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AN ABUSIVE ARTICLE

The Salem Journal Still Persists in Printing Misrepresentations.

AFTER THE EUGENE PAPERS.

Editorial in Salem Journal, Aug. 7.

Printing the statement, that judging from the catalog of the Eugene Divinity School, it was hard to tell whether it supplied a faculty for the State University or whether the State University supplied a faculty for the minister factory, has thrown the papers up there into a conposition fit. The party organ uses its usual last resort argument, that the writer who dares to criticize the Eugene established order is mentally defective, and as the Journal has a monopoly on paper and salt it gets the coarse articles hurled in its direction. Any smoothy who says yes, yes, to every skingame is a literary genius and is invited to address the students. The GUARD is wiser in its way. It printed The Journal's dissection of having a lot of five-foot frog materialism worked off on a theological seminary, and damned it with headlines, and the faint praise of a censorious paragraph, in which it boldly asserted that none of the professors of the State University did any teaching at all in the Divinity School, advertised to be on the edge of the campus. It does not deny that Straub, Washburn and other University professors are advertised as being THE faculty of the Divinity School, but it says they don't do any teaching. That is pretty rich when it is considered that the Divinity School turns out regular graduates in a theological course, and their diplomas authorizing them to preach must be signed up by this faculty or they are an empty form, null and void, binding in neither this world or any other.

The Register's reply is not to the merit of the matter, but in effect that the Journal is crazy, and as Dr. Paine, former superintendent of the asylum, is said to be a partner in the paper, it is no doubt true. The reply of the GUARD is not logical and convincing as an argument. In fact, it gets in up to the neck and can't holier for help, when it says the faculty of the Divinity School don't teach classes in the Divinity School. They must teach them in the University proper, and that is contrary to the statute and the constitution of this state, which forbids such thing, but of course, with great educators and teachers of morals and divinity that is too small to count. The regens recently removed a Y M C A building scheme as a bone of contention, on the ground that state property could not quarter a religious institution, but it seems they have not yet butted in against the theological faculty. When they take up the matter they will probably not take the statement of the Eugene papers but of the Divinity college catalog, as to whether the professors of the University are acting in the double role of the state educators and theological skin-grafters.

The sole issue raised by the Journal is this: Has the Divinity School at Eugene the legal right to advertise any attachment to the State University? That it does so advertise, its own pamphlet proves. Their leading card is that the Divinity School is connected, associated, affiliated, or some other old thing, with the State University. That is its strong suit card, and it has been played so strong that at the last commencement exercises held in the Campbell church at Eugene the president of the State University rather ironically confessed that he could hardly tell whether he was president of the University or the Divinity School. Of course, this must be taken as playful humor, or it would be the last camel for the president and faculty of the University. The Journal has the highest regard for their energy and executive ability, and this criticism is not directed against them personally but to save the state from harm, and to let no wrong be done through ignorance to the cause of education or the interests of religion, for under the constitution all are to be protected against charlatany. Why should any denomination seek to hitch up in partnership with the state? It will only be to the detriment of both. Calling this paper a liar is poor argument from editors living under the shadow of a divinity school on the edge of a university campus.

The article is false in many statements and misleading. The State University does not furnish the Divinity School with any professors. The Divinity School student merely has the advantage of taking the regular course in the University when he is studying in the Divinity School, if he so desires. When Editor Hofer writes this, he utters the worst kind of rot: "Any smoothy who says yes, yes, to every skingame, is a literary genius and is invited to address the students." Here's the trouble: Hofer is a "great orator" and he has not been invited to blow off steam to our poor students. Dr. Strong, here's a hint. Whether Dr. Paine is a partner in the Register we know not, and care less, but hardly think it true. And again, it should be remembered that Hofer has a Methodist college and a preacher factory in his own city, and we actually believe he is jealous of the remarkable success of Eugene's Divinity School. Oh, come off, Hofer,

and tell us something easy; how to grow strawberries, dig rock oysters at high tide, or how the Journal came to support Corbett, a solid goldback. Was it by accident?

To be serious, it is truly disgraceful in the Journal speaking of the Divinity School thusly. This institution is doing a grand, noble work, and Dean Sanderson is to be congratulated upon his success and especially upon the success of the school. Hofer will do no harm to either of the institutions; he will merely advertise them free of charge.

A SHORTER ROUTE

Proposed New Road to Florence.

SIXTEEN MILES TO BE BUILT.

Daily Guard, Aug 8

F M Nighswander, of Glenside, called at the GUARD office last evening and informed us that he has been circulating a paper among the residents of the Siuslaw and tributary countries to obtain subscriptions for the construction of a road from the mouth of Wildcat creek to Glenside, on the Siuslaw bay, shortening the route from Florence to Eugene by 22 miles.

Mr Nighswander's paper, when he showed it to us, contained 93 signatures, with a subscription of \$662 in work and money. At least \$1500 is needed to build this road. The gentleman laid the proposition before the commissioners' court, now in session, and that body agreed to appropriate \$350 toward the building of the road providing Douglas county would duplicate the amount, a good part of the proposed road being in that county. Mr Nighswander went to Roseburg last night to submit the matter to the commissioners' court there, taking with him a letter from County Judge H R Kincaid, of Lane, informing the court officials at Roseburg that our court had agreed to do as Mr Nighswander says.

A part of this road has already been constructed. From the mouth of Wildcat creek, west up Whiteaker creek, five miles of good road has been finished and from the Siuslaw bay east eight miles have been built, leaving only 16 miles of actual construction, the distance being 29 miles from point to point. The route of the proposed highway is pronounced a good one, following the watershed, with the Douglas county lakes on one side and the Siuslaw river and tributaries on the other. There are no big hills and the grade is any easy one, being only seven inches to the rod.

This road, if built, would be a good thing for Eugene and the whole western end of Lane county and the northwestern part of Douglas. It would bring to Eugene the trade of that section, much of which has been lost on account of the residents there being at great expense and time in reaching Eugene.

At present people wishing to go to Florence can only go as far as Mapleton by road and thence ride down the Siuslaw on boats the remainder of the way. If the new road is built they can go clear through to Glenside and simply have to cross the river to Florence.

If Mr Nighswander succeeds in getting an appropriation from Douglas county, upon his return he will call upon our business men asking them to donate provisions for the workmen during the construction of the road. No cash will be asked for in Eugene.

BACK FROM ROSEBURG

Mr Nighswander returned from Roseburg on this afternoon's train. The Douglas county commissioners' court is not in session, so he was unable to see any of the members of that body except the county judge. He informed Mr Nighswander that he is in favor of the appropriation and that the commissioners will also probably favor it when the matter is plainly set before them.

This afternoon Mr Nighswander said to a GUARD reporter: "You can tell the readers of your paper that the work of building this road will commence immediately and that they will have the pleasure of riding clear through to the bay on a wagon road inside of a year."

Aside from appropriating \$350 the Lane county court has agreed to furnish all tools and the powder for blasting.
