SOUTH AMERICAN WAR

Bloody Battle Between Colombian and Venezuelan Troops

ELEVEN HUNDRED CASUALTIES

WASHINGTON, August 15.—The state department is in receipt of dispatches that a fiercely fought and long-contested battle between Colombian and Venezuelan troops took place at Laspillas July 28.

The battle lasted twenty-six hours and eleven hundred were killed and wounded on both sides.

COLOMBIAN REBELLION.

WASHINGTON, August 15.—Heavy fighting is reported to have occurred Monday between Colombian and rebel troops on the isthmus near Panama and Colon.

The rebels have 25,000 men and are reported to be gaining ground.

A United States warship has been ordered to the Pacific side of the isthmus to protect American interests.

NEW YORK, August 15.—It is estimated that thirty thousand women and girls employed in the flannel waist and children's wear industries in this city will strike next week unless increased wages and a uniform day of labor are conceded by the owners of factories.

LEG BROKEN.

Casper Barsch Lay Out in Hot Sun Three Hours.

PLEASANT HILL, Aug. 15.—While hauling hay near this place yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock, Casper Barsch's team became frightened and commenced to run, and Mr. Barsch fell underneath the wagon, the wheels passing over him, breaking his left leg close up to the body.

For three hours or more the injured man lay in the open field with the hot sun beating down upon him at a temperature of over 100 degrees, suffering great pain, before assistance arrived. When found he was in almost a delirious state.

Dr. L. W. Brown, of Eugene, was sent for and he arrived later in the evening and set the broken bone. Mr. Barsch is resting easily at present.

THE PHILIPPINE VETERANS

May Hold Their Next Encampment at Portland.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Aug. 14.—Philippine veterans to the number of several hundred, attired in the stained khaki uniforms worn during their long service in the Philippines, paraded the streets of Salt Lake City today. The parade was the principal feature of the second day of the annual reunion of the army of the Philippines. The number of veterans present was greatly increased today, large contingents arriving from neighboring states. With the exception of a show business session, the afternoon was spent in sight-seeing and informal entertainments.

The selection of a city for the next annual encampment comes up tomorrow. Omaha at present appears to be the choice of the majority, although Portland, Or., Kansas City and other cities have many friends. General Irving Hale, of Colorado, who was placed in nomination for president of the society, will undoubtedly be selected, no other candidate being named.

THE UPPER M'KENZIE

A Magnificent Summer and Health Resort Locality.

THE HOT MINERAL SPRINGS.

Every man, woman and child deserves a summer outing, whether or not they get it—a chance to view nature at that season when she has on her best clothes, and when their physical and mental beings most deserve rest. Not lazy, indolent, do-nothing rest, but cessation of the mind and body from the daily treadmill round of existence, where each day is a precursor of the next.

Oregon is blessed with grand mountains and rivers, in fact they are so common that many fail in appreciation of those sublime works of nature. And they go together. We could not have such magnificent streams as the Umpqua, Willamette, McKenzie and Santiam were it not for the Cascade mountains, those vast storage reservoirs that receive the waters in rain and snow, and in season send them back to the bosom of the ocean from which they were lured by the sun's warm kisses. The

M'KENZIE RIVER.

The most potent of those named, has its source in Fish Lake, twenty miles north of Belknap Springs, just in Lane county territory. The Santiam wagon road passes five miles west of the lake. Between Fish Lake and the falls, a distance of about five miles the river flows under the lava, the sound of running waters being very audible at places. About fifteen miles above Belknap Springs the waters pass over the fall, about fifty feet in height, and from that point it is the full fledged river that pours its strong current into the Willamette six miles below Eugene. It is certain that some underground connection exists between the river above the falls and below as to all appearances less than a fourth of the water carried by the river from the great pool below the falls comes from above.

The McKenzie river comes cold and clear from its source, and flows a large volume of water with far less variation in winter and summer stage than the Willamette. While the volume of the river that flows by Eugene probably equals the McKenzie in winter and spring times it does not carry one-fourth the amount of water at this season of the year. And that is warm water from its source to the junction with the Willamette.

M'KENZIE ATTRACTIONS.

Such a river could not but produce fine fish, and it has established the reputation of being the home of a fine trout as rare to the fly, to make a game and most desperate struggle for life when struck by the cruel iron. And they are so strong and determined that the mere tyro among fishermen lands few of the well-proportioned speckled beauties. Deer are plentiful in season, taking the trails down the river about September 1st from the succulent mountain summit pastures where they range during the summer. They stop in the low valley foothills during the winter and return to their summer home in April and May.

The Belknap and Foley hot mineral springs are noted health and pleasure resorts, the waters of each coming from the rock at the same temperature, 188 degrees Fahrenheit. There is no essential difference in the analysis of the two springs. The fact that they carry the same degree of heat makes it appear probable that they come from a common source. The slight difference in the analysis of the waters could easily come about through passing through different strata of rock after they separate. They are situated about four miles apart on a direct line, Foley on a small mountain branch that flows into Horse Creek, a tributary of the McKenzie, while the Belknap spring comes from the base of a high mountain, on the bank of the McKenzie at an elevation of 15 feet above the level of the river. The waters are carried across the river to the bathrooms in troughs attached to a private wagon bridge. The camp grounds and hotel are adjacent to the bathrooms on a flat of several acres that has an elevation of about six feet above the river. A second bank back of the camp grounds, about 20 feet high, is fringed with undergrowth and small trees. The bank back of the camp grounds and the river and steep mountain in front make it an ideal spot.

THE BELKNAP MANAGEMENT.

This season, as last, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Howe, of Eugene, are conducting the Belknap Springs and giving the same satisfaction to guests and campers through careful, hospitable attention to their wants. The bathrooms, swimming rink and camp grounds are kept in perfect order, and the hotel table supplied with the best of fare. As usual the camp grounds are filled with people from widely separated points throughout the Willamette Valley and Eastern Oregon. While the hotel was destroyed by fire February last no suspension of business during the season has resulted. A house tent was ordered from tentmakers in Portland and guests find accommodations in more pleasant quarters, if that were possible, than the old low ceilinged building that went up in flames and smoke. The tent is made of heavy canvas, 16x50 feet in size, with seven foot walls so guests can walk about in

TWO BOYS DROWNED

In the Coast Fork Last Night Near Cottage Grove.

WERE IN SWIMMING.

COTTAGE GROVE, Aug. 14.—Last evening about dusk while in swimming in the Coast Fork at Latham one mile south of this city, Martin Tucker, aged 14 years, son of Wm. Tucker, and Guy Lee, 17 years old, son of Bert Lee, both residing at or near Latham, were drowned.

A crowd, including the father of the Lee boy and Reuben Tucker, brother of the other boy who was drowned, were in swimming at the time. The two boys ventured into deep water, and becoming excited and strangled, were drowned right before the eyes of their companions.

An effort was made to save them, but without success, and in the effort the father of one and the brother of the other were almost drowned.

The bodies floated down stream some distance and that of the Tucker boy was recovered from the water last night, but after a diligent search the Lee boy's body was not found until about daylight this morning.

The parents of the boys have the sympathy of the entire neighborhood.

A commercial traveler who was at Cottage Grove at the time of the drowning informed a GUARD reporter this morning that he and two other gentlemen were in bathing just above the flooring mill, when one of them saw floating down stream toward them an object which they at once thought to be a human body. As it came nearer their surmises proved to be correct. It was the body of the Tucker boy. The gentlemen hauled it out of the water but the heart had stopped beating and the body was cold in death. That was perhaps half an hour after the drowning occurred. Shortly afterwards a boy came running down to where they were and told them that the Lee boy had also been drowned. Word was sent to town and shortly afterward a big crowd arrived on the scene and search was made all night for the missing body but without success until this morning.
