A DARING ESCAPE

Three Prisoners Break Out of the County Jail.

STILL AT LARGE.

Last evening about 7 o'clock occurred the first escape of prisoners from the Lane county jail since it was built about ten years ago.

Harry Egerton, charged with fraudulently disposing of wild animal scalps to the county clerk; H A Gill, charged with stealing a bicycle from Henry Lieb, west of Eugene, and a horse and saddle from a man near Oakland, and one of the young hobs arrested at Junction on the charge of larceny, all awaiting trial before Judge Hamilton, of the circuit court, were the prisoners who escaped through a small hole made by them in the west wall of the jail.

Deputy Sheriff Harry Bown, who has sole charge of the jail during the absence of Sheriff Withers, after Elenor, the cattle thief, at Bickleton, Wash, and of Deputy Fisk in Nebraska, tell of the escape of the prisoners substantially as follows:

About six o'clock yesterday evening one of the prisoners who escaped wished to take a bath and was allowed to use the bath tub in the corridor, as is the usual custom. When he finished, the other two also wanted a bath and they were also allowed the privilege, the deputy sheriff leaving them alone.

When he returned they had not finished and asked for time to dry their clothes which had become wet. Mr Bown then went to supper and when he returned at 7:30 to lock the prisoners up he found these three had escaped through a hole, barely large enough for a small man's body to pass through, which they had dug through the west wall near the floor.

The only instruments used in effecting their escape were a stick of oak fire wood and a small piece of a checker board. The ventilator grate was first removed and all that was then necessary was to punch a hole through the one layer of brick, which was readily done. They then climbed over the high iron picket fence surrounding the jail and made good their escape. The work was probably done in a space of 15 or 20 minutes.

Mr Bown immediately informed Policemen Croner and Pratt of the jailbreak and steps were at once taken to effect the capture of the breakers. Officers along the line of the railroad were notified and descriptions of the men sent out. Deputy Bown went to Goshen to see if they had gone south and the other officers scoured the city for the fugitives. Nearby towns and villages were notified of the occurrence by telephone, and it is stated that James Clark saw the men at Springfield just before the news arrived there but they were not seen afterward. Officers have been out all day but so far nothing has been heard from the runaways.

Deputy Sheriff Bown cannot be blamed for the escape of these men. The prisoners are frequently allowed in the corridor of the jail on the strength of the supposition that the walls were perfectly safe. It is strange that the chance for escape has not been noticed before. It was supposed that the ventilator hole was not large enough to permit a man's body to pass through but the builder of the jail evidently miscalculated on the size of prisoners to be incarcerated therein. All three of those who escaped are very young men and slightly built or they could not have possibly escaped through the hole. Egerton is of a light complexion, has sandy chin whiskers, light brown hair, blue eyes and wears a light suit. Gill is of medium height, light complexion, wears light pants, dark coat and a black shirt. The other one is a boy of about 15, is short in stature, of sandy complexion, wears overalls and a blue shirt. The only remaining prisoner in the jail is the accomplice of the last mentioned in the burglary case at Junction. He has been kept in the women's cell for some time, it is said on account of threats and attempts to break out, and consequently was unable to take a hand in the escape.

Sheriff Withers this morning telegraphed to Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Harris that he will arrive home tonight or tomorrow.

NO INQUEST NECESSARY.

John Hanna, the Logger, Died From Natural Causes.

Considerable comment has been caused by a statement in this morning's Register to the effect that John Hanna, who died at the hospital from paralysis Tuesday night, was given "knock-out drops," which caused his death.

The GUARD has made a thorough investigation of the case and has found no cause for such a statement. Dr D A Paine, who attended the man before he died, says there is no evidence whatever of his dying from any but natural causes. Dr Paine says that he died from paralysis caused by a rupture of a blood vessel on the left side of the brain.

The man who is 45 or 50 years of age, had been drinking some during the night he was taken ill but, we are reliably informed by several of his friends who were with him, not to any great extent and was not too drunk to find his way alone to his room in the third story of the Matlock House, undress himself and carefully fold his clothes and lay them on a table in the room.

When he came to town the man had only a few dollars in money, with a part of which he bought some new clothes, and had no \$70 or more to lose at gambling or with which to tempt anyone to give him "knock-out drops." Moreover, when a man is drugged in a saloon it usually lays him out in short order and doesn't give him time to go to his room and carefully prepare himself for sleep.

Yesterday it was rumored that an inquest would be held over the body, but Coroner Griffin yesterday afternoon told us that none would be held as there was nothing to warrant it, and he did not wish to put the county to the expense of an inquest just to satisfy those who are not willing to believe the statement of the physicians who attended the dead man.

EXAMINATION TO BE MADE.

At the request of quite a number, Coroner Griffin this afternoon consulted the commissioners' court, now in session, in regard to holding a post mortem examination over the body. The court seemed opposed to going to the expense of an examination when no evidence of foul play can be seen, but authorized the coroner to employ to ph sicians to cut open the head of the dead man to ascertain whether or not he died from paralysis. Drs T W Harris and L W Brown will perform the operation this evening.

Good Forest Ranger Work.

Ed Howe, just down from Belknap Springs, informs a GUARD reporter that a large force of forest rangers is engaged cutting a trail from the springs to Fish Lake. The trail is being cut six feet wide, while grades are made about points and steep hill-sides. All down logs are being cut out. The distance is about 20 miles.

There are ten rangers engaged in the work. Six of them are from east of the mountains, two from the Middle Fork of the Willamette, and two from the Santiam district. They are camped at Belknap Springs at present, but will move up the trail as work progresses. They will be employed for a month yet, unless bad weather forces them out. The trail runs up the south side of the river.

The body is now at the J W Kays undertaking parlors, awaiting an answer from the relatives before interment is made.

ROW AT FAIRMOUNT

Chas. Weaver Attempts to Horse-whip M. C. Van Tyne.

VAN TYNE PULLS A GUN.

Chas Weaver and M C Van Tyne, both residents of Fairmount, were up this morning before Justice of the Peace C A Wintermeier, and both men were fined \$10 and costs, the former on the charge of assault and battery and the latter on the charge of carrying a concealed weapon.

These cases in the justice court are the outcome of a row had at Fairmount early this forenoon. It seems that Van Tyne had circulated a story to the effect that Weaver, upon hearing of the death of President McKinley, fired off a gun and shouted in celebration of the event. Weaver was at Wendling at the time of the president's death and returned only two or three days ago when he heard of the story. It seems that the story was printed in a local paper but no name given. When Weaver returned he asked Van Tyne to make a statement in the papers refuting the story, but he refused to do so. This morning as Van Tyne was taking his cow to pasture Weaver approached him with a blacksnake in his hand and again demanded that Van Tyne straighten the matter up, and upon refusing a second time, proceeded to belay him with the whip.

Van Tyne thereupon pulled a pistol from his pocket and fired once. Weaver claims that Van Tyne shot at him and missed him only a few inches, but Van Tyne claims that he fired into the air only to frighten Weaver. However be it, they both came to town and swore out warrants for the arrest of each other with the above result.

FLEENER BOUND OVER.

Arrested on Three Different Charges, Brought Back Last Night.

Sheriff Withers returned last night from Bickleton, Wash, with Sydney Fleener, of Springfield, having gone to Olympia to get the extradition papers signed by the Governor of Washington, before going to Bickleton where the man was arrested.

Fleener was arrested on three different charges as follows: For stealing two horses from Henry Bidwell on the 6th day of September; for stealing three cows from G B Kintzley on the 12th day of June, and for stealing two cows from R L Young on the 12th day of September. He was taken before Justice of the Peace C A Wintermeier this morning, L Blyen appearing as his attorney and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Harris appearing for the state. He waived examination and was bound over in the sum of \$500 to await the action of the circuit court. Failing to furnish bail he will take up board and lodging in the county jail for some time.

Fleener also stole a bicycle from Miss Ethel Kinney, of this city, last spring, but as the other offenses are felonies this one only a misdemeanor, the judge concluded not to try him on that charge.
