LEWIS AND CLARK EXPOSITION

Souvenir Being Prepared Advertising Portland's Big 1901 Fair

PORTLAND, July 18.—The first ambitious effort to advertise the Lewis and Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition will soon start on its mission in the shape of a handsomely illustrated souvenir publication, prepared under direction of Oregon's Pan-American Exposition Commission. The matter was prepared in this city under the supervision of Peasele Brothers, and the type has been sent to Buffalo, where 25,000 copies will be struck off. As the publication is intended largely for distribution among the visitors to the Buffalo Fair, the freight on the paper is saved by printing at Buffalo 25,000 copies of the publication being no light package.

The subject matter was prepared with great care by a competent writer, and the illustrations are the best that could be procured. Typographically the publication will be a work of art. A comprehensive review is given of Oregon's resources, industries and opportunities. Considerable space is also devoted to Portland's prestige as a distributing center, her growing foreign commerce, her financial stability and her unexcelled traffic facilities. On the inside of the back cover there will be a map of Oregon, and upon the outside a map of the Pacific, showing the large territory that is to be benefited by the 1905 exposition on both sides of the water. The publication promises to be an effective medium for bringing not only Oregon but also the Lewis and Clark Centennial to the attention of the world.

YOUNGERS LEAVE PRISON

Bandits Have Served Twenty-five Years

AND HOPE TO GET HONEST EMPLOYMENT.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 18.—The release of Cole and Jim Younger from the penitentiary is the culmination of persistent and untiring efforts on the part of thousands of citizens of Missouri and Minnesota, covering nearly a quarter of a century.

Cole, Bob and James Younger, Jesse and Frank James, Charley Pitts and Clell Miller, after a long career of brigandage, dating from the outbreak of the civil war, came north into Minnesota in 1876, and on September 7 rode into the village of Northfield, drove the citizens indoors and raided the bank. Cashier Haywood was killed and the bank vault looted, while a portion of the band rode up and down the streets shooting at every person in sight. Just as the robbers prepared to depart, Charley Pitts was shot and killed by a citizen.

After five days' pursuit all the Younger brothers were surrounded in the woods near the Iowa border and all were wounded before they gave up. Clell Miller was killed. Frank and Jesse James escaped into Missouri. The Younger brothers were convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment. It was pretty well established that neither of the Youngers did any killing and this saved them from capital punishment.

Since their incarceration, Bob, the youngest, has died and Cole and Jim have been such model prisoners that state officials, clergymen and thousands of citizens of Minnesota have become interested in their behalf. For ten years the state legislature has wrestled with the problem of liberating them, but either one branch or the other would kill the bill. Last winter, however, the state board of pardons was empowered to parole life prisoners. Archbishop Ireland, the late Senator C K Davis, the governors of Minnesota and Missouri, Senator Elkins and hundreds of other prominent persons have asked for their release.

Cole Younger was seen at the prison Saturday. He had just heard of the action of the board of pardons.

"It is hard to realize," he said, "that we are to gain our freedom. It will require some time to get accustomed to the changes that have been made since we were imprisoned. We have seen the electric light but electric railways, telephones, bicycles, automobiles and other modern improvements will make it a strange world to us. We have no fixed plans for the future. We cannot leave the state and hope to find suitable employment. We are old men now and cannot do heavy work."

Cole Younger is 56 years old and Jim is 54.

EARLY CLOSING.

Many Grocers Want to Close at 7 p. m.

A committee consisting of Mel Green, L C Skeels and J S Stiles circulated a paper among the different grocers of the city this morning for the purpose of getting them all to agree to close their stores at 7 o'clock each evening except Saturday. All but three of the grocers have signed the paper, and the committee hopes to obtain their signatures soon.

The following is the wording of the paper and the names of those who have signed it:

EUGENE, July 18, 1901.

We, the undersigned, agree to close our place of business at 7 o'clock every night of the week except Saturday night, commencing Monday, July 22, 1901, until dissolved by mutual consent; providing that commencing with the 15th of December, 1901, and ending with the 2nd day of January, 1902, each will keep open as long as he sees fit.

The New Chairman.

The Telegram says: "Samuel White, of Baker City, the new chairman of democratic state committee, is a native of Georgia and 41 years of age. His first try for the office of district attorney was made in 1896. This effort resulted in failure, but in 1898 he was elected and again in 1900. He is popular with all who know him and in the opinion of many Portland democrats his election to the chairmanship of the party organization is a wise move. The general impression prevails that this shake up in the democratic organization is in the interest of Geo E Chamberlain, district attorney for Multnomah county, who is being groomed by the democrats for the governorship. White and Chamberlain are known to be warm personal friends and there is no question that the democratic machine will now be trained to do Chamberlain's bidding and further his interests."
