 2 o'clock train, three companies from the south and three from the north. After getting their formation they were marched out to camp, their packs and baggage being hauled out in drays.

The camp is known as "Camp Beebe," in honor of Brigadier General Chas Beebe, of Portland, who has long been in the service of the National Guard and who has labored hard to bring the state troops to their present proficiency.

A week of hard work is before the boys, as the drills will be long and often, but no doubt plenty of enjoyment will be had between drills.

LUCKY LANE COUNTY BOYS.

Schrimpf Brothers Make a Rich Mine Discovery in Josephine County.

Grants Pass, June 28.—News reached here today of another discovery of a rich body of ore at the Schrimpf mine, on Applegate river, the district in which the mine is located being about 10 miles southwest of Grants Pass.

Schrimpf Brothers, who own the mine, brought in specimens of ore from the mine. It is a free, granulated gold, thickly distributed in a white and gray quartz. The ore will run many thousand dollars to the ton. It was only a few weeks ago that a pocket containing \$500 in gold was removed from the Schrimpf. This is comparatively a new working and its development and results are watched with much interest by mining men of the district.

The Schrimpf Brothers lived on the Blair farm adjoining Eugene, for some time several years ago, then out west about Crow postoffice. They have been engaged prospecting and mining in the vicinity where the discovery was made for about three years past.
