THE BIDS IN FULL.

Per advertisement in the GUARD the bankrupt stock of shoes, recently belonging to T A Gilbert, in the Christian block, was sold today at 10 o'clock under sealed bids, to A Brieger, of San Francisco, for the sum of \$4,498. The total liabilities of Mr Gilbert are \$8,018.24. The invoice made by the appraisers showed \$6,712.05 on hand, and the appraisal of the same was \$3,414.75. S H Friendly was selected as trustee by the creditors called by C A Wintermeyer, referee in bankruptcy. The following is a full list of the bidders:

Per announcement the tax rolls were closed by Sheriff Withers last evening. The amount of taxes due is a little more than \$19,600 some \$4,000 more than at this time last year. The delinquent roll will now be made up by the sheriff and his deputies. This work will take until about September 15th, when they will be opened again for a month longer, when all remaining unpaid will be advertised and the property sold.

FROM NEWPORT.

Plenty of Fish for the Catching—Other Points of Interest.

EDITOR GUARD.—The crowd of pleasure seekers at this beach remains about the same as for the past week. The weather is delightful.

Fishing is splendid. Large catches are made daily of flounders, herring, kelp, etc. The salmon run is increasing daily. Deep sea fish are caught here once in a while. One man caught two halibut this season, weighing 70 and 35 pounds respectively. Rock oysters, the most delicious shell fish known, can be had for the digging at low tide; also shrimp; then fat, juicy crabs, clams and oysters can be had cheap.

Water agate hunting is the popular daily amusement here. If I had the large gravel bar below the Eugene bridge here I could charge daily 25 cents admission to many men, women and children, and they would carry home with them tons of the gravel. One old man here, Mr Jones, formerly of Coburg, it is stated, has made \$200 this season selling water agates that he gathered during last winter, and worthless gravel he picks up daily. He has a wonderful imagination and his talks to novices are quite interesting to hear. He always carries the gravel in a bucket half filled with water to add to their lustre while hooking his victim. Col Frank Parker, of Walla Walla, bought a quart of his collection for 35 cents, then had the two best polished at a cost of \$2, and they were worthless. By the way Mr Parker has a ranch at Elk City above here a few miles, consisting of 1200 acres. He has hit on a new scheme. He has acres of wild cherry trees and he intends grafting Royal Ann cherries upon them, and he is enthusiastic that he can then raise these fine cherries cheaper than anyone else. It is rumored that Frank is the same person who tried the scheme of grafting peach into sage brush.

To show how property has declined here we will only have to quote a few offers: The late S Case was offered \$40,000 for seven acres around the Ocean House. It would be dear now at \$5,000. An opera house was built at a cost of \$7,000, and now it would not bring \$700. The Davis', on South Beach, were offered \$20,000 for their land; now it is only worth a small fraction there of; Dr Bayley was offered \$25,000 for his house and forty acres of land; now it could be bought probably for \$5,000, although the house alone cost from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

At Nye Creek property has advanced rapidly.

Every man on the Yaquina Bay railroad is accommodating, as well as the Davis', who handle the steam ferry.

Storm Destroyed Anadarko---Building, Debris and Merchandise Scattered for Miles

COLORADO MILLIONAIRE KILLED

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colorado, August 22.—Sam Strong, a millionaire mine owner, was shot dead in an altercation by Grant Cumley this morning.

STRIKERS LOOSING GROUND.

PITTSBURG, August 22.—The striking steel and iron-worker employees are loosing ground. One hundred men went to work in the Instar plant today. The Lindsey and McKutchen works also started up. The Painter plant is at work with 250 men.

MOB HURT THIS TIME.

ASHVILLE, Alabama, August 22.—Sheriff North and posse in charge of Jim Brown, a negro rapist, convicted today, fired on a mob that attempted to take the negro from them with the intention of lynching him. Two of the mob were fatally injured.

A DESTRUCTIVE STORM.

ELKNO, Oklahoma, August 22.—A terrific storm that passed over this section last night destroyed the town of Anadarko, the trading town of the Kiowas, Comanche and Apache tribes.

Four persons were killed and many injured. Building debris and merchandise from the stores were scattered for miles in the path of the storm. At Hobart heavy rains greatly damaged much merchandise that had been stored in unfinished buildings.

The Oregon State Fair at Salem, September 23 to 28, 1901, inclusive, promises to be the best this year that has yet been held. New features for amusement and instruction have been added, and particular attention will be given to the stock exhibit, owing to the great and constantly increasing interest in dairying throughout the state. For this occasion the Southern Pacific Company will make a rate of one fare for the round trip, from all its stations in Oregon, to Salem and return, and it is to be hoped that every one who can do so will show his appreciation by taking advantage of this opportunity to pass a few days pleasantly and profitably at our state capital.

The Royal Chinook.

The Columbia river salmon is not only royal in quality, but in the returns to fishermen, canneries and cold storage plants. Here are the figures for the 1901 season, just ended:

Twenty-seven hundred tons of fish were handled by the cold storages, and at 175 cents a pound, it is worth \$475,000. This brings the total value of the season's catch to \$2,573,800. Only nine catches of previous seasons exceeded that of this year in value. Those were the catches of 1874, when salmon brought \$7.50 a case; 1879, 1880, 1882, 1883, 1884, 1892, 1893 and 1895.

It is estimated that the cannery and cold-storage men paid out \$1,200,000 for raw material during the last season. This would leave them \$1,373,800 with which to pay expenses and lay aside their profits.

PRODUCT SINCE 1886.

The total number of cases of salmon packed since 1886, including that handled by the cold storages (135,000 cases) during the past two years, is 14,723,735, valued at \$78,513,233.
