There is one official in New York City whose life is not one "continued round of pleasure"—the Italian consul. His anarchistic countrymen are responsible for the keeping of the consulate in a seeming state of siege.

Joseph Ladue, the founder of Dawson City, died Wednesday evening at his home in Schuyler Falls, New York. He had not been well since his return from Alaska, and spent last winter at Colorado Springs in a vain search for health. He fell a victim to consumption, contracted in the severe northern climate.

An Italian nobleman has invented a method of checking the force of waves by means of nets made of waterproof hemp. One recently tried with success at Hayre was 306 feet long by 50 feet wide, with meshes eleven inches apart. The nets will break the waves at sea, and will also be a bulwark for hydraulic works against heavy surf.

The Columbia River salmon run has been very light so far this season. A deputy fish commissioner says that on examining the roe it was found hard and firm, and not fully matured, and that it would be some time before they would be ready to spawn. For this reason he believes that the fish are very backward this season and that is probable on this account that they have not yet entered the river.

The government must suppose that this old earth is rather shaky. Lanl has been purchased about the Naval Observatory at Washington for a radius of one thousand feet, the ostensible reason of the sale being to protect the delicate instruments which record the time of the country from jar.
