FIRST BANK ACCOUNT.

RULES OF LIFE.

Twenty new locomotives which have been put into service on the New York Central road are the largest passenger engines in use on any road in the world, and are expected to make from 105 to 127 miles an hour. Each of these engines is thirty-four feet long. Including pilot and tender, the total distance covered on the track by the locomotive is sixty-three feet three and three quarters inches. The driving wheels are seventy nine inches high. The roof of the cab rises nearly fifteen feet above the track. The firebox is so big it looks like that of a large stationary engine. A peculiar feature of the engine is the placing of its ten wheels. Just behind the four mammoth drivers are two smaller traction wheels under the cab. In ordinary running these carry most of the weight of the cab and fire box. But when on an upgrade with a heavy load to pull and the drivers slipping, a new mechanism is used. By the turn of a lever in the cab 10,000 pounds of weight is shifted from the traction wheels to the driving wheels. This makes the drivers grip the track with just so much added power.

Notice—Sale for Tax Certificates.

Whereas, an act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, (H B No 11) approved February 23, 1901, requires that all lands upon which this and all counties in the state hold certificates for taxes, issued more than two years ago, shall be sold at public auction; and

Whereas, there exists doubts in the minds of some, as to the validity of sales made under this act:

It is therefore ordered, that in case of the failure of title to any tract or tracts of land so sold by the Sheriff of Lane county during this present year, A D 1901, and to which the title conveyed or attempted to be conveyed by the Sheriff's deed therefor shall be set aside and annulled by any court of competent jurisdiction, or whenever satisfactory evidence shall be produced to this Court that such Sheriff's deed is for any reason invalid and insufficient to pass the title to the lands therein described, there shall be refunded to the purchaser or his assigns the full amount of the purchase price paid therefor, without interest, less any sum received by such claimant from the redemption, and a warrant issued therefor.

CROP OUTLOOK.

About 800,000 Bushels of Wheat for Lane County This Year.

It is estimated that the wheat crop of Lane county this year will amount to 800,000 bushels, or more than an average crop. About 500,000 bushels will be for export. Other crops promise equally well. Oats are filling better than usual, and will yield a good crop. The hay crop is being harvested, and will be the largest for years. Hops are doing well where they have been properly tended, and vegetables of all kinds are yielding abundantly. The fruit crop is one of considerable importance, and will turn out well. Especially is this true of prunes, the principal export fruit.

AT THE CANNERY.

Royal Ann Cherries Are Being Worked on Exclusively.

A busy scene presented itself to the eyes of a reporter as he visited the Eugene cannery this forenoon. On entering the building one beholds a bevy of girls and women busily engaged in stemming and assorting the big luscious Royal Ann cherries while others are weighing them, putting them in the cans for sealing and marking the cans. There are about 50 girls and women employed at this work at present but the number varies according to the amount of cherries coming in. Some days a larger number than that are employed, as high as 75 working on a rush day.

Besides the girls and women, a number of men are employed, whose duty it is to do the cooking, which is done in huge vats after the cherries are in the cans, to seal the cans and do the other heavier work.

The cannery is working at present on Royal Ann cherries exclusively. They are coming in at a rapid rate, a large amount arriving by rail from different points up and down the road as well as by team from the immediate surrounding country. The company is paying three cents per pound for the fruit.

No shipments will be made from the cannery until after the cherry season is finished when the entire output will be shipped at once.

After the work of putting up cherries is completed other fruits will be worked on, and everything in the fruit line being plentiful this year, a successful season's run is anticipated.
