RESULT OF APPOINTMENT OF UNFIT INDIAN AGENT.

Probably the best sample of the dilapidation that comes to public property from low-down politics can be seen at the Siletz Indian reservation. For a little dirty work at election time the agency was given to a relative of one of the delegation, and anyone who goes there can see the result. The place looks like fifteen cents, with the windows stuffed full of old hats, the once beautiful thrifty fields uncultivated, the fences broken down, the buildings unpainted, and the people not prosperous. The horses and cattle have been neglected, and those belonging to the government are said to have been let starve during the winter.

The first of July the politician agent was removed and a special man, trained in the Indian service, brought on from the east to build up the once beautiful property and a thrifty and progressive community of Indian people. He was made both agent and superintendent of the school, and with the liberal treatment always accorded the Indian department by congress there is no reason why this property of the government cannot be made to blossom like the rose. It is one of the most beautiful spots in the state, and associated with the efforts of some of the best men and women in Oregon in behalf of Indian education.

SUIT FOR DAMAGES THROUGH A DOG.

J S Locke has brought suit in the circuit court against C J Durbin to recover the sum of \$570 as damages. The complaint states that on June 10th the plaintiff was driving along the county highway near Huntington in a buckboard when a vicious dog, owned and allowed to run at large by the defendant, attacked and endeavored to bite his team; that the actions of the dog caused the horses to take flight and make a wild dash for liberty, thereby causing the plaintiff to be thrown to the ground and inflicting two broken ribs, besides other and sundry bodily injuries, causing him to be confined to his bed and necessitating an expenditure of \$20 for medical attendance; that he suffered bodily pain and loss of time for which he asks the sum of \$500 as redress, and other damages to the extent of \$50.

The Chinaman will not live up to his agreement. As an instance the foreign ministers required an edict forbidding the importation of arms and munitions of war into China as a part of the punishment sought to be administered to China. The wily Chinamen issued the edict, but with the appearance that it was a voluntary act, thereby saving its credit with the populace. The foreigners failed in their intention of compelling the Chinese government to discredit itself with its own people.

Ohio had the record for burning the last negro until Sunday when a Tennessee town made its mark. He had shot a white woman through the head, robbery being the motive. The negro was taken to a point in view of the scene of his crime, where he made a confession. He was then bound to a tree with chains, his clothing saturated with coal oil and a match applied. Fence rails were burnt about the body until it was reduced to ashes.

The industrial war goes merrily on in Europe. The new German tariff bill is principally directed against Russian wheat, and the agriculturists of Russia have suffered greatly thereby. Now comes Russia and shuts out German manufacturers to the extent of about one hundred millions of dollars annually. This thing of trading on coars is a very pretty business for the man who has none on his toes.

The gain in the assessment of Eugene for the current tax year, 1930, is \$76,540. This gain over 1899 is a little more than one-half the assessment of either Cottage Grove or Junction City, and a half more than Springfield or Florence. Eugene will pay taxes on \$1,347,125 this tax year.

RED AND BLUE PARAGUAYANS

It is not often that political prejudice finds vent in the color of clothing worn. Such is the case though in Paraguay, South America. An American consul, who has just returned, has this about the use of colors by Paraguayans:

There are two leading political parties in Paraguay, the Colorados and the Azules. The color of the Colorados is red and of the Azules blue. The party in power now is the Colorados, or what might be properly called the Liberals. The intense partisanship of every man, woman and child is simply astonishing. A member of the "red" party would no more allow his wife or children to wear clothing in which the predominating color was blue than he would vote the "blue" ticket himself. The "blues" are the same way, and as a result the party's color has had distinct action in the colors of the clothing of the people.

LABOR ORGANIZATION PAID.

President John Mitchell, of the United States Mine-workers of America, gives some figures in justification of the organization of which he is the official head. President Mitchell says:

The agreement reached between the men and the operators in 1900 amounted to an increase of \$25,000,000 annually, for 200,000 men, secured by an expenditure of \$300,000, which is a bigger dividend than the Standard Oil Company or the Morgan Banking Company ever paid. At the April convention, at an expenditure of \$5000, concessions were granted amounting to an increase of \$7,000,000 annually.

"The Influence of Methodism on the Promotion of International Peace" is given as the subject for the opening debate in the Methodist Ecumenical Conference, now meeting in London. From the facility with which nations go to war these times, with the greatly improved methods of killing men, it does not appear that Methodism, or any other ism has much "influence" towards promoting peace.

Some Modern Threshing.

JUNCTION CITY, Aug 27th. Last Sunday was a busy day out on Thos Bailey's ranch, five miles southwest of Junction. Carriages, buggies and carts containing men, women and children were seen going in and out all day long. The cause of all this commotion was Casteel's big thrasher. Owing to the threatening weather it was thought best not to stop for Sunday, so people from all around took this opportunity to see the new machine at work.

It is of the Niagara Pitts make and is managed and owned by Perry Casteel & Son. The big 36-inch separator resembles not a little, some great animal of bygone days, with huge body and long, restlessly moving neck and head that constantly puffs and blows at every passer-by. The round grain is pitched onto the table from both sides, a revolving draper with rows of steel teeth hurries it into the snapping jaws where the sawlike teeth slice it and cut and rend it into shreds. On through the big throat, into the cylinder it goes, twisting and turning till the golden grain, almost perfectly cleaned, comes pouring out into sacks hung on hooks under the spout, while the chaff and straw are whirled round and round by a monster fan and forced out through the long neck and belched forth onto the ever-increasing stack.

Thus doing away with band-cutters, feeders and straw stackers. The power behind this hungry, panting monster is a big 16-horse power engine. From 6 o'clock a m till 8 o'clock p m the white steam goes hissing through pipes and screws and cylinders, with a musical puff that sets the feet going to keep time, sending the great belt back and forth rapidly and smoothly till two thousand bushels of grain per day are put into the sack one day with another.

Out to one side in easy reach is the white-covered cook wagon, where two cooks are kept busy from the "wee ones" hours till the long dark ones, preparing good wholesome food for 20 hard-working, hungry men.

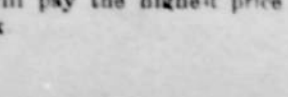

The matter of stocking Summit lake, in the Cascade mountains near the Military road to Eastern Oregon, with fish was discussed. E J McClanahan moved that the secretary be empowered to correspond with the fish commissioner to see if a sufficient quantity of bass and pickerel can be secured to place in this lake, which is a good sized body of water and in which there are no fish at all at present. If these fish are secured and placed in the lake, that body of water will be a popular fishing place in a few years after the fish have multiplied.

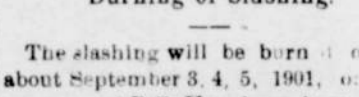
