

DELAYED JUSTICE.

The election of Dr E Benjamin Andrews to a membership in the board of trustees of Brown university has connected with it incidents that tend to make one believe that even in these commercial and matter-of-fact days postical justice occasionally gets in its work in as fine a shape as ever it did in the golden age, says the Baker City Herald.

Four years ago Mr Andrews was president of Brown university. The money question was then the leading political topic of the day. Dr Andrews was a believer in bimetalism, and did not hesitate to make known his views. One of the members of the corporation of Brown university was Congressman Joseph H Walker, who posed in the house of representatives as the leading New England champion of the gold standard. As soon as this gentleman heard that Dr Andrews had the audacity not only to be a silver man, but to admit the fact, he proceeded to get after him. A bitter warfare was waged against President Andrews, and at last Mr Walker was successful in forcing him to resign his chair. In the meantime Mr Andrews had been offered the superintendency of the Chicago schools by Mayor Harrison, and he went West.

Now Dr Andrews is among the directors of Brown university, having been chosen almost unanimously by the alumni of the corporation at a recent meeting. Mr Walker, in the meantime, has been retired from congress and forced back into private life, with not enough influence to make his opposition to Dr Andrews even annoying, much less formidable. Commenting on the return of Dr Andrews, the Post says:

"It is an incident instructive of the folly of allowing politics of the hour to interfere with the conduct of our great educational institutions, and of the subsidence of the issues which seemed so vital in our politics only a few years ago."

There are those who will not yet admit that the issues in question have subsided, but it is certain that the rancor they have engendered is fast dying out, and a man can now avow a belief that bimetalism would be beneficial to the country without danger of being denounced as a maniac or an anarchist.

WEARS OUT MULES.

About 250,000 horses and mules have been purchased by the British government in the southwestern part of the United States for use in the Transvaal during the war against the Boers. Traders who have dealt with the English army officers who have been sent to this country for the purpose declare that the cost to England per span of mules delivered in South Africa is more than \$500. The British are still in the market for good animals.

When it is considered that they have purchased a quarter of a million of mules in this part of the world alone, the question is asked, "What has become of them?"

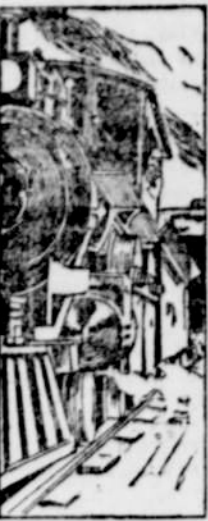
The average life of a horse in South Africa is about ninety days. Soon after the outbreak of hostilities against the crown a good, sturdy animal would live for only a few weeks' service as the bearer of an English cavalryman. His life has now shortened, because the fields are bare of grass, and when the cavalryman gets a new mount he rides it until it is weakened by starvation and then a bullet ends its life.

The Texas horses and mules have given better service than any secured by the British officers.

The method of getting lands by drawing, which is to be the plan in Oklahoma at the throwing open of the new reservations on August 6, 1901, will be less picturesque and exciting than the plan of getting them by running for them and pouncing on them which prevailed in the opening in 1889. On the whole, the new way will be better than the old. The 1889 plan gave an advantage to the young and sturdy, and those with fleet horses, while the 1901 method gives young and old, poor and well-to-do, an equal chance. He leaves a wife aged 73 years, who lives on the home place across the river, also a sister in Maryland. Mrs Grace Lamphire, of Burns, and Elbert Brown, now in California, daughter and son of Mrs T D Linton, are the deceased's grandchildren.
