WHY SHOULDN'T HE?

George Miller has leapt into prominence by pulling down the flag at Skagway—the British flag. It waved above the stars and stripes and his patriotism, perhaps some thought of notoriety, prompted him to haul the Britisher down. We know that Miller is cool-blooded, will fight if necessary, and his snap judgment on the red ensign does not surprise us. Under the above head, "Why Shouldn't He?" the Portland Telegram remarks:

George Miller, a Eugene, Oregon, man, hauled down a British flag in Skagway the other day, that it seems was floating over the American flag, which act, it is stated, "caused intense excitement," and on account of which the Canadian Government will demand an apology from Uncle Sam.

Unless the flag was floating over a British consul's official residence, why shouldn't an American citizen lower it from a position of honor over the American flag, on American territory? Or has the Administration secretly given the site of Skagway to Canada, as it gave the Porcupine district on the southern edge of Alaska? Since when has Skagway become a Canadian town? And has the United States any territory left that is of value, and that Canada covets up in Alaska?

It appears that the Canadian officials have been gradually encroaching on United States territory until they have audaciously squatted down in Skagway itself, where they have no more official right than they have in Tillamook. Hurrah for George Miller, of Eugene, Oregon! He is a true-blue American.

A SIDEWALK NUISANCE.

There are many miles of sidewalk in Eugene, and it is not surprising that the dry weather finds many defective places that in winter are swollen tight from the rains.

This is the time to repair them—put in a new stringer or a few new boards and nail down the loose ones. The street committee and street commissioner should commence early in the work of repairs. Public notice should be given, also personal notice to owners of property where walks are defective. There is no excuse for the rattling spring-board sections of walk that are to be found in many places. If the property-owner lacks pride in his premises the city should compel the necessary repairs. It costs little but will add largely to public comfort.

EMOTIONAL INSANITY DEFENSE.

A New Jersey judge in his charge to the jury on a murder trial used good logic as to the emotional insanity defense. He said in part: The suggestion that a person can be entirely sane immediately before and immediately after the doing of some particular act, and yet be insane at the instant that the act was committed, may well serve as a psychological problem to interest the ingenious and daring speculations of the alienists, but it has no recognition in law, and the courts of this state have repudiated this species of insanity as constituting a defense to a criminal prosecution.

Here are some sorrowful figures: A bluebook on India just issued by the British government shows that £18,390,000, [\$99,000,000], was expended for the relief of famine sufferers during the year 1899-1900. The mortality from the plague for the five years ending March, 1901, was nearly 600,000. The census completed in March, 1901, shows that the increase in population during the past 10 years was only 5,000,000 to 6,000,000, instead of the normal 19,000,000. The loss represents deaths and a stoppage of the natural increase in consequence of the famine.
