TUNNEL CAVED IN

Without Warning a Mass of Rock Weighing

150 Tons Fell Upon Workmen. NewYork, Oct. 21.-Five men were killed and two injured by an enormous mass of rock caving from the tunnel, in the course of construction on Broadway, about the line of One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street.

The section of tunnel where the cave-in occurred is 105 feet below the surface. A shaft leads to the tunnel. and from the shaft headings extend north and south, each about 700 feet long. The accident occurred in the south heading of the tunnel, about London police are guarding the 640 feet from the shaft. A gang of 20 rock drillers was working in the extreme south end of the heading. and about 50 feet from the end a are shut down on account of low gang, made up of 20 muckers and a foreman, was removing the debris made by the blasting. Without warning a mass of rock

fell with a tremendous crash directly ing a panic among the 200 to 300 men working in other sections. Great clouds of dust filled the whole excavation. At first it was supposed that at least a dozen men had been buried under the debris. Word of the accident had spread and soon an anxious crowd gathered around the shaft, scores of men and women crying and wringing their hands while the rescuers worked with tremendous energy to reach the entombed workmen.
