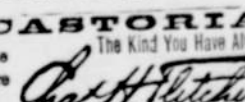
ENORMOUS FRUIT SALE.

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 31.—The California Cured Fruit Association to night sold twenty-four million pounds of prunes to Eastern buyers. Fifty thousand dollars spot cash were paid down, and the remainder, estimated at \$250,000, will be paid as soon as the fruit can be weighed and shipped.

FOREIGN GRAIN CROPS.

Diversity of Opinion at London Regarding Probable Wheat Supplies.

London, July 31.—There is great diversity of opinion among produce dealers here representing the probable supplies of wheat from Europe and America. The German crop is known to be unusually small, and consequently the proposed increase of duties upon imported grain will bear heavily against the industrial class. The French crop is reported to be lighter than last year's. Russian statistics are not trustworthy. American and Canadian crops will determine the course of prices throughout Europe as soon as satisfactory estimates are received.

More Postal Money Orders.

The postoffice department looks for a considerable increase in the money order business between the United States and Cuba, Canada and the Philippines, by reason of the adoption of its recent order doing away with the old "certification" process, and permitting the direct exchange of money orders. Heretofore a person in the United States sending a money order to one in Cuba, Canada or the Philippines has been compelled to send that order first to an "exchange office," where the order was certified and then forwarded to its destination for payment. This certification often caused delays of from one to two weeks, which will be entirely done away with under the new system. The same certification process was adhered to in Canada, Cuba and the Philippines with money orders coming to the United States.

Now, orders issued at an office in the United States and drawn on any money order office in Canada, Cuba or the Philippines, will be honored and paid without certification, and the same is true as to orders coming to this country. Not only is this saving in time, but in cost to the sender. Under the foreign exchange a charge of 1 per cent of the amount forwarded was made for transmission. Now but three-tenths of 1 per cent will be charged, as on local money orders. There was said to have been a great exchange of money between points in Alaska, Attin, and British Columbia. They formerly had to be sent to Victoria, now they go to Attin direct.

STREET FAIR.

Boise City to Have a Carnival—A New 6-Story Brick.

Boise, Idaho, Aug 1.—Boise is to have a street fair during the coming fall. An enthusiastic mass meeting was held last night for the purpose of discussing the advisability of a fair, which resulted in the appointment of committees who will see that the project is carried to a successful finish.

SIX-STORY BRICK.

Special to the Guard.

Boise, Idaho, Aug 1.—J C Lemp has determined to erect a handsome six-story brick building on the corner of Ninth and Main in this city. To supply the rapidly growing demand for offices and club rooms is the purpose of the proposed structure and it will be thoroughly equipped and supplied with all modern conveniences, including the natural hot and cold water for which Boise is famous. The new building will occupy one of the best corners in the business part of the city, just one block from the Idaho hotel, and when completed will be one of the finest structures between Portland and Salt Lake City. Work of construction will commence early in the spring. There is also a great demand for cottages and residences generally. Real estate dealers say it is impossible to supply the demand and, if so many were available, 150 dwelling houses could be rented at once.

Notice—Sale for Tax Certificates

Whereas, an act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, (H B No 11) approved February 23, 1901, requires that all lands upon which this and all counties in the state hold certificates for taxes, issued more than two years ago, shall be sold at public auction; and

Whereas, there exists doubts in the minds of some, as to the validity of sales made under this act:

It is therefore ordered, that in case of the failure of title to any tract or tracts of land so sold by the Sheriff of Lane county during this present year, A D 1901, and to which the title conveyed or attempted to be conveyed by the Sheriff's deed therefor shall be set aside and annulled by any court of competent jurisdiction, or whenever satisfactory evidence shall be produced to this Court that such Sheriff's deed is for any reason invalid and insufficient to pass the title to the lands therein described, there shall be refunded to the purchaser or his assigns the full amount of the purchase price paid therefor, without interest, less any sum received by such claimant from the redemptioner, and a warrant issued therefor.

Arrest, Trial and Sentence for Criminal Assault in One and a Half Hours.

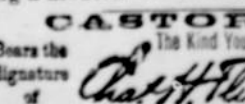

Two Opinions.

Public Monthly for July.

The action of the regents of the University of Oregon in prohibiting the erection of a Y M C A building on the University campus opens a wide field for discussion. Those opposed to the scheme contend that it would be contrary to both the spirit and the letter of the state constitution and contrary to public sentiment. They do not deny that the college Christian Association is an instrument of good, but they claim that there are some religious denominations whose members cannot be admitted to it. Those who favor the building project say that similar structures have been built on other state university grounds, but, on the other hand, it is argued that these same structures have been the cause of endless trouble. Although the Y M C A of the University of Oregon feels somewhat disappointed over the outcome of its plan, the vote of the board of regents was unanimous and public sentiment throughout the state seems to endorse their action.

The first wheat received at the Eugene flour mills this season was delivered this morning by Chas F Croner. It was grown on the Blair farm, just below town and averaged 26 bushels to the acre. This wheat is Australian Club and the seed was obtained in Rogue River valley, on account of the partial failure of the crop here last year.

The wheat is plump and runs 62 pounds to the bushel and is quite clean, different from most of that received last year, it being very dirty.

The wheat delivered by Mr Croner today was grown on a field which was sown to oats last year, and not summer fallow.
