EFFECT OF THE EXCLUSION LAW.

A preliminary statement of the Chinese population, derived from the returns of the twelfth census, was issued by Director Merriam. It shows that there are approximately 89,800 Chinese in the United States proper, as against 107,475 in 1890. About 7,700, or 75 per cent, are contained in the Western division of the states and territories, as against 96,944, or 90 per cent, in 1890. There were 72,472 Chinese in California alone in 1890, but this number has been reduced in 1900 to 45,753.

There has been a loss since 1890 of about 29,100 Chinese in the Western division of the states and territories, and a net loss for the United States proper of over 17,500. The states and territories outside of the Western division show as a whole a gain since 1890 of about 11,500 Chinese.

Besides the Chinese population in the United States proper, the twelfth census shows 3116 Chinese in Alaska in 1900, as against 2288 Mongolians (chiefly Chinese) at the census of 1890, and 25,767 Chinese in Hawaii in 1900, as against 6,242 in 1890.

There has been a remarkable increase in the number of Japanese in the United States since 1890, the preliminary figures of the present census showing a total for the United States proper of about 25,300, as against 2039 in 1890. The Japanese element is concentrated in the western division of the states and territories, this division containing 22,369 Japanese in 1900 as against 1669 in 1890.

There is a very large Japanese population in the Hawaiian Islands, the number in 1900 being 61,111, as against 3,120 in 1890. There were 265 Japanese reported in Alaska in 1900, as against perhaps a score or more only in 1890.

RAILROAD STATISTICS.

Abstracts From Interstate Commerce Commission's Report.

The Interstate Commerce commission announced an abstract of statistics of railways in the United States for the year ended June 30, 1900.

For thirteen years ended June 30, 1900, the total casualties comprised 86,277 killed and 46,027 injured.

Sixteen railroads went into receivership during the year ended June 30, 1900, while thirty-five were taken out of receivership on June 30, 1900. There was a decrease in capital stock represented by the roads in receivership as compared with the previous year of \$112,113,833, and in funded debt of \$199,003,718.

The aggregate railway mileage was 259,788, including 193,346 of single track. The commission's report includes 2023 railway corporations. The operated mileage of roads merged, re-organized or consolidated during the year was 9547 against 5846 for 1899.

The total number of locomotives and cars was 1,934,501. The railways averaged 20 locomotives and 733 cars for each 100 miles of line.

There were 1,017,653 railway employees of all classes and \$577,264,847 were paid in wages and salaries.

There were \$11,491,034,960 of railway capital outstanding, of which 54.34 per cent paid no dividend. The net earnings from railway operations were \$525,616,303, an increase of \$68,000,000 for the year. There were 576,865,230 passengers and 1,101,680,238 tons of freight carried.
