Already 400 feet of tunnel has been run on a well defined ledge of good thickness. It is the intention of the owners to soon place a ten-stamp mill on the property, we have been informed.

The Messrs Wood are among our best known citizens and their many friends will be glad to learn of their mine turning out so well.

In five years time the Blue River mines will be known in every camp in the United States.

PARK'S MINES

Supplies Being Shipped to Blue River and Fall Creek.

DEVELOPMENT WORK BEING PUSHED

C H Park is having three ore cars, several tons of rails, drills, etc., forwarded to the Treasure ledge to be used in development work on that promising ledge. Four tunnels are being run into the mountain and all will be completed up. The lower tunnel will show a depth of about 900 feet. The development work will be pushed forward all winter and it is probable that a 50 stamp mill will be placed on the property next spring. While up on this trip he will also make arrangements for the extension of the Lucky Boy road to the Treasure mine. This road will cost several thousand dollars.

FALL CREEK MINES.

These mines are located on Gray's Creek, in the Fall Creek country about 57 miles easterly from Eugene and promise much. Mr Park will keep a crew of miners working on these mines also all winter. He will start in supplies, and they must be packed about 10 miles. The surface of the main ledge in this group assays about \$35 per ton.

Deutschland Makes Transatlantic Trip 9 Minutes Faster Than in 1900.

CITY OF TRENTON EXPLOSION.

PHILADELPHIA, August 29.—It has been definitely settled that as a result of the explosion of the steamer City of Trenton, yesterday morning, twelve persons are dead, ten missing, and thirty more or less seriously injured.

MAKES HER SECOND RECORD.

NEW YORK, August 29.—The transatlantic steamer, Deutschland arrived here this morning from Cherbourg, France, making the trip in the record time of 5 days, 12 hours and 20 minutes.

[The Deutschland already holds the record between Cherbourg and New York, made August 26—September 1, 1900, in 5 days, 12 hours and 29 minutes. Nearly a year later she has made the run just nine minutes faster. The distance is 3500 miles. In her previous voyage the Deutschland made a world-record for a single day's run, 657 miles, a little more than an average speed of 27 miles an hour for twenty-four consecutive hours.—En GUARD.]
