### PRESIDENTS PROCLAMATION.

Thursday Set Apart as a day of Mourning and Prayer.

"By the President of the United States, a proclamation:

"A terrible bereavement has befallen our people. The President of the United States has been struck down—a crime committed not only against the Chief Magistrate, but against every law-abiding and liberty-loving citizen.

"President McKinley crowned a life of largest love for his fellow-men, of most earnest endeavor for their welfare, by a death of Christian fortitude, and both the way in which he devoted his life and the way in which, in the supreme hour of trial, he met his death, will remain forever a precious heritage of our people.

"It is meet that we, as a Nation, express our obiding love and reverence for his life, our deep sorrow for his untimely death.

"Now, therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, do appoint Thursday next, September 19, the day on which the body of the dead President will be laid in its last earthly resting-place, as a day of mourning and prayer throughout the United States. I earnestly recommend that all the people assemble on that day in their respective places of divine worship, there to bow down in submission to the will of Almighty God, and to pay out of full hearts their homage of love and reverence to the great and good President whose death has smitten the Nation with bitter grief.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington, the 14th day of September, A D 1901, and of the independence of the United States the 126th.

### GOOD FOR ROOSEVELT.

President Roosevelt will prove no exception to the vice-presidential succession record—a certain unpopularity in his own party that will destroy him. The tariff protected industries put up their millions for the campaign in which he was elected, yet he promulgates this sound doctrine with the assurance that he will endeavor to carry it out:

A more liberal and extensive reciprocity in the purchase and sale of commodities, so that the over-production of this country can be disposed of by fair and equitable arrangements with foreign countries.

The abolition entirely of commercial war with other countries and the adoption of reciprocity treaties.

The abolition of such tariffs on foreign goods as are no longer needed for revenue, if such aboli-

tion can be had without harm to our industries and labor.

Good for Roosevelt! With such a record there would be no necessity for nominating a Democratic candidate in 1904. We can vote for Roosevelt on that platform. Our President is no friend of the trusts, which is equivalent to saying that he is a friend of the people.

### HEALTH CENSUS.

The census report just received shows the death rate in Oregon to be a little less than ten per cent, about the lowest of any state in the United States. The average for the whole country is approximately 15 per cent. Portland is about the average of the state and probably of the other cities in the state, 9.5 per cent. Both San Francisco and Los Angeles are 20 per cent. San Jose is 24 per cent, San Diego 22 per cent. The highest is Savannah, Ga, 34 per cent. In Oregon in 1900 there were 3,396 deaths. Of these 372 died under 1 year, 100 at 1, 73 at 2, 40 at 3, 38 at 4, 137 between 5 and 9, 119 between 10 and 14, 161 between 15 and 19, 180 between 20 and 24, 150 to 170 each four years up to 60, 60 to 64 there were 191, 65 to 69, 223, 70 to 74, 227, 75 to 79 173, 80 to 84, 90, 85 to 89, 64, 90 to 94, 20, and over 95 8 indicating a long lived condition of affairs here.

Hull House of Chicago, famous for its work among the poorer and more ignorant classes, has organized a "Clean Up Club." In it are 300 children pledged to pick up and destroy one piece of paper from the streets each day. During the first month 150,000 bits of paper were removed from Chicago's streets by the children, who thus did more to make the "windy" city a pleasant place in which to live than all the officials put together. The children also learned more of cleanliness and order than an hundred lessons in the school room would have taught.

John W Mackay has had his say on the shooting of the President. The bonanza mining man would try assassins in similar cases by vigilance committees such as they had in San Francisco in "forty-nine" days. Perhaps it never occurred to Mr Mackay that possibly the vigilance committee hung innocent men. Where there is no enforcement of law such dealing with crime is absolutely necessary, but an orderly community may be depended upon to give criminals exact justice.

Chas Buchanan, of Cornelius, says that his hop crop will not be over forty-five per cent of what it was last year on the same acreage. J C Buchanan will have from sixty-five to seventy per cent of last year's crop, and the shortage is said to be like this all over the state. This being the case there should be a good price for this Fall, although no buyers are as yet in the field. As soon as baling is in progress, however, we may look for them—Ex

### A Unique Cabinet.

Miller & Johnson, ably assisted by Mr Yable, of Kansas City, are showing a piece of kitchen furniture in Mr Holden's building on Willamette street which will at once command the attention and approval of all the housewives in city and country. It is a compact, neatly furnished cabinet, of Japanese, double-cross tin, containing apartments of ample capacity for all the staples used in cooking. The space it occupies is small, indeed, compared to the number, variety and amount of stuff it contains. All these apartments are insect proof, and are filled from the top of the cabinet; while for use in the kitchen the various articles are taken from the bottom of the cabinet by pressing a spring. There is a place for 60 pounds of flour, with sifter at the bottom; one for 35 pounds of graham flour or corn meal; one for three pounds of roasted coffee with grinder at the bottom; one for 30 pounds of sugar, and one each for three gallons of oat meal and rice. The contents of all these apartments are taken from bottom of cabinet and they are dust and insect proof. At the base of the cabinet there is a commodious receptacle for bread, pies and cakes; one for knives, forks and spoons, at the back of cabinet hangs a bread and biscuit board. A French plate mirror, 6x18 inches, covers the door of the cabinet and on opening this are disclosed 6 convenient receptacles for as many different spoons.

### The Clothes Moth.

We may marvel at grubs growing fat and succulent upon such unpromising fare as old timber affords, but that achievement is improved upon by the insects that prefer to draw their entire nutrition from woolen fabrics, fur, horsehair, feathers, tanned leather and the like and apparently without ever a desire to "wet their whiskers" by anything of a juicy nature. Any small, silvery winged moth that is seen flitting about the house is regarded as a "clothes moth," but every one killed is not an enemy, for there are a number of moths of similar size and appearance that come from outdoors and have been occupied as grubs in destroying green leaves. It is a common error to suppose that it is the clothes moth that does the mischief, though by destroying the moth we prevent the laying of innumerable eggs from which come the consuming larvae, whose cutting jaws would be actively and incessantly employed in mutilating choice fabrics and valuable furs. These caterpillars are rarely seen by the housewife because their first care on leaving the egg is to disguise or hide themselves.

The clothes moth proper has yellowish gray wings, with three or four indefinite brownish spots upon them, and in consequence of its marked preference for furs it is known to science as *Tinea pellionella*.—Good Words.
